While virtual meetings will continue, our Leadership Team has been focused on getting back to in-person meetings. Since the last newsletter we have had two wonderful in-person events, both organized by our long-time member and event planner extraordinaire, Elaine Adler:


Other highlights since the last newsletter include:

- Our Annual Meeting was virtual on Dec 1st. Take-aways: focus on our membership better
  reflecting the diversity of Highland Park and Highwood; hold a generous bequest from the estate
  of long-time member, Ruth Wander, in a separate account, to be used for significant projects; in
  addition to annual local Program Planning, conduct a review of our League Position papers with
  suggested modifications to be presented at our next annual meeting.

Early voting in Highland Park started on March 20th and runs through April 1st at the Highland Park Public Library, 494 Laurel Ave, Highland Park.






#### **MARTIN LUTHER KING SERVICE DAY: January 16, 2023**

# RANKED CHOICE VOTING

A virtual presentation on February 8th with Alisa Kaplan, Executive Director of

#### Reform For Illinois

On February 8, 2023, Alisa Kaplan, Executive Director of Reform For Illinois (formerly Illinois Campaign For Political Reform), gave us a Zoom presentation on Ranked Choice Voting (RCV). Alisa was fresh from helping lead her home town of Evanston, Illinois to become the first Illinois jurisdiction to adopt this voting method for some local elections. There is growing interest in RCV in a wide variety of jurisdictions in the US, such as cities and towns in Utah, Colorado, and California; New York City, Minneapolis, and San Francisco; and the states of Maine and Alaska.

Some see RCV as a way to determine who has the strongest support; to encourage civil campaigning; to lessen "wasted" votes; and to reduce the need for multiple elections.

With RCV, the voter ranks in order of preference their first through a set number of choices or as many as they want to. The software determines if anyone has over 50 percent (the winner). If not, the software finds the lowest vote-getter and redistributes their second choice votes to the remaining candidates. This is done again when a round does not produce a winner or the requisite number of winners. It can be used where there are single member districts, like the Evanston and Highwood City Councils or an at-large Council as in Highland Park.

Some see this as helpful even if the candidates are elected in single member districts. It enables a voter to select the candidate they really favor but are hesitant about, as a less favored but "acceptable" second-choice is favored to win or has more resources etc. It allows that voter's choice to count and not be "wasted.". In addition, it is thought civility is increased when candidates must compete for second or later choice votes. Studies of RCV have shown that this system tends to produce rough proportional representation in terms of race or ethnic characteristics or in contested issues in a community, such as environmental issues.

In Illinois, any home rule community can put a referendum on the ballot to enact RCV for particular offices. To enact RCV statewide, it must be passed by the state legislature. Here is the recording of the presentation.

#### LOCAL PROGRAM PLANNING PROCESS

In League lingo "program" refers to selected governmental issues chosen by members at the local, state and national levels for study and action.

Only with input from our members will we have a viable and exciting action oriented program to move us forward in influencing public policy in Highland Park and Highwood.

At this meeting, we'll go over our local positions in their brief form – asking if we retain/restudy/ drop each position by category. The more prepared you are, the faster the process will go, and the fastest way to update yourself is to read over our positions prior to the meeting. We'll limit discussion as necessary to stay within the time frame. We do not have a formal observer corps, but we do have several members with specific expertise in policy areas that will attend the meeting to share insights on various positions.

#### SPRING ECOLOGICAL EVENTS!

Two ecological spring events of special interest to League members are approaching – **Focus on the Arts** and **Arbor Day**.

**Focus on the Arts** (April 17-20, times vary, Highland Park High School) is a biennial, multi-day arts festival. A collaboration of the Highland Park High School Fine Arts Department and the Parent Teachers Organization, the festival offers a schedule brimming with workshops, performances, and presentations that explore a wide range of fine arts. On Wednesday, April 19, as part of the architecture focus, **Red Stem**, a local landscape company that designs and builds gardens based on ecological landscape design, will present a display of live plants and shrubs and a slideshow highlighting how native plant gardens provide beauty, support birds and pollinators, address water management concerns, and sequester carbon. Collaborating with Red Stem will be **Habitat Highland Park**, and our local **LWVHP-HWD**. Our League's participation aligns with the LWVUS climate action position by supporting gardening for pollinators and other wildlife. Learn more about how to integrate native plant gardens into your yard or porch and pick up some free pollinator-friendly seed packets during the Thursday evening program. **Arbor Day** (April 29, 9-11 am, Ravinia Festival West Parking Lot, 301 Ravinia Park Road) is the annual City of Highland Park celebration of native trees and plants. Join your neighbors to learn more about the vital importance of planting native trees, shrubs, and plants that thrive in the growing conditions of Illinois. Giveaways will include native tree seedlings, native shrubs, milkweed plants. The **Habitat Highland Park** team will be present to provide information on gardening that attracts pollinators and other wildlife and free seed packets. # Openlands Lakeshore Preserve





Openlands is excited to share the news that the Navy's Historic Document Review and Field Investigation Report for Openlands Lakeshore Preserve has been accepted and approved by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency and the Report is now being prepared for public distribution. No date has been provided for the final dissemination.

The Report is important because it contains a series of recommendations to be undertaken before the Preserve is re-opened. In April 2021, Preserve visitors found historic unexploded ordnance that were safely disposed of. For the safety of all, Openlands closed the Preserve for an investigation by the Navy. Openlands is committed to reopening the Preserve as soon as the safety measures are complete later this year.

"Public safety and wellbeing are our top priorities, so it is important to follow each step of the reopening process very carefully. We are pleased with this key step toward reopening the Preserve," said Jerry Adelmann, Openlands President and CEO.

The Preserve is located at the former Fort Sheridan military base in southeastern Lake County. A nonprofit celebrating 60 years of protecting nature in the region, Openlands has owned and operated the Lakeshore Preserve for more than a decade.

#### Note:

There has been pressure placed on Openlands from the Cities of Highland Park and Highwood. Likely from other sources as well. While this appears to be progress, it's not real until the plan is published AND a date for reopening is declared. Many from my neighborhood plan to continue writing to the City of Highland Park and Openlands until a real commitment to reopening is declared.

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

#### Celebrating Women Who Tell Our Stories

On March 4th I attended this organization's Women's History Month Celebration. **The celebration honored Lake County Women Storytellers** at a luncheon in Ingleside, Illinois. The League of Women Voters of Lake County filled three full tables. LWV Lake County and AAUW—Waukegan Area Branch cosponsored, **Diana Dretske**, Senior Curator and Historian for the Lake County Forest Preserves' Dunn Museum\* as an honoree. Jenny Riddle a dramatic book reviewer and story teller, presented "Audition: A Memoir by Barbara Walters". She had me believing I was listening to Barbara Walters telling her real-life story.

The Lake County Women's Coalition (LCWC) is an alliance of business, professional and civic women's organizations in Lake County, Illinois. Organized in 1995 to celebrate the 75th anniversary of women's right to vote, the LCWC continues to bring these groups together to focus on the efforts and accomplishments of women. The Coalition addresses community issues and concerns, particularly those that impact women, and functions as a springboard to communicate information linking member organizations.

The mission of the Lake County Women's Coalition is to continue the pursuit of equality that led to the ratification of the 19th Amendment; celebrate the accomplishments of women; and encourage women in their educational endeavors.

The Coalition endows a scholarship at the College of Lake County to encourage women who are returning to school to further their education and careers. I did not note the name of this year's scholarship winner, but she spoke and is definitely a women with many obligations and challenges who deserves financial assistance in her pursuit of a nursing degree.

#### ELECTORAL COLLEGE COMMITTEE

In 2020, the League of Women Voters reaffirmed that the direct popular vote to elect the President and Vice President is the best means of achieving a truly representative government. LWV therefore believes that the Electoral College should be abolished via constitutional amendment.

The Deerfield-Lincolnshire local league formed the Electoral College Committee to work toward that goal. The committee includes members from multiple Chicago-area local leagues (including Highland Park-Highwood), as well as members from Michigan, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and California. Several members of the committee developed presentation materials, which LWVUS is currently preparing for a national rollout.

In the meantime, the Electoral College Committee is devoting their monthly meetings to presentations meant to educate committee members about the Electoral College — the history, pros and cons of abolition, etc. These are being recorded and posted to YouTube, where they will be accessible via direct link. They are intended to serve as a training library for future presenters.

The February presentation was given by Ed Spire: "The Risky Electoral College; How it Works, How it Can Be Attacked, How to Defend It." **Here** is a recording of the presentation.

The March presentation was given by Alan Moghul, of the organization The National Vote: "Our Obsolete Electoral College — A Racist Relic from a Bygone Era". Here is a recording of the presentation.

#### LWVIL ISSUES BRIEFING 2023 LWV Illinois' Annual Day of Briefings on Current Issues Ways to Advocate for Change: Saturday, Feb 18<sup>th</sup>

# **Defending Democracy Threats to Elections and Voting**: Opening Plenary attended by Nancy Goldberg

Note: One of the participants, Ami Gandhi, spoke to our League in October 2017 on "Voting Rights – So Many Questions".

The focus was on threats to democracy and protecting the right to vote. The reality today is that many people who should legally be able to vote are not able to do so. Discussion of racial disparities in voting; voting during pretrial detention (strongly influenced by inability to pay bail); and other obstacles to voting were discussed. The speakers addressed national trends and their strong concerns about groups across the country (including in Illinois) attempting to utilize the existing structure to push a partisan or anti-democratic strategy.

#### Carbon Capture and Sequestration: Morning Breakout session attended by Rose Feder

There are two approaches to carbon capture - mechanical methods and biological methods.

Mechanically, carbon capture and storage is an attempt to remove carbon dioxide after burning gas, oil, coal or biomass before it enters the atmosphere and then transport it by pipeline to be stored underground. The recently-enacted Inflation and Reduction Act includes incentives for the energy industry to implement carbon capture and storage projects. We have yet to know its impact.

Biologically, carbon capture is the natural ability of life and ecosystems to store carbon. Forests, peat marshes, and coastal wetlands are particularly good at storing carbon. In contrast, this we do know.

# STATE-LWVIL

Note: one of the participants, Sara Knizhnik, presented a program to our League in December 2022 on Gun Reform.

The presented approach considered that gun violence in America and Illinois is a public health issue and, as such, demands an urgent, multifaceted, nonpartisan response.

The session presented results from a focus group that mimicked the variety of the Illinois population. The general feeling was that guns that are used in criminal ways are not obtained legally. However support for banning assault-style weapons fell along well-known political lines.
