

Wanda Wahlund to be Honored with Civic Contribution Award





Wanda's many activities add up to the creation of community. In Freshwater, where she lives, she is a long-time member of the Freshwater Community Guild (formerly the Grange). These folks raise funds to keep the Grange open for activities including a senior exercise program and social events that bring the community together. They recently raised thousands of dollars

for speed humps for Freshwater School, which is located where two busy thoroughfares meet. She has been active and served as an officer, in groups that support youth scholarships, including Quota Club, a service organization which, among other projects, awards scholarships to high school students who have shown a love of community service. Quota Club also helps support a transitional residence in Blue Lake that takes in young women who are recovering from substance abuse issues. The group also contributes monthly to Launch Pad, a local program for youth facing challenges. She served as president and led various projects for the Cattlewomen's Association, which offers scholarships for high schoolers interested in going into agriculture.

Wanda is also instrumental in the local sales of See's Candy, based at the Discovery Shop in Eureka, raising funds for cancer patients to help with their lodging when they must travel for treatment. She is the kind of neighbor we all would be glad to have.

LWVHC ENCOURAGES YOUTH AT HUMBOLDT COUNTY HISTORY DAY

For several years, our League of Women Voters has been supportive of the Humboldt County History Day by giving awards to selective students who have presented excellent projects about voting or about impressive and influential women. The topic for National History Day this year was "Breaking Barriers in History." At Humboldt County History Day on February 29, two League volunteers looked at all the individual and group high school and middle school exhibits, and chose eight projects to award. The topics included Suffrage, Katherine Johnson, Malala, Billie Jean King, Sandra Day O'Connor, Jane Addams, Helen Keller and Dolores Huerta. We were very impressed with the quality of so many of the exhibits. Students that we honored were Ella Manthorne, Taylor Nada, Cadence Corell, Maelah Hanshaw, Willa Osborne, Sierra Sobota, Genevieve Caruso, Sophia Rosales, Sarah Privat and Bodhi Jennings.

Students in all areas -- posters, exhibits, websites, papers, performances and documentaries, who were selected to go on to the state competition will receive digital coaching from the History Day Team, and the state competition will be conducted digitally because of the coronavirus and will not include student interviews. In the past the League has awarded monetary scholarships to help defray travel costs to students whose projects fit our mission, but because of the coronavirus, there will be no travel.

Our League of Women Voters serves as the Election Board for the Bear River Band of the Rohnerville Rancheria, and as I write this we have completed the second mailing for the March 28, 2020, regular election. Our work includes preparing and mailing a first notice of the election citing the positions open for election allowing voters to file and intent to run as well as a request for an absentee ballot. The second notice lists all those who are running for a position and an absentee ballot for those who have requested one. These two mailings, one at the end of January and one at the beginning of March, require a large work party to prepare all the priority flat rate envelopes with the appropriate materials in them. I want to thank all the willing Leaguers who came to my house on two different days to spend an afternoon stuffing envelopes! Thank you to Janine Randall, Judy Bennett, Charmin Bailey, Debbe Hartridge, Nan Nieboer, Patricia-Anne WinterSun, Joan Williams, Ally Kennedy, Peg Gardner, Willa Mauro, Ann Diehl, and Jennifer Jenkins. I appreciate every one of you! I also want to thank Brittany Gonzalez, Bear River executive secretary, who helped us mail all the packets through the tribal postage machine, even coming back to work after hours on March 6, so we could finish the job. Thank you, Brittany!

Also, congratulations to the Bear River Election Committee. For the last few elections, the Tribal Council has also appointed an Election Committee of tribal members who are also League members. Charmin Bailey, Ally Kennedy and Jennifer Jenkins serve on that Committee this year and they have been working with me on the election. Not only have they helped with the mailings, but they put together candidate forums for all the candidates for the positions of member-at-large, treasurer, and chairperson. Because of the coronavirus recommendations, they arranged for IT Technician Christian Pehl to video cast the four and a half hour event to Facebook so that people could watch from home and not go out to a crowded venue. Congratulations to the Election Committee for arranging home viewing for tribal members! Thanks and congratulations to Ally Kennedy for doing a great job as moderator of the forums, to Charmin Bailey as an accurate timekeeper and to Jennifer Jenkins for becoming an excellent question sorter very quickly! Thank you, too, to Carol Masterson and Patricia-Anne WinterSun for acting as consultants to the Election Committee members as they made their debut with candidate forums.

Flash: For the first time ever, the **Avenue of the Giants Marathon** has been **canceled**. The Forest Service canceled the date. It was the only sensible alternative because so many people traveled great distances to get here and travelling is out of the question now.

Thank you to all the faithful who had signed up to work the aid station for the League of Women Voters. They tell us it may be rescheduled in October. We'll let you know.
