What an incredible year! We were privileged to have phenomenal, distinguished guest speakers present to our League, members, and guests. Although we were still not able to meet in person for safety precautions, we were definitely impacted, and we truly benefitted from all of our guest speakers' knowledge, expertise, experience, and passion!

In September, our League kicked off our General Monthly Meeting with, "Conversations with our Mayors". We were honored to hear about all the different initiatives, projects and great updates from Mayor Vernard Alsberry Jr. (Hazel Crest), Mayor Michelle Nelson (Flossmoor) and Mayor Christopher J. Clark (Harvey).

In October, **Dr. Jacqueline Anderson-Carter** was our distinguished guest speaker. She addressed our members and guests about mental wellness. She also discussed several available tools and resources on mental wellness to help us create the life we deserve. The link to one of those resources is below. NAMI, the National Alliance on Mental Illness, is the nation's largest grassroots mental health organization dedicated to building better lives for the millions of Americans affected by mental illness. In November and in honor of Indigenous Peoples' Month,

we had **Dr. Theodore Karamanski** as our distinguished guest speaker. <u>Dr. Karamanski</u> is a Professor of History and Public History Director at Loyola University Chicago where he teaches courses in American Indian History, the Civic War and public history. He was the founder and later director of Loyola's Public History Program. Dr. Karamanski shared a powerful Power Point slide and his extensive knowledge and the remarkable history and contributions of Native Americans.

In February, we were proud and excited to have retired **Chicago Fire Department Deputy District Chief Carmelita Wiley-Earls** as our distinguished guest speaker for our Annual Black History Meeting.

Ms. Wiley-Earls is the first Black and the first woman to serve in this position. Deputy District Chief Wiley-Earls is a lifelong resident of Chicago and has held many positions in the Fire Department. She shared her accomplishments and challenges journey in her career, the many lessons she learned along the way and how she pays it forward. Last year in November, she retired as the only woman holding the position in Fire Suppression.

In March and in honor of Women's History Month, our distinguished guest speaker was **U.S. Senator Tammy Duckworth**. Senator Duckworth addressed concerns about the war in Ukraine and its impact on the U.S; gas prices and inflation; student loan payments (whether they will resume in May), gas prices and inflation; student loan payments (whether they will resume in May), She also talked about the challenges of life as a working mom. Senator Duckworth gave a warm and informative presentation. she has written her memoir, "Every Day is a Gift" in which she shares more of her astonishing story.

In April and in honor of Earth Month, our distinguished guest speaker was **John D. Schaefer**, Arborist Director of Public Works Village of Homewood who discussed, "The Effect and Benefits of Trees on the Environment".

We were given a first-hand account and valuable information on the importance of trees, and the actions we might take to help protect the planet for future generations.

VOTER SERVICES ANNUAL REPORT

September 2021

9/14 – A webinar training was held for voter registrars who planned to participate in the National Voter Registration Day, hosted by the National Voter Registration Day (NVRD) Committee. Several members of the LWV-HF Voter Services Committee were in attendance. The topic of the training was "Talking to Voters on National Voter Registration Day."

9/28 - The Voter Services of the Homewood-Flossmoor League of Women Voters participated in the National Voter Registration Day by registering voters at four libraries in our area: Grande Prairie Library, University Park Library, Olympia Fields Library, and Lansing Library. We were also able to register voters at the Hazel Crest Park District.

January 2022

LWV-HF voter registrars were notified to renew their Deputy Voter Registrar oath, either online or by mail.

April 2022

April 5/7 – Several members of the Voter Service Committee registered for the online Voter Services Round Table. The focus was primarily on candidate forums, and the information shared was invaluable.

April 13 – The Voter Service Committee was invited to partner with Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., and Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., in a Voter Registration Pop-Up at several south suburban high schools. The two-day event culminated with 136 high school seniors registered to vote.

2022 Legislative Interviews

Committee members: Barbara Hayes, Chair; Erin Roeper, Isaac Wiseman, Ruby Donahue, Gina LoGalbo

Annually the League asks local LWV Chapters to conduct interviews with legislators in their districts. This process provides the local leagues an opportunity to develop and/or nurture relationships with our State Representatives. It also lets us know the legislators' opinions on topics representing league positions that may have consequences in future legislative sessions. This year Barbara Hayes coordinated a team of LWV HF members who interviewed two State legislators representing congressional districts in which many of our members reside.

A summary of the interviews follows:

Legislator Interview

April 14, 2022

William Davis 30th District

Environmental Justice

Rep. Davis stated that he would likely support the environmental justice bill. He also said he would like to hear the relevant parties' input when it comes to developments coming into a community. He wasn't gung ho for automatically saying no to certain companies coming into a community, and the number of jobs that a business could bring to the area seemed to be an important factor for him to consider.

Criminal Justice

He supports the SAFE-T Act.

Fiscal Policy

He supports all elements of the Governor's proposed budget but thinks there is more to be done.

Regarding 22-23 budget, he stated that increased funding is included for the items listed on our sheet.

Gun Violence Prevention

The problem with the way guns are stored, he says, is being able to monitor the standards as stated in current law.

With five members participating in this discussion with Rep. Davis, time ran out before we were able to ask other questions.

Legislator Interview

April 18, 2022

Thaddeus Jones 29th District

Environmental Justice

Rep. Jones stated that the House had passed HB4093, which he supported and voted for. He supports Environmental Justice communities having the right to public hearings and refusal of permits for polluting businesses in their neighborhood. The problem, however, is that some communities are not aware of the environmental problems they have OR of they are aware, they do not know what to do about it. He described "fly dumps" in several towns in his district _lots of dumping of waste (tires, scrap metal, etc.) in empty lots. When called, the EPA comes out immediately to dispose of it, he says.

Criminal Justice

He supports the SAFE-T Act, as well as opposing efforts to impose longer .sentences or mandatory sentences.

Fiscal Policy

Regarding the Governor's proposed budget, he says he supports it. The problem is spending the money that has already been allotted. He states that it takes a long time to get the allocated funds where they are supposed to be. He stated that he'd like to see more funding for affordable housing. When asked about money to address the teacher shortage in Illinois, he said he had not thought about that issue and was going to look into it. He seemed satisfied the funding in the budget for early childhood care and education, publicly funded preschool, child welfare, behavioral health and public safety.

Gun-Violence Prevention

He recognizes that there is a huge problem with guns in this state and spoke of passing legislation against the sale of ghost guns.

HB5913 has passed both houses. However, though he personally supports 4839, he says that because there are no co-sponsors, he doesn't feel it's going anywhere. The majority of legislators are not interested in changing the age requirement.

MENTAL HEALTH

He supports the investment in crisis response models that involve mental health and substance use professionals.
