And too, it was confirmation that our members believe in the importance of the League and the role it can play in the civic life of White Plains. New and long-time members came together to hear about our accomplishments of the past year (look for details in our member renewal letter you will receive shortly). The 2018 – 2019 LWVWP budget was ap-

And on behalf of the LWVWP board, heartfelt thanks to Harriet Slivka a long-time League member and board member responsible for the healthcare portfolio as she steps down from the board.

On Page 4 of this issue you will see the 2018 – 2019 Local Program approved by our members. It is an ambitious agenda that reflects our continued commitment to voter service, promoting an informed and engaged electorate, and encouraging the youth of our community to become involved in the electoral process. Particularly exciting is a monthly program, "Community Conversations," that the League of Women Voters of White Plains, in partnership with the White Plains Public Library, will begin this fall.

We believe that democracy is built upon rational discussion and compromise that can only be achieved through civil discourse; people learning to discuss sensitive topics and achieving mutual respect and understanding of differing points of view and by acquiring the skills of *active listening*.

We are currently talking to White Plains community stakeholders with the goal of encouraging their "constituents" to participate in these monthly conversations and then integrating what they have learned into their interactions with others going forward.

Voter Service

- Voter Service is central to the League's mission by providing information and education about voter registration, candidates, ballot issues, and elections (including key dates), and encouraging citizens to vote. There is a strong focus on engaging with students to promote the importance of elections and voting.
- National Voter Registration day; voter registration drives at area events; Vote 18 at area schools
- Voters Guides (printed) and Vote411 (website)
- Get out the vote for local, state and nation elections.
- Voter information via election calendars, ballot information, poll locations, etc.

Candidates Forums

 Candidates Forums offer residents the opportunity to hear from all candidates in an election in a nonpartisan setting that promotes civil discourse.

Information Programs

- Information Programs further the League's goal of promoting an informed and engaged electorate through discussions and presentations.
- "Community Conversations," a program designed to promote civil discourse.
- City and school budgets monitoring and evaluation.
- Local topics of importance to the White Plains community.

The Local Program for 2018-19 was approved by the membership at the Annual Meeting on May 16, 2018.

Youth Programs

- Youth Programs engage and educate young people in the areas of civics and political engagement through collaboration with schools and youth groups, and via LWV-sponsored programs.
- Students Inside Albany which immerses students in the legislative process
- LWVWP Marge Davies Memorial scholarship awarded to a WPHS senior
- White Plains Youth Bureau collaboration on topics of importance to the community
- Running & Winning encourages young women to consider careers in politics though a mock election and mentoring by elected women in local, state and national government

 Membership Development seeks to actively recruit and retain members though outreach and engagement in the work of LWVWP and by identifying opportunities to raise awareness of the League in the community.

Health Care Update

THE NEW YORK HEALTH ACT IMPROVED AND AFFORDABLE HEALTH CARE

How is it possible to have more comprehensive health care coverage, include every New Yorker and save \$45 billion a year? Sounds impossible, but that is just what the New York Health Act, currently before the State Legislature, does. 98% of New Yorkers would save an average of \$2,200 a year. In the last Legislative session the bill passed 94-46 in the Assembly and had 31 co-sponsors in the State Senate, just one senator away from a majority.

The political situation is evolving, and there is opportunity to gain support for the bill through the November elections as every New York Senator is up for election and at least five incumbents are not running.

If the New York Health Act passes, all residents of New York will have comprehensive coverage including primary, preventive, specialists, hospital, mental health, substance abuse treatment, reproductive health care, dental, vision, prescription drugs, and medical supplies, more comprehensive than commercial health plans. There will be no co-pays, deductibles or premiums

New York Health will be funded by a progressive graduated tax based on ability to pay, with the biggest share going to middle-class families. 98% of New Yorkers will pay less than they spend now. How can this be? Traditional Medicare spends 2% on over-

head, while for-profit insurance spends 18-20% on overhead. The New York Health Trust (like centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services) won't require the costly paperwork our current multi-payer system uses to deny care through prior authorizations, benefit questions and appeals, intrusions into the doctorpatient relationship. And New York Health will negotiate drug prices for our 20 million residents — like NYS Medicaid that pays half of what Medicare seniors pay for drugs.

Currently in Westchester 40% of our property taxes or \$276,000,000 a year pays for Medicaid. Since Medicare and Medicaid would be folded into one entity, the New York Health Trust, County governments would no longer be responsible for this cost. Counties would also benefit because employees would have their health insurance covered by the New York Health Act.

NY Health Lobby Day is on June 5th Join hundreds of citizens, doctors, nurses and healthcare workers who will gather in Albany to lobby for this bill. If you can't march, go to nyheampaign.org and call your State Senator to support S.4840. Then vote in November for candidates who make New York Health part of their platform. Your vote may save your life savings—and your life.
