## WHY THE LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS

Why is the League the place to work for democracy?

Mary joined the League in 1977 when she was looking for something more in the work world. She became very active in the League of Women Voters of Seattle, rising to become President in 1989-91. She served on the state Board in the early 1990s, and undertook some contract gigs for LWVWA including work on a public outreach plan that transformed King County Metro Transit's community relations.

With her children no longer small, Mary went to work full time for King County as a communications specialist and a program coordinator.

She retired at the end of 2013. By 2016, Mary saw threats to democracy looming; she turned to the League of Women Voters as the place to best empower voters and defend democracy.

Her work with LWVWA includes Voter Services Chair, Debates Coordinator and Program Chair. Mary notes, *"the League is an amazing organization. I'm so proud to be part of it."*

information explaining how Spokane Valley is addressing homeless in the Valley. A video of the meeting can be found on our website LWVSpokane.org. We were also pleased to have many attendees bring warm blankets, hats and mittens that were then given to East Valley School District McKinney-Vento program.

Throughout November our committee members attend other events addressing the housing and homeless crisis. Among those are the Homeless Coalition to hear Mayor Woodward explain her approach to the homeless and housing crisis in Spokane and how her plans for the next term, if reelected. Members also attended the Health & Dousing Symposium in Spokane Valley, learning more about how health and housing insecurity are intertwined. We were also present at the Housing Innovation Knowledge Exchange at the Philanthropy Center, sponsored by the Spokane Regional Health District. Others were able to attend Health and Housing Forum, sponsored by Quinton Baker, Spokane Regional Health District, Terri Anderson, Tenants Union, Ben Stuckart, Spokane Low Income Housing Consortium, and Duaa-Rahemaah Hunter, WA Low Income Housing Alliance. The forum discussed what a regional housing and homeless authority must address to be successful. At the end of November, we attended Harmony and Hope: Spokane's Path to Homeless Peace. This was a roundtable discussion of Amber Waldref, Spokane County Commissioner, Barry Barfield, Spokane Homeless Coalition and Jessica, of Lived Homeless Experience, sponsored by the SCC Peace Institute and the SCC Student Awareness League. We are also studying the Roadmap to Housing Justice which was released the last week of November. The Roadmap is a call to action for lawmakers and a rallying point for our communities. It lays out the policy changes and investments needed to create housing justice in Washington. If you would like to join our committee, you can reach us at <u>LWVSAAHHS@gmail.com</u>. ## Civic Education

The ten-part KSPS Civics Bowl 2024 involves a partnership started with the Spokane League, the Spokane Public Schools, and KSPS PBS. The work for Civics Bowl 2024 has already begun. By mid-December, 11 Spokane League volunteers will have written and proofread 600 civics questions taken from the two textbooks used in the high schools. These questions are the raw material for the script for the Civics Bowl 2024.

Writing these questions is exacting and voluminous work. The Magruder American Government Interactive textbook is 778 pages. Thirteen chapters are used for the Civics Bowl. League members each take a chapter and read it carefully for questions and answers that can be easily framed in a Jeopardy-like format.

A previous KSPS producer wrote a *Question Writing Style Guide* with instructions on writing for television, stressing accurate pronunciation and question structure. League members practice questions by reading each one aloud and writing out phonetic pronunciation for unusual words and

names. Part of the proofreading involves members exchanging chapters with each other. They review grammar and spelling and double check the source of the question and answer.

I take selected chapters in the LWVWA textbook, The State We're In. The 8<sup>th</sup> edition is for middle to high school students. (Download a free copy or order your own print version-- <u>The State We're In 8th Edition</u>.) In doing these questions every year, I learn new items about government in Washington State—state and local government and tribal history and government.

All these chapters' questions become the raw material that the KSPS producer, Cyndy Koures uses to create toss-up, category, bonus, and lightning round questions in the final Civics Bowl 2024 (see recordings of previous civics bowls). As ten teams of high school students begin their preparation for the 2024 competition, the Spokane League work is done. Every year, the Spokane League makes this impactful contribution to civic education!

#### **EVENT DESCRIPTION:**

Expo'74 was the first World's Fair to focus on environmental issues. In 1974, the greenhouse effect, industrial pollution of water, soil and air, nuclear waste, deforestation, and loss of wild habitats were of great concern globally. Fifty years later, the planet is experiencing the effects of five decades of only minor action to solve these problems — wildfires, floods, sea level rise, hurricanes and tornados, species extinction, social tensions and dislocation. The Spokane County Library District and the League of Women Voters Spokane Area, invite the public to engage in community conversations during Expo'74 50th Anniversary to talk about how individuals, neighborhoods, and municipalities can take acEon to prepare for the impacts of the climate crisis. Come to these events to share your concerns, ask questions, and exchange ideas with others. Voters voted in November! And, elections that the League ran candidate forums for in October were won and lost. Other than that, November 2023 was a very quiet month for Voter Services.

On Nov. 8, however, the statewide league voter services chairs meeting took place.
