# Preparation for League of Women Voters of Volusia County Annual Meeting Following are some of the issues members will be voting on.

## Readoption of the LWVVC Positions will be addressed at the Annual Meeting.

#### **LWVVC POSITIONS**

Although non-partisan, The League of Women Voters of Volusia County studies many local issues. For state-wide and national issues which the LWVVC also supports, see the LWVF and LWVUS websites. Below is the current list of positions we have taken on these local issues.

#### **COUNTY CHARTER (revised position, adopted April 6, 2013)**

The League of Women Voters of Volusia County:

- Supports protections of the County Charter and its principles, to include monitoring County Council to ensure that the principles are implemented.
- Supports an appointed (rather than elected) sheriff, property appraiser, supervisor of elections, and clerk of courts, all with professional qualifications.

#### LOCAL GOVERNMENT (revised position, adopted April 6, 2013)

The League of Women Voters of Volusia County is concerned about the negative consequences of rapid growth throughout the region. These positions address the goals and processes of comprehensive planning and require coordination among the governments of Volusia County. In order to preserve the quality of life in Volusia County:

- LWVVC supports Volusia County and the municipalities within its borders working together to
  protect the environment while providing reasonable use of the land and restricting the use of
  wetland mitigation.
- LWVVC supports buffering of environmentally sensitive land and water bodies and encourages
  developing open, recreational, and green spaces to enhance and maintain quality of life within
  the county and its municipalities.
- LWVVC supports giving public interest priority regarding the conservation of our natural habitats in Volusia County.
- LWVVC supports increased consideration to potable water issues, including the assurance of clean water, in the Comprehensive Plans of Volusia County and its municipalities.
- LWVVC supports development of effective drainage systems to improve recharge and retention areas and reduce flooding in Volusia County and its municipalities.
- LWVVC encourages Volusia County and its municipalities to work together to direct regional growth in a responsible manner.
- LWVVC supports measures to ensure that any comprehensive plan amendment or rezoning that permits increased residential density may be approved only if adequate public schools can be timely planned and constructed to serve the projected increase in student population.

#### **NATURAL RESOURCES**

<u>Water:</u> The League of Women Voters of Volusia County supports efforts to conserve and protect our water supply as an essential part of ecosystem management. These efforts include:

- The County Council's continued implementation of Volusia County's stormwater management ordinance.
- LWVVC's continued participation in the LWV Coalition to monitor the St. Johns River Water

- Management District.
- LWVVC supports coordinated management to protect Volusia County's aquifer and the recharge area.
- Establishment of a county-wide entity to govern water usage.

#### Stormwater:

- Recognizing that stormwater basins and sub-canal systems cross city/community boundaries,
- LWVVC believes that Volusia County should be primarily responsible for their maintenance.
- LWVVC supports both county and local stormwater fees.
- LWVVC supports continued and expanded use of re-claimed water.
- Local municipalities should include street sweeping in their stormwater management plans to minimize pollution by debris in collection systems and basins.
- In addition to preventing flooding, effective stormwater management plans must provide for:
  - a) reduction of pollutants entering the waterways.
  - b) reduction of desalination of saltwater tributaries in the county.
  - c) reclamation of stormwater to reduce the demands on the aquifer.
  - d) reduction of runoff pollution entering the aquifer.

#### CHILDREN'S SERVICES (revised position adopted 4/24/2010)

The League of Women Voters of Volusia County supports making children's services a top priority in Volusia County with an emphasis on:

- Prenatal health care that includes screenings for maternal and fetal wellbeing; maternal screenings and treatment for social- emotional health and for addictions.
- Comprehensive healthcare for children that includes preventive screenings and timely treatment
  of physical, emotional and behavioral problems.
- Age-appropriate educational programs for children that include access to factual programs in sex education, parenting, child development and addictive substances.

The League of Women Voters of Volusia County supports the following recommendations for local legislative or community action:

- Create a resource center to collect, coordinate and disseminate information about services to children available in Volusia County that will be made available to parents and professionals working with children.
- Require training of all childcare personnel in child development and behavioral interventions.
- Require licensure of all family childcare homes.
- Encourage employers to provide or subsidize childcare for employees.

#### TRANSPORTATION (position adopted 1/10/2015)

The League of Women Voters of Volusia County supports the following recommendations regarding local transportation systems in Volusia County.

- LWVVC supports apportioning sources of land transportation revenue to all forms of transportation and believes it is the responsibility of cities, county, state and federal governments to fund mass transit for Volusia County.
- LWVVC supports safe access to schools, shopping, and neighborhoods through the
  establishment of well-connected walking and bicycling networks as an important component
  for livable communities.
- LWVVC supports extending and improving public transportation in order to create better local

- and regional connectivity.
- LWVVC supports requiring that all public transit stops adhere to Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- LWVVC supports land-use changes that will encourage the use of efficient public transportation.

## **Proposed Bylaw Change Recommendations**

The following change was recommended by the By-laws Committee (Cathy Egley, Chair, Olga Hernandez, and Ann Smith) and approved by the LWVVC Board at its March 15, 2023, meeting. The LWVVC Board recommends approval of this change to the general membership at the May Annual meeting.

Changes are indicated as follows: deletions are in bold and crossed out; additions are underlined in bold. This change reflects what is being done currently.

#### **ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS**

**Section 3. The Vice-Presidents.** The two Vice-Presidents, in the order of their rank, shall in the event of absence, disability or death of the President or both Co-Presidents, assume the office. If no Vice-President is able to serve as President, the Board of Directors shall fill the vacancy from among its elected directors. The Vice-Presidents shall perform such other duties as the President and the Board of Directors may designate. **The President shall assign one of the Vice-Presidents to ensure that permanent archives are maintained, either in print or electronically, to include: official minutes, annual financial reports, incorporation documents, and programs of annual meetings.** 

**Section 4. The Secretary.** The Secretary shall keep the minutes of all meetings of the LWVVC and of the Board of Directors; as well as those of the Annual Meeting, Board Retreat, and such other special meetings as may be deemed official. **The Secretary shall ensure that permanent archives are maintained, either in print or electronically, to include: official minutes, annual financial reports, incorporation documents, and programs of annual meetings. Shall sign, with the President, all contracts and other instruments when so authorized by the Board; and shall perform such other functions as may be incidental to the office.**

## **Nominee Bios**



**Dr. Nicki Junkins** - Born in New Hampshire, Dr. Nicki Junkins moved to Deland with her husband and two sons in 1977. A life-long educator, she served nearly 30 years as math/chemistry teacher and curriculum administrator for Volusia County Schools. She is a former Teacher of the Year at both Deland and Deltona High Schools. Following her retirement from the school system she worked for the College Board as a consultant for large school districts across the country. She holds a doctoral degree in Curriculum and Instruction from UCF. Over the years, she has served as a trustee on the Deland Museum of Art Board, president of Florida Test Administrators Association, member of the Florida Accountability Advisory Committee, and historical tour guide for the West Volusia Historical Society.

Dr. Junkins has been a member of LWVVC for nine years during which time she has served two terms as president as well as treasurer. She is involved in LWVVC action including Voter, Education, Legislative and Media teams and serves as a speaker for our Speakers Bureau. ## Hot Topics - A Review of the 2023 Florida Legislative Session

Maria Pecoraro McCorkle previously spoke to the League on the U.S. Constitution in September, 2022. Maria was one of the law clerks for the Judges of the Fifth District Court of Appeals in downtown Daytona for several years and has taught classes on the Constitution.

By very popular demand, she has been invited back and has agreed to give an overview of the significant legislation passed in the Legislative Session meeting now and ending May 5, 2023. Florida is in the news almost daily mentioning what is happening in Tallahassee. This is a chance to review the results of the session.

As an added bonus, we are partnering with the Volusia Flagler Association for Women Lawyers. This will be a great opportunity you do not want to miss to get up to date on the significant recent changes in Florida's Laws, catch up with other League members, and meet new people.

#### **EDUCATION ACTION TEAM – What is new with charter schools?**

The Education Action Team met Monday, March 20th at 4:000 pm at the VUE Building. The guest speaker was Sandra Tweedy, Volusia schools charter schools coordinator. Accompanying her was Rachel Hazel, deputy superintendent. They were asked to bring the team up to date on the regulations governing charter schools, and how they are administered in Volusia County. There were ten members in attendance, including former school board member, Linda Cuthbert.

#### They heard about:

- Curriculum offerings, how they differ, and assessments
- Teacher and School administrator requirements
- Student accommodation for special needs and contract services provided through the district
- Building safety requirements and meeting hurricane standards

Volusia's charter schools work well with the district and there is much cooperation between the agencies. There are currently 7 charter schools, but Easter Seals, which serves Pre-K, is going to close. Those students will then be served in their appropriate neighborhood school.

All who were present are concerned about the future of traditional public schools and how they can best meet the needs of future students. There was discussion around the financial transparency of charters, hiring practices, student lotteries and waiting lists as well as how students or families can be asked to leave a charter school if there are problems.

Nicki Junkins then briefed the team on her recent participation in Lobby Days in Tallahassee and how Volusia's representation is committed to supporting the new voucher plan contained in HB1 and SB202. Pat Drago shared an article in the Observer regarding the committees in the process of reviewing books under challenge. She asked team members to write the school board members as individuals, not as league members, and asked that they follow the process that was adopted for the purpose of addressing book challenges. If the process needs to be modified, it will be done based on what was learned.

#### **LEGISLATIVE ACTION TEAM – LOBBY DAYS AND UPCOMING MEETING**

Members of the Legislative Action Team were in Tallahassee on March 7 and 8, 2023, to participate in the State League Lobby Days. Nicki Junkins, Nancy Vaughn, Vivian Lord, and Clay Meek were present from Volusia County among 50 to 60 League members from throughout Florida in Tallahassee. On March 7, the State

League gave pointers and suggestions on effective lobbying as well as an overview of pending Florida House and Senate Bills within the State League's four selected priority areas for the year: 1. Voting Rights and Election Reform; 2. Reproductive Health; 3. Education; and 4. Natural Resources.

The Volusia County Team members took the opportunity to watch Legislative Committee hearings. We were able to arrange and attend meetings with several of Volusia County's Legislative delegations to discuss the State League positions on the priority topics as they applied to Volusia County. Countless other organizations and individuals from across Florida were also in Tallahassee attempting to secure any time possible with all Senators and Representatives. Securing time with just one Senator or Representative in that environment was a challenge. However, in a testament to the League's collective voice and influence, Senator Tom Wright and Representatives Chase Tramont, Tom Leek, and Stan McClain all gave time to Volusia County's Legislative team members—your membership in the Volusia County League of Women Voters matters!

## **GROWTH MANAGEMENT ACTION TEAM – Protecting A1A**

The Growth Management Action Team met on March 14th and reviewed the status of various efforts in Volusia communities to address resiliency planning and recovery from Hurricanes Ian and Nicole. The Florida Department of Transportation's A1A Resiliency Plan meeting in Ormond Beach was attended by several members. They discussed and agreed that the recommendations presented served FDOT's primary purpose of protecting A1A but were unsure of the plan's implications for long term sustainability.

Members also discussed the progress being made by the City of New Smyrna Beach on its flooding study which they anticipate will be available to the public in April. Lastly, they learned that the federal government awarded the city of Daytona Beach \$3 million for the Nova Canal Flood Mitigation Study to be conducted by the United States Army Corps of Engineers.

Many overtures being made by the Florida legislature to further minimize the effectiveness of local comprehensive plans and many of the proposed legislative bills are categorized as state preemption of local control by local governments in favor of decision making at the state level.

In lieu of an April GMAT meeting, members are encouraged to attend the April 3 and April 22 League events (see the Calendar at the end of this publication).

## **South Daytona**

Like many local governments, the city is worried about proposed legislation in Tallahassee seeking to diminish home rule. They ask their Delegation to stop these bills.

A development on South Palmetto which was previously approved for a 14-story building has now amended to single family residency. The council found that a tall building would be out of place in a mostly residential area. The original developer never broke ground.

The Small 5+ square mile city is continuing its effort to modernize and provide amenities for its 13,000 citizens. They have stepped up code enforcement efforts to get compliance. They are planning to continue to bury all wiring on Ridgewood/US 1 and have begun their plans to replace all city water meters with more modern technology. A new baseball themed playground was recently inaugurated. Easter egg hunt will be at Reed Canal Park on April 1st. They will hold 'Sparkle Days' on April 14-24 to get residents to dispose of unneeded items, furniture, building material etc. This is done by the city to 'spring clean' the area. The city has also released their new city seal, honoring the old but incorporating the new. The new logo incorporated a new slogan "Small City, Big Possibilities".

## **Port Orange – Port Orange City Council Meetings**

At the January 17<sup>th</sup> meeting, Mayor Don Burnette announced that newly elected Councilwoman Kat Atwood from District 2 resigned her seat effective immediately. In the February 21<sup>st</sup> meeting, after an interview/questioning process, Interim Council Member Tracy Grubbs was selected from six applicants. A Special Election for District 2 to permanently fill the position will be held August 22, 2023.

Residents of Harbor Oaks subdivision expressed concerns about speeding in the neighborhood and requested speed tables on East Bayshore Drive, Main Street, and Riverside Drive. They presented petitions signed by neighbors in support of this modification. City Manager Wayne Clark said that once the traffic study is completed, staff would present options to Council. Currently speed bumps are not allowed by City Ordinance. However, there are other designs to slow traffic that wouldn't require an ordinance change.

Warren Carman, Chairman of the Port Orange Police Pension Board, discussed details of the pension plan. Councilmembers are concerned about the rate of return for the Police Pension Plan.

The council held a Town Hall meeting January 19 to present information on recovery efforts from Hurricane Ian and Tropical Storm Nicole, Riverwalk projects, and the opening of the newly expanded and renovated Port Orange Recreation Center.

Two acres at 662 Herbert Street was rezoned from two-family residential to single-family residential.

The February 28<sup>th</sup> City Council Workshop received an update on the "Utility Rate Study – Water, Wastewater, Reclaimed Water Rates, Miscellaneous Service Changes and Fees, Building Rate Study and Municipal Impact Fees". It has been nine years since the city evaluated water/sewage fees and almost 20 years since the city evaluated impact fees. Consideration of the new fee structures will be presented at the April 18, 2023 City Council meeting.
