The deadline to RSVP and pay is December 1. If you received confirmation of your RSVP, we have your reservation. Iowa legislators will give their forecast for the 2024 legislative session. All of Johnson county's legislators have been invited. Members will have an opportunity to ask questions at the event or if you have questions now, email them to our Advocacy chair, Shannon Patrick. Shannon will emcee the program.

The political Presidential primaries will kick off the new year. Both major parties will hold caucuses on January 15, which is a federal holiday in recognition of Martin Luther King Jr. You must be registered with the party you want to caucus with. The last month has been a quiet one for the Advocacy Committee. We have continued to prepare for the next legislative session and, more pressingly, for our December member meeting and legislative preview.

A number of us were also able to join the LWVIA's November 16th online legislative preview. This excellent presentation was led by the League's lobbyist, Amy Campbell, and also featured speakers on different League priorities and legislators who joined the event and added their own expertise. Many of the themes were familiar, but there were also a number of specific and useful facts and talking points that we expect to make use of. LWVJC Voter Services organized and hosted 7 candidate forums to help inform voters as they prepare themselves to vote in the 2023 general election. The League hosts forums for contested races only, so this year that led to hosting the Iowa City city council primary forum, followed by 5 city council forums in Lone Tree, Hills, Tiffin, North Liberty and Iowa City. We also partnered with the ICCSD Districtwide Parent Organization to sponsor the school board candidate forum.

#### THE LWV UPPER MISSISSIPPI RIVER REGION INTER LEAGUE ORGANIZATIO

## **UMRR-ILO**

The LWV Upper Mississippi River Region InterLeague Organization which represents local leagues from Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Illinois, (and currently working with Missouri) is a member of the Mississippi River Network with 68 other groups across the nation. Our representation has grown from 40 member organizations to the current 68 members since I have been your representative beginning in 2019. Because you belong to the LWV, you are also a member of the LWV UMRR-ILO. MRN's policy goal is to advance federal and state policies that promote just, equitable and resilient communities through protecting and restoring ecosystem form and function, reducing impacts of agricultural and urban runoff pollution, and defending bedrock environmental legislation.

The MRN annual meeting was held in October in Memphis. The meeting included planning for the upcoming year including policy, engagement, involvement and development. We heard from MRN staff about their equity work and discussed the equity work in our communities. We discussed and approved the 2024 policy priorities, learned about federal funding and received an update on the Mississippi River Region Initiative. We also discussed education and outreach details for 2024 and how one can participate.

At the meeting, I met an Illinois farmer who is working for the government helping teach farmers sustainable methods and Codi Sharkey, the new education director at the National Mississippi Museum. It's fun to network and I hope both of these new friends will do programs for us in the future. It is always good to interact and share!

We left the meeting full of new information and a mission to increase membership and raise funds so we can continue to develop new ideas and people to protect and sustain our Mississippi River. We have a new direction for our Mississippi Days of Action and celebrating the river. Our goal is to bring in more groups and create educational opportunities to allow for better understanding and more interaction.

The Mississippi River is truly America's River. It is the third largest River in the world, it provides drinking water for over 20 million people, it is a diverse habitat for wildlife and the backbone of our economy. Along with weak enforcement of water laws, pollution from farms and factories, fertilizers and untreated sewage, our great River is in decline. Together we can protect the river for future generations.

What updated news do you have about our environment? Did you know Iowa City's landfill/recycling received one of President Biden's initiated grants for over 4 million dollars? Did you know that the same initiative is helping Victor, Iowa get drinkable water? Much of Iowa's water is too high in nitrates which makes the water unhealthy to drink. Did you know that only about 4% of Iowa's water wells are safe drinking wells and many wells being tested have too high a level of PFAS? So many things are happening for and against our environment. I'm glad I can help. Contact me for more information or ways to get involved.

## LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS\* OF IOWA 2024 Public Policy Priorities

#### 

Promote equal access to voting and ensure all votes are counted. Adopt automatic voter registration. Enact ranked choice voting. Pass a constitutional amendment allowing lowans with felony convictions to vote after time served.

#### 📥 TRANSPARENCY & CITIZENSHIP

Demand government accountability and transparency by requiring all amendments and bills discussed in committee to be available to the public prior to a vote. Demand timely processing of Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests. Encourage direct citizen participation by continuing virtual committee and subcommittee meetings. Preserve gender balance requirements for state boards and commissions.

## EDUCATION

Increase oversight and track public funds being used for non-public schools. Require any non-public school receiving public funds to meet the same standards as public schools. Fully fund public schools. Continue to expand access to affordable childcare and four-year-old preschool.

### **FE REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS**

Guarantee access to the full range of women's reproductive health services. Make contraception available without prescription. Ensure Medicaid services are comprehensive and accessible. Support new moms with 12 months of postpartum Medicaid coverage. Set policies that attract maternal health professionals and address the state's OB/GYN deserts.

#### () HUMAN TRAFFICKING

Prevent human trafficking in all of its forms, support its victims, and enact "Safe Harbor" legislation to protect human trafficking survivors from criminal prosecution.

#### ENVIRONMENT

Increase funding for environment and water quality initiatives, including REAP, and develop state climate change strategies.

### **GUN SAFETY**

Enact comprehensive common sense gun safety legislation to address increasing gun violence in the state. Enact background checks on all gun sales, close gun show loopholes, require gun safety locks, repeal "stand your ground" law, and resist efforts that expand carrying in public spaces and schools.
