Kobach Request for Voter Records

League Opposes Kobach Request for Voter Records

WASHINGTON, DC- The request for voter records confirms fears of Kris Kobach continuing his tactics of voter suppression and the genesis of the Elections Integrity Commission in general. The League of Women Voters president, **Chris Carson** released this statement on the issue:

"There is no justification for this giant fishing expedition. The Commission itself is a distraction from the real issue of voter suppression, and that efforts to 'investigate voter fraud' threaten our most fundamental voting rights.

"This most recent move by Mr. Kobach is an indicator that the so-called Election 'Integrity' Commission is not interested in facts, but false accusations and dangerous policy recommendations.

"State laws govern the release of voter registration information, and, at a minimum, election officials must follow those laws before releasing data. The League stands with those state leaders who have already come out to support their voters and refuse these requests from Mr. Kobach and the EIC."

I think of our nation's history and the struggles to promote and protect life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness for all. That struggle is ongoing both overseas by our armed forces and here at home. It is a battle waged on many fronts. This past Spring LWVWP held our Vote 18 program; we sponsored a forum on the November ballot question about convening a NYS Constitutional Convention (<u>http://bit.ly/2tlPinZ</u>), and a forum on voter issues and voter reforms in New York State (<u>http://bit.ly/2smNgGD</u>).

This Fall LWVWP's efforts continue with our participation in National Voter Registration Day, Tuesday September 26th. Earlier in the month, on September 7th we will host a Forum for candidates running for Mayor and Common Council in the Democratic primary. Local elections are as important as our national elections. It is in your interest to come and learn where the candidates stand on the issues that impact your daily lives.

Speaking of milestones, November 6, 2017 marks the centennial of women achieving the right to vote in New York State elections. LWVWP is working with ArtsWestchester, the county arts organization, on an exhibition titled, *Give Us the Vote* that highlights this important anniversary and the ongoing struggle to protect voter's rights. Join us on November 6th as we host a celebration at the ArtsW gallery in downtown White Plains.

So as you can see, the League of Women Voters of White Plains (*your* League) continues to be a vital force in our community. I hope you will plan to participate in our activities and lend your voice and support to the League's vital mission.

FORUM FOR CANDIDATES RUNNING IN THE DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY FOR MAYOR AND COMMON COUNCIL

In support of our mission to provide information about issues and candidates to the public, the League of Women Voters of White Plains will be holding a forum for candidates running for Mayor and Common Council in the Democratic party. It will be held on Thursday, **September 7th from 7 pm** – **10 pm** at Rochambeau School Auditorium, 228 Fisher Avenue, White Plains.



There are two candidates running for the Democratic nomination for Mayor – Milagros Lecuona and Tom Roach. There are six candidates running for the Democratic nomination for three Council seats -Justin Brasch, Alan Goldman, John Kirkpatrick, Michael Kraver, John Martin and Saad Siddiqui. (The final ballot for the primary election will be determined by review of petitions by the Board of Elections.)

The forum will begin promptly at 7:00 pm. We anticipate that after introductions and sharing of the ground rules of the event, the candidates for Mayor will begin the forum, from approximately 7:15 pm to 8:15 pm, followed by the candidates for Common Council, from approximately 8:20 pm to 9:45 pm.

Although only registered Democrats can vote in the primary election (to be held on September 12th), all community members are welcome to attend the forum.

In accordance with League policy and in order to insure that a wide range of issues are addressed by the candidates, <u>questions will be submitted in</u> <u>writing</u> in one of two ways: by email in advance of the meeting to <u>bethkava@gmail.com</u> or at the forum itself. Doors will open at 6:30 pm and cards will be available for audience members to submit questions. Please include your name and address on submissions. <u>Questions will not be taken from the</u> <u>floor</u>.



LWVWP ADVOCATES FOR SINGLE PAYER HEALTH CARE IN NEW YORK STATE

Health care has been at the forefront of our minds recently. This month we were all appalled when the House voted to gut the Affordable Care Act and replace it with a health care policy that would put millions at risk of losing their health insurance. Health care is a basic human right and we want to make sure that all New Yorkers have equal access to affordable health insurance.

The League has long been a supporter of single payer health care in New York State. A single payer health system would take health insurance out of the private sector and allow the state to use its own resources to provide health insurance. This system would significantly reduce administrative costs and would ensure that all citizens have equal access to quality health care. This month, the State Assembly passed the New York Health Act by a vote of 94-46 which would implement a single payer health care system in New York. This is not the first time the bill has passed in the Assembly but each year the bill stalls in the Senate. Currently the Senate version of this legislation has 31 sponsors including members of the Independent Democratic Conference.

We have created an advocacy toolkit that is available <u>here</u> which highlights which members we should be targeting in the Health Committee where the bill has stalled. The toolkit includes a contacts for Senators, a phone script, key talking points, and sample tweets. In April we lobbied in Albany for the bill's passage.
