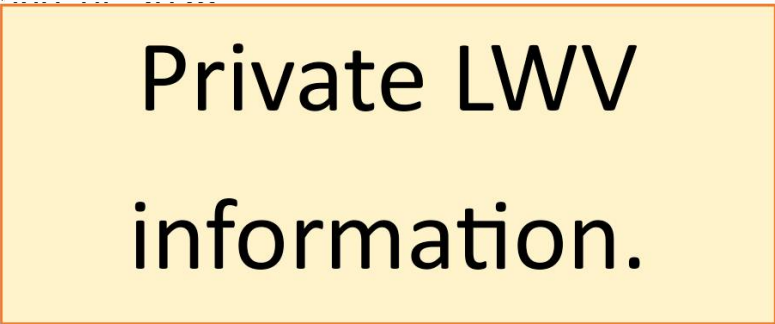

Identify yourself as a League member. People need to know who we are. We work with Promote the Vote, Rise Up and other organizations. We can never ignore the threat to our democracy.

## **Directions to the Board** (what members want our Board to do/address) – Christina Stark

- Linda Priest – Belleville, Romulus, Van Buren Township have a problem with nuclear waste being brought into our communities. July 1<sup>st</sup> court case in Detroit. Carrie will add this request to the July Board agenda to form a committee for this issue. Linda Priest volunteers to join this committee.
- Laura Callow – August 23<sup>rd</sup> is the Women's Equity Luncheon at St. Mary's Cultural and Banquet Center from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Carrie will put the link in The Voter as soon as it becomes available so members can purchase tickets.
- Angela Ryan McWhirter – An automated way to pay for things other than cash/check. It's an expensive way to go if you only need it for one or two things. Carrie and Paula Bowman have this issue at the top of their list.
- Laura Jannika – Do we have a way of capturing our League history? Lena Packer: University of Michigan Bentley Historical Library collects our history. Lifetime member Roberta Young, a Lifetime Member, will photograph her parade memorabilia from 1960s marches, to become part of our stored record.
- Christina Stark – Carrie and Christina have been attending training sessions with Mobilize entitled Rise for Freedom (see National Chapter site for more information). Topics include digital security, staying safe at public demonstrations/peaceful marches, deescalating confrontations. What can we do to transfer this information to our membership? July 17 Zoom meeting is the next such meeting. Carrie will put the link in The Voter.
- Amy Kudlinski – We need to be on social media (not just FaceBook). Young adults are on TikTok and Instagram. Carrie: We can appoint Board members for a specific focus. One of those could chair a technology committee. Laura

## **PROPOSED PROGRAM 2026-2027**

Women Defend Democracy: Democracy Under Siege” platform , as recommended by LWVUS, was moved by the Program Committee and approved by the Board at the January 21, 2026, meeting and submitted to LWVUS the same month. This campaign will focus on voting rights, election protection, redistricting, individual liberties, immigration and the Presidency.

LWVUS Program consists of three parts:

Action to implement League Principles;

- Study or concurrence on a governmental issue to develop new Positions or to update existing Positions; and,
- Action on government issues.

The League has already embarked on a Women Defend Democracy campaign to continue our work to protect and expand voting rights and hold accountable those who seek to undermine democratic principles and processes. In the next biennium, it is even more important for us to join together to engage and mobilize voters across the country to oppose attacks that strike at the very core of our democracy and democratic institutions. By building on Women Defend Democracy and our decade of accomplishments under the Campaign for Making Democracy Work, we will be well positioned to take action in these exceptionally challenging times.

The six prongs of the proposed program include:

- Voting Rights
- Election Protection
- Redistricting
- Individual Liberties
- Immigration
- The Presidency

## MEMBERSHIP 2026 ANNUAL REPORT

Comparing membership rosters from March 2025 to today's roster (April 2026), there's been a loss of about 15 members over the last year. We are currently at 120 members including our 4 lifetime members.

- Our membership breaks down as follows:
  - Belleville and Van Buren Township 11
  - Canton 25
  - Livonia 19
  - Northville 15
  - Plymouth 30
  - Redford and Redford Township 3
  - Wayne 3
  - Westland 7
  - Out of area 7
  
- Since coming on board as Membership Chair, 5 Orientation sessions were held at Grand Traverse Pie Company in Plymouth, MI. Three (3) during July-October 2025 and two (2) so far in January and February 2026. A new member will receive a Welcome email from the Membership Chair that includes an invitation to the next scheduled Orientation session. A second invitation will follow if they were not able to attend. Our President also sends a Welcome note to each new member.
  
- We did have 21 new members since June of 2025. New members are always enthusiastic to share their stories about why they join and what they hope to get out of their participation.
  
- Renewals do continue each month. Many of our members use ChapterSpot while others may require optional methods (verbal renewals with Treasurer and mail in of checks). Recently some renewing members are selecting the AUTO-RENEW function at renewal. Typically, notification of pending expiration of membership is sent via email to the member by LWV NWW; renewal reminders are also sent by LWVUS.

- An important upgrade within the LWW community was the launch of the ChapterSpot Membership Portal in February 2025. Every member has their own Member Portal and this is where members go to update contact information and profile, view past payments, renew their membership, access the LWWN website, and access VOTE411.

It is worth noting that additional upgrades are under discussion including:

1. **An explanation of the terms:** the addition of a link to explain in more detail what a member is agreeing to by adding a payment method.
2. **Changes screen:** An additional screen will be added to the portal for League leaders to see member contacted information that has been recently edited.
3. **League Stats screen:** An additional screen will be added to the portal for League leaders to see statistics related to their League, particularly demographic information.

# VOTER SERVICES 2026 ANNUAL REPORT

## **CANDIDATE FORUMS**

Candidate forums were held in Livonia, Westland, Plymouth, and Belleville in the month of July 2025 for the November 2025 municipal elections. The Livonia, Westland, and Belleville forums were virtual forums. Due to the number of candidates running in Livonia, we had two forums. Because there were 19 candidates, we split them into two groups. One zoom forum started at 6 PM and the other started at 7:30 PM. The Plymouth forum was in-person. ## **PERMANENT MAIL TEXT BANK PROJECT**

The Voter Service Team also participated in the LWVMI permanent text banking project. The project required us to send text messages via a specific website to individuals who voted in the 2020 election but not in the 2024 election. LWV NWW produced a short video providing instructions on how to submit the text messages. The video was shared with other Leagues. LWV NWW members who participated in the project received Zoom training and were given a copy of the video in the event they needed additional support. ## VOTER REGISTRATION 2026 ANNUAL REPORT

Over the last year, the Voter Registration committee was busy with multiple voter registration/ information drives. The League had a table at the Schoolcraft College School Daze event on September 22-23, 2025. Over the two days, LWV members distributed information about voting and the LWV. They also registered 12 individuals to vote. Of the 7 LWV members who worked at the event, three had not previously worked a voter registration drive.

In December 2025, the LWV of Northwest Wayne County chapter received a \$750 grant through the LWV US for a Youth Voter Registration Project. The grant supports our voter engagement efforts at five community colleges and high schools from January – June 2026. We used the funds to purchase supplies for voter registration events.

On January 27-28, 2026, the League had a table at the Schoolcraft College School Daze Winter Bash. Over the two days, we promoted the LWV and registered three students to vote.

On March 16, 2025, our LWV chapter partnered with the National Honor Society Chapter of Garden City High School. This was a new high school for our chapter. We talked with over 45 students and registered 3 students to vote. Of the two LWV members who worked at the event, one had not previously worked a voter registration drive.

As we wrap up the year, our LWV chapter will hold a voter registration/information drive on May 12<sup>th</sup> in partnership with the National Honor Society of Wayne Memorial High School. This is the third year our chapter has partnered with Wayne Memorial on this event.

Additionally, voter registration/information drives are planned at the three high schools which make up the Plymouth-Canton Educational Park – Canton, Plymouth and Salem – on May 19<sup>th</sup>. These are new high schools for our chapter.

## REPORT OF THE TREASURER

This has been a transition year for the LWV NW Wayne County treasury not only because there is a new treasurer (me) following in the footsteps of Susan Rowe, who expertly filled this role for many years, but because our entire system of dues has been changed.

Instead of collecting dues directly from members and then sharing portions with the state and national Leagues, all dues are now paid to the national League who disburses the allocations immediately. This online system has been a challenge for local and state treasurers as well as the members, who have had to learn to make their dues payments online. After almost a year of operation, we are all getting used to it and it has indeed accomplished the goal of making treasurer tasks easier. I am grateful to our Membership Director, Christina Stark, with whom I have worked to iron out roster problems and resolve dues issues.

Dues from members are recommended at \$75 per year, but if necessary, dues to join the League can be as little as \$20. Overall, our per-member dues is more with the new system than the old. Additionally, many members have generously added contributions when they renew their dues. This source of income, along with other independent contributions from members, has allowed us to further the mission of the League with voter education projects.

Earlier this year, our books for the previous year – July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025 – were ‘peer reviewed’ by member David Baughman. He indicated the receipts and expenses all matched with our financial statements but did indicate some reasonable suggestions regarding the allocation of expenses to more than one account. We appreciate the time David took to help us improve our financial records.

On a regular basis, I attend the quarterly treasurer meetings conducted by the LWVMI Leadership. I joined the Treasurer Network interest group created by LWVUS, from whom I receive many daily messages. I also attend the monthly “Framing the Future” meetings offered by the LWVUS online portal team. All of these resources provide excellent directions and learning opportunities from other League treasurers.

The NW Wayne County League has a treasury that is solid because of the donations of our members, grants from LWVMI and LWVUS, and also because we are a frugal organization. The Board takes great care in

spending our League's money and carefully strategizes to make certain that the funds are being used to further the mission of the League.

## President's Activity Report: July 2025-June 2026

The Northwest League and I have had another busy and somewhat crazy year. As events unfolded in Washington D.C. and indeed around the world, we responded to the onslaught of acts determined to undermine our democracy. I am very proud of the women and men of our League who stepped up their participation defending democracy and empowering voters. Our League joined the Unite and Rise movement to fight back. LWVUS issued a call to push back against the constitutional crisis we now find ourselves in. We have stepped up in the following ways:

- Formally joined the Unite and Rise movement, including training and meetings.
- An advocacy committee was formed and is responding to actions that need us to speak up.
  1. Wayne Co. Resolution in Support of Local Democracy, which was in response to the DPOC ( Documented Proof of Citizenship).
