ILWV DIVERSITY, EQUITY, & INCLUSION COMMITTEE REPORT

April 22, 2021

In attendance were Tracy Matthews, Kristin Salmans, Emily Riner, Marjorie Cole, Connie Stoker, Jeanne Klein, Tamara Cash, and Kay Johnson.

We had a lively discussion of Fair Housing and affordable housing reflecting on the article that was sent in by Kay. We discussed several books and the study by Bill Dedman completed regarding Fair Housing violations by Relators on Long Island (http://bit.ly/BillDedmanStudy).

Next, we discussed the hard work that was completed by the DEI Movie Panel sub-committee. Partnering with the library, the LWV will co-sponsor a discussion panel after participants have watched the documentaries Freedom Summer and Fannie Lou Hammer. The documentaries are free with a library card utilizing Kanopy. There will be a panel discussion on June 13 at 2:00 on the library lawn with a rain date for June 27 at the same time. The potential panelists so far are Frankie Hanes, Ursula Minor, and Sean Alexander from the Langston Hughes Center.

Finally, we discussed the results of our LWV-LDV DEI survey. We reviewed question results and noted areas where the results were notable or interesting to our purpose. The overall result from the study was that most members/respondents were open to our committee providing various classes/sessions. There were several great ideas on the open-ended questions surrounding the needs of membership and also ideas from our membership regarding what they would like to see offered. We plan to go over these more in-depth individually and work on a more systematic plan of action based on our 2021 goals.

MONTHLY CREEN CHALLENGE

Each month, we challenge members to take one action toward living a "green," sustainable life-style and fighting climate change. This month's challenge: Reduce energy waste.

- I. Unplug. Electronics that are turned off but plugged into the wall can still draw power. Unplug your chargers, paper shredder, toaster, blender, microwave, and other items when you're not using them.
- **2. Use LEDs.** LEDs use at least 75 percent less energy and last 25 times longer than incandescent lighting.

- **3. Warm laundry.** Washing clothes on "warm" instead of "hot" can cut a load's energy use in half.
- **4.** Air dry dishes. When your dishwasher gets to the drying cycle, open the door to let dishes air dry.
- **5. Stop screensavers.** Power down your electronics instead of leaving them in standby. In a year, TVs, cable boxes, or video game consoles use more energy in "standby mode" than they do in active use.
- **6.** Check your water heater temperature. In most households, I 20 degrees is a sufficient temperature to heat water in a home.
- **7. Recycle toys, even if worn!** One company has announced a free toy takeback or "playback" program. Here's how it works:

Go to Mattel.com/PlayBack to print a free shipping label, then pack and mail outgrown Mattel toys back to Mattel. U.S. and Canadian consumers without computers or printers can request a shipping label over the phone by calling 800-524-8697.

The collected toys will be sorted and separated by material type before being processed and recycled, the company said."
