Are you ready to vote? The primary election for City Council

candidates is Tuesday, August 8, 2023. The purpose is to select the top 6 candidates who will run in the General Election on Tuesday, November 7 for three (3) Full-Term seats. Terms run from January 1, 2024 to December 31, 2027. There are 9 names on the ballot, and voters may vote for up to 3 candidates. The 6 candidates who have the most votes will run again in the November 7 General Election.

Information on the candidates is found in this nonpartisan Voter Guide. Candidates were invited to provide biographical information and to answer 6 questions. Space restrictions permitted only 3 questions to be printed in this paper Voter Guide. To see the remaining 3 questions, visit VOTE411.org online.

As a lifelong resident and the son of a working class family, I have seen firsthand the changes and challenges we have faced as a city. I watched as our parks were neglected, pushing families to use the facilities of neighboring cities. Since then, our city has grown and the demand for better services has increased.  With over 10 years of community organizing and legislative experience at all levels of government, from my time as a legislative aide at our State Capitol to working for the US House of Representatives with Congresswoman Debbie Dingell, I look forward to using the experience I've gained to serve our city.	Since the launch of our campaign, we have launched a survey asking residents what are the main concerns facing our city. According to our survey, Ordinance violations (blight) and our parks were people's main concerns, amongst others like senior programing and public safety.  We want to ensure our campaign platform is reflective of the needs of our residents and is inclusive of every voice. Our parks have been underfunded and neglected for years. We need to push for federal and state dollars to be allocated for our parks — our families deserve better.	In 2021, when we experienced a historic flood, I welcomed FEMA to the Dearborn Area. I went door to door with them as we surveyed the community to estimate the severity of the damage caused by the flood. At the time, I was a Congressional Liaison for Congresswoman Debbie Dingell.  Serving in that capacity, I quickly learned that our infrastructure, not only as a city but as a country, is crumbling and is in need of major investments. As a city, we can not tackle this issue alone. We need to push our county, state, and federal government to allocate funding for our storm drains and infrastructure.
