President's Message

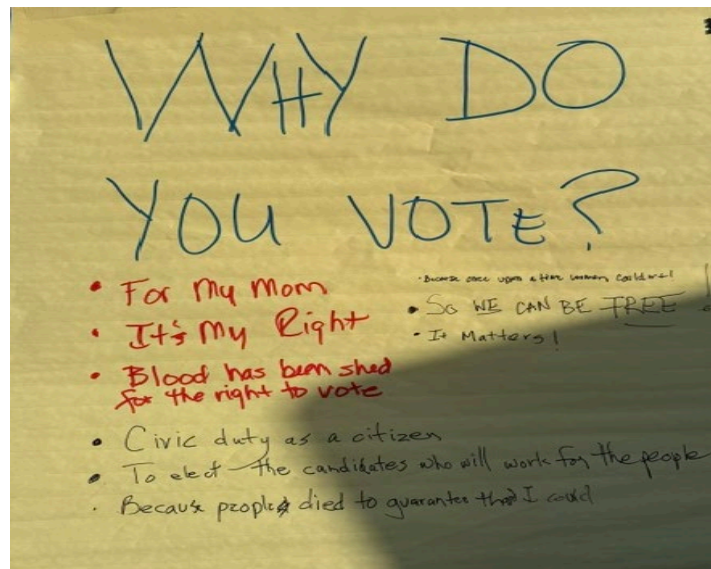
Whew! We made it through a very HOT summer! Now for our Second Summer – bet the tempts will be better; at least I hope so!

DID YOU KNOW...?

...that **Governor Healey** has appointed a Heat Resilience Officer, charged with implementing strategies to help the towns and cities of the Commonwealth prepare for heat-related climate challenges? **Katie Schlick**, as the state's first Heat Resilience Officer, will report to the Massachusetts Climate Change Chief in the Department of Public Health. Her salary has been fully funded by the [Boston Foundation](#). Commonwealth Beacon [reports](#) that, according to a press release from Governor Healey, Ms. Schlick will "prepare for rising temperatures, protect public health and reduce the impacts of extreme heat..." Those impacts include dangers to water supplies, agricultural losses, and illnesses. Massachusetts is the second state in the nation—second to Arizona—to establish such a position.

....that one more plank in the LWVMA's *Defending Democracy Against Federal Threats* platform—An Act Prioritizing Patient Access to Care—was signed into law by **Governor Healey** on August 10? This law protects the privacy of the doctor-patient relationship regarding decisions about abortion care later in pregnancy. Two more bills supported by the LWVMA and the LWVCCA were also signed into law in August—the PROTACT Act and the Freedom to Read Act. LWVCCA Legislative Committee Chair **Suzanne Brock** has more information on these laws—see her [Legislative Committee report](#).

....that LWVMA was the leader of a coalition of voting rights organizations which successfully sued to block the President's executive order restricting mail-in voting? The LWVMA was joined in the lawsuit by LWVUS, Association of Americans Resident Overseas, U.S. Vote Foundation, Asian Pacific American Advocates (OCA), and Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. The coalition was represented in court by the ACLU, the ACLU of MA, Brennan Center, and others. LWVMA's Executive Director **Celia Canavan** applauded the court decision and affirmed the League's commitment to protecting voting rights. Go, LWVMA!!

There is a ballot question for Cape Cod Voters. It is in addition to the 9 questions presented to all Massachusetts Voters in November. It reads, "Shall a charter study commission be created to study the present governmental structure of Barnstable County to consider and make findings concerning the form of government and make

recommendations thereon?" See the [Barnstable County website](#) for more information.

Commonwealth

The League of Women Voters of Massachusetts took the following positions on the 2026 Ballot Questions being presented to Massachusetts voters.

Support:

- Election Day Registration
- Law to Improve Access to Public Records
- Zoning of single-family homes

Oppose:

- Firearms repeal referendum
- repeal/Vote YES to retain the law
- Limiting State Tax Collection Growth and Returning Surpluses to Taxpayers
- Reducing the State Personal Income Tax Rate from 5% to 4%

Take No Position:

- Implement All-Party State Primaries
- An Act to reform and regulate legislative stipends
- Nature for All Fund
- Protect Tenants by Limiting Rent Increases
- Labor Relations Policies for Committee for Public Counsel Services Employees
- Recriminalize marijuana

HEALTH COMMITTEE

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

Hi Members:

This just in from Jen Muroff from the LWVMA regarding /State League sponsored legislation. Much of our LWVCCA followed legislation is similar. I was holding off until the 31st of July to sum up our bills when the session ends; however, with the new rule changes lawmakers can vote on bills past July 31 as long as conference committee talks start before then. It won't be fully clear until Jan. 5, 2027, when the books officially close on the 2025-2026 legislative session, whether that deadline tweak results in more new laws and a smoother process — or if, instead, the last-minute frenzy gets pushed further down the calendar.

Keep your fingers crossed on those bills still in Ways & Means or Joint Committees.

Update on Legislation to date:

Thanks to your advocacy, we are pleased to report the following legislative wins to date as well as offer an update on where things stand in the final days of the formal session. This information is up to date as of July 31.

LWVMA Legislative Wins to date – I have included, in parenthesis, whether any bills also were covered by LWVCCA

The following bills have been enacted into law:

An Act strengthening health care protections in the Commonwealth, or Health Care Shield Act 2.0 (also LWVCCA)

A joint resolution to rescind all previous legislative calls for an Article V convention to amend the U.S. Constitution (also LWVCCA)

The following bills have passed both chambers and are now awaiting Governor Healey's signature.

H.5620 - PROTECT ACT (immigrants' rights) (Includes 2 LWVCCA bills)

H.5595 – An Act prioritizing patient access to care (abortion decisions between doctor and patient) (Includes LWVCCA)

S.2726 - An Act regarding free expression (outlaws book bans) (also LWVCCA)

The following bills passed both chambers and are now in conference committee. They may emerge between now and January 5, 2027, and be signed into law.

HB.4746 - MA Consumer Data Privacy Act (data privacy/location shield). (also LWVCCA)

H.868/S.507 – An Act improving campaign finance reporting by state ballot question committees. (also, LWVCCA)

The following measures were included in the FY'26 budget and we are advocating for them to be included in the FY'27 budget as well:

Immigrant Legal Defense Fund \$5M (also LWVCCA) (\$7M – FY '27)

Civics Education \$2.5M (same amount FY '27)

Access to Counsel \$2.5M (also LWVCCA) (\$3M – FY '27)

For those curious about how our top priorities from Day on the Hill have fared:

Elections and Voting

H.834/S.505, An Act establishing same day registration of voters (also LWVCCA)

STATUS: Sent to study in House; alive in Senate; unlikely to pass. LWVMA supports the Election Day Registration ballot measure. Stay tuned for updates on how you can get involved in the ballot question campaign.

Immigration

H.2580/S.1681, An Act to protect the civil rights and safety of all Massachusetts residents (Safe Communities Act) STATUS: Included as part of the PROTECT ACT (see above) (also LWVCCA)

H.1588/S.1122, An Act relative to immigration detention and collaboration agreements (Dignity not

Deportations) STATUS: Immigrants' rights have morphed into PROTECT ACT (see above) also LWVCCA)

H.1954/S.1127, An Act ensuring access to equitable representation in immigration proceedings (Immigrant Legal Defense Fund) STATUS: Funded at \$5M in FY26 budget; likely funded at \$7M in FY27 budget; also \$1M in supplemental budget (also LWVCCA)

LWVCCA – three of our Holtec bills (bills associated with the closing of Pilgrim Nuclear Power) are still in committee, **S.356**, An Act Relative to Monitoring Dry Casts of Spent nuclear fuel, **S.540**, Preventing Discharge of Radioactive Nuclear Materials, and **S.2680**, An Act to Improve Public Health around Aging Nuclear Power Plants.

Transportation

HB.5276/SB.2876, An Act to Establish Commuter Rail to Cape Cod - in Ways & Means. Senator Fernandes is pushing for the Senate version but since there is money involved, I am not too hopeful.

We were not successful with Medicare for All or Death with Dignity. Parity on Boards for Women also did not prevail as well as the bill to eliminate, or at least deal with, PFAS in our environment and water. Needless to say, we will be refiling many bills again in the new session beginning after the first of the year.

Fall will be busy. The primaries are almost upon us. For those of you who are able and interested, contact your Town Halls and look into being a Poll Worker or a Poll Monitor. And, make sure you pay attention to the ballot questions in the November 2026 election. The Secretary of State will produce his traditional "Red Book" with explanations and wording of the ballot questions. Read them before you go to the polls in November. There are 9 questions. The League supports #'s 1, 4, 7 and 9. We oppose #5 and we have no position on #'s 2, 3, 6 and 8. Lots to think about!

Finally, for those of you who may be interested, Kalliope Chute, one of our members and a member of the Legislative Committee, owns a Sea Food Farm with her husband in Provincetown. For sure they raise oysters, but what else do they do? Join us on October 1st to learn more. Interested members will be given a tour of the farm beginning at 9:00 am followed by a discussion regarding the issues facing these types of businesses. More to follow!

Thank you, members for your support when called on. If any of you are interested in joining the Legislative Committee for the new year, please let me know. And Legislative Committee members, thank you all as well. I would not be able to do this job without your support.

VOTER SERVICE COMMITTEE

As the summer heated up through July and August, the League also felt the heat to encourage registered voters to get out and vote in primaries and in November. With concerns about potential voter intimidation and potential changes to mail in ballots and numerous ballot measures, the league is doubling its efforts to inform voters about primary dates, contested elections, when to hand in mail-in ballots, and how to learn about candidates (Vote411.org). At most events this summer we have been passing out information cards (thank you Karen Mazza) where all the information is available on this one card.

July started for our LWVCCA chapter with the 4th of July parade in Barnstable, where numerous League members marched in their new LWVCCA T-shirts. See further details in the Summer 2026 Voter Issue.

Following the 4th of July Amplify POC came on July 11th at the Hyannis Green. The event ran from 12 to 4pm. Rosemary Shields, Carol Young-Kleinfeld and Bonnie Lilienfeld set up the voter service table handed out voter information cards and of course spoke with every passerby about whether they are registered and do they know about the primaries coming up quickly. As we have noted in the past, very infrequently do we find anyone that is not registered, though some may be honest enough to admit they "do not always vote, especially in the spring elections." It was an enjoyable afternoon with music, food and numerous people coming by on very beautiful summer day.

The following week (July 18th) Rosemary Shields and Judy Kelleher set up a table at a very lively event that took place on the inside of the busy rotary at Salt Pond Visitor Center in Eastham. This event was not put on by the State Park Visitor Center but was but on

by the group Good Trouble Lives on – John Lewis Legacy the Voting Rights. People lined the rotary with signs to push people to vote this fall and the response was overwhelmingly positive with horns and happy shout-outs. There were a number of informational tables along with our LWVCCA voter service table in the center grass area. Less people were parking and visiting the tables than car horns blowing, but we had quite a few visitors. We were in good company with Indivisible Cape Cod with a table to the right of ours. On the other side was free ice cream which might have helped increase the number of people. A number of League members came by including Debbie Winnick with her grandson and her puppy. The mood was certainly festive and there was a feeling of positivity that people were indeed intent on getting out the vote for the primaries and for November's general election.

On the 7th of August the League set up two tables for Unity Day that was held this year outside the Hyannis Youth and Community Center. We used this event to also celebrate the National League's Unite and Rise for Voting Rights event, which is nationally celebrated on the 8th of August. Lynne Pleffner (LWVCCA President) handled one table to advocate for voting rights and involve people to discuss why they vote and their plans for voting, while the Voter

Service Table set up again by Rosemary Shields, Judy Kelleher, Bonnie Lilienfeld and Carol Young-Kleinfeld continued to push voter education and registration. This was a very festive and enjoyable event. Everyone again was registered, that we spoke with but perhaps needed a bit of a push to vote in primaries and the general elections. It was a very hot afternoon but there were events, such as police dog training, inside the Community Center that allowed you to get out of the heat. These events allow the League to meet with various communities on Cape.

On the 15th of August the Voter Service Committee set up a table next to the Barnstable Historical Society Table at the West Barnstable Village Festival. This event provided an event map for there were activities happening simultaneously throughout the town. In our area next to Lombard Field, was the food, the historical society, a farm stand, a dunk tank for the brave elected officials (The present Attorney General Galibois was dunked in a full black suit. It was also the music venue. Across the street sits the Whelden Library, where many tables of crafts and baked goods were set up surrounding the building. The event was busy with people from the very start at 10 am and did not slow down till around 2 pm. Rosemary Shields, Carol Young-Kleinfeld and Judy Kelleher tended the table and met numerous registered voters who were very clear that they did not need any reminding about getting out to vote. They were certain already set on

which candidates they would vote for. We passed out numerous stickers stating, “Bad Politicians are Elected by Good People who Don’t Vote.” In case people did not know, we reminded everyone that the League is non-partisan but want to hold forums and events to ensure information is available on each candidate.

Youth Service Committee

The Youth Service (YS) Committee is starting 2026-27 under new leadership. Carol Woodbury and Patricia Anderson are the new co-chairpersons, attempting to fill the remarkable shoes of Karen Mazza who recently retired from this position. This is a tall order, but Karen will remain on the YS Committee to help us guide members to continue and improve the key projects that she spearheaded over the past 13 years. Our projects focus on two primary goals: 1.) To support high school voter registration and encourage informed participation in elections at the local, state, and national levels; and 2.) To support student-led civics projects which are

required as part of the 2018 Massachusetts Civics Education Legislation.

The committee met in June to identify the specific projects we would implement this school year to support those goals. For high school voter registration, the Youth Service Committee works with the Voter Service Committee to conduct voter registration during the Cape Cod 5 sponsored Credit for Life Fair at each of the Cape high schools. As of last year, the bank included our League station at the fair on the students, Passport Card as one of the **required** stops. LWVCCA members assist students to verify their voting status with the Office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth or provide a registration application and assistance. League members provide voter education to students through two non-partisan documents that help them research their selection of candidates and also think about how their vote affects their financial future. All students receive printed business cards with the QR code for these documents.

Through multiple grant awards, the YS Committee expanded outreach to seniors in several high schools last spring to prepare them to vote by creating a graduation card that lists important dates and procedures for the September Primary and November Election, information on the options for voting and how to research ballot choices. In addition, a *High School Voter Registration Toolkit*, which provides a guide for high schools to involve students in promoting voter registration and education in their schools, with League assistance, was also developed. The distribution of graduation cards and collaborating with schools to offer student-involved voter registration and education will be refined and expanded in the coming year.

To support the student-led civics projects, YS Committee members will continue to serve as community advisors at Civics Showcases where student groups in Grade 8 & 11 present and display their projects in May and June at the state regional and local school showcases. Community advisors listen to the student presentations, ask questions about their work, offer helpful feedback, and congratulate them on their efforts. The

purpose of these projects is to help students learn to care about civic issues and practice the skills of being change agents. To this end, the YS Committee will be updating two resources posted on the LWVCCA Website for use by students and their district advisors: *Cape Cod Civic Resource Directory for Student-Led Civics Projects* and *Cape Cod Civic Advocacy Guide: Understanding Your Government and How to Influence It*.

In the past few months, the YS Committee has welcomed several new members. Committee work typically includes no more than 1-2 meetings a year. The greatest need is for participation in voter registration and civics project showcase events throughout the year as schedules permit. Other League members are encouraged to join us whenever you can and to help enlist community volunteers who are willing to participate in these in-school events. So even if you can't commit to being a member of the YS Committee, you can support our work by participating in local and regional civics showcases or Credit for Life events.
