National Program Planning By Michelle Fell

League members met on Sunday, January 21st to review and discuss the 2018-2020 Program as submitted by the LWVUS Board. The LWVUS Board recommends that Program 2018-2020 continue The Campaign for Making Democracy Work, which includes the following areas of emphasis: Voting Rights, Improving Elections, Campaign Finance Laws/Campaign Finance Reform and Redistricting. After a robust and far-reaching discussion, the group reached consensus on supporting the Program, with the following suggestions: 1. Under 'Improving Elections', ensure that paper ballots are maintained as a verifiable backup system in every election. 2. Under 'Voting Rights', continue to oppose the concept of an 'Election Integrity System', such as the one that was put in place in 2017 (since disbanded), and any actions that would create a similar system under a different name.

In addition to discussion on the National Program, the group reached consensus on recommending support for the Palos Verdes Peninsula/ San Pedro League's proposal for a new national study on the economic, social and policy implications of the use of artificial intelligence (AI), to be presented at the 2018 National Convention. Results of the meeting will be presented to the LWVHC Board at the February Board meeting.

League members will meet on Thursday, February 15th at 5:30 in the second floor conference room of the A1AA building, 434 7th Street in Eureka to review and discuss 2018-2019 State and Local Program Planning. Please bring your 2017 Annual Meeting Kit. Information on LWVC positions can be found at lwvc.org. Additional information will be provided prior to the State/Local Program Planning meeting.

Come to the State of the Community Luncheon on April 20, 2018!

This April 20, at the State of the Community Luncheon, we will honor NAMI Humboldt (National Alliance on Mental Illness) along with Betty Diehl and the Ferndale Choir for their contributions to the well being of our community. The luncheon will take place at the Adorni Center in Eureka with seating at 11:30. Information about tickets, which much be purchased in advance, may be found on our webpage and in the next Voter.

NAMI Humboldt is part of a national, grassroots mental health organization dedicated to building better lives for those affected by mental illness. It's an all volunteer group started here in the 1970s by a few parents whose young adult children had been recently diagnosed with serious mental illness. Several years later they became part of the national organization and continued to bring support, awareness, advocacy and hope to Humboldt County residents though an ongoing series of support groups in Eureka, Fortuna and Redway as well as an annual 12 week class for family members. Family to Family is an evidenced based program taught by trained volunteers that significantly improves the coping and problem solving skills of the people closest to a person with a mental illness. Research has shown if family and friends stay involved in their lives, there is a much better prognosis for that person. NAMI has been instrumental in establishing an annual crisis intervention training program (CIT) which helps first responders, including law enforcement, intervene appropriately when mental illness is part of the situation. NAMI has also donated over \$2,000 for books related to mental health for local libraries, and they provide holiday gifts annually for about 100 residents of mental health facilities.

In 2016, NAMI Humboldt and the League jointly organized a well attended workshop on Criminal Justice and Mental Illness, bringing together local leaders to discuss problems and solutions to the fact many people behind bars are there as a result of untreated mental illness. Mary Lou Lowry a League member who helped organize this workshop, nominated NAMI as a recipient of our award this year and said: I have personally been impressed with the many volunteers who give so much time even when some are dealing with a mental health crisis at home. Their commitment to improving our community is inspiring.
