PREPARING FOR CONSENSUS MEETINGS

The League of Women Voters of Illinois (LWVIL) is in the process of updating its position on the issue of Criminal Justice. Local Leagues have formed committees to examine the totality of the system and eventually come to consensus during meetings in January 2021. The results will yield a renewed position, allowing the LWVIL to engage more fully in criminal justice advocacy.

LEADERSHIP TEAM MESSAGE

Dear Members and Friends,

As we close in on the shortest day of 2020, I must say that my mood is running parallel to the diminishing number of daylight hours. We are hearing of more friends and neighbors testing positive for COVID-19 and Dr. Fauci warned yesterday that "We may see a surge upon surge." It's been four weeks since the election, November 3. I think we are all glad that it's over. (Is it really over?) I was only disappointed, not surprised, that the Fair Tax Amendment failed. Thank you to all members and friends of our League who worked so hard on the Fair Tax and Get Out the Vote campaigns. Thanks to those who got out voter registration information or registered voters; those who spread the word about IllinoisVoterGuide.org; those who designed original graphics for yard signs, flyers and candidate forums publicity; those who participated in candidate forum planning and implementation; those who distributed flyers and palm cards to Highwood retailers; and those who acted as poll observers or election judges. Record-breaking numbers of votes were cast in this election. This unprecedented turnout is a testament to the determination of the American voters and the strength of our democratic system.

For the benefit of myself and, I'm sure, many others, I searched the Internet with the question "how to stay positive during the pandemic". One article quoted the book *"Emotional Inflammation: Discover your Triggers and Reclaim your Equilibrium During Anxious Times"*, by Lise Van Susteren, MD and Stacey Colino: "A powerful remedy to these anxious, turbulent times we're experiencing is to consciously recognize and confront inaction, to move from being a bystander to being an upstander. ... It's about moving from observing in silence to making *good noise*."

As most of you know, the Illinois LWV is updating its 25 year-old position on Criminal Justice (CJ). We've all witnessed injustices over the years. Our current position is outdated or silent on many aspects (e.g., policing). It is imperative that we update our position so that we can fully participate in criminal justice advocacy. Over the past few months, members of our League together with other committee members from LWV Deerfield Area, LWV Lake Forest-Lake Bluff, LWV Northwest Lake County (under the umbrella of LWV Lake County) have been educating ourselves on the 14 topics that comprise the scope of the CJ study. We have read materials from LWVIL, viewed other local Leagues' presentations by experts, and planned our own (Zoom) programs for our members. I hope you will all spend some time learning about the topics, either by viewing our programs, other reading, or other Leagues' programs. (Zoom recordings of past programs are available and I will be sending out a list of recommended ones.) The informed participation of all our members is solicited for the consensus meetings in January. This method of soliciting grassroots input from members of the League of Women Voters is what makes us respected. For the most part, "where we stand" on issues does not come down from some remote leadership, but is crafted by considering the input of all the members over a period of time based on study and discussion and consensus. It is this very intense method that gives us confidence that our positions fairly represent the views of our members. When you see the final version of the position you feel pride in knowing you helped craft it. Please register for our remaining presentations if you haven't already done so. Contested Election Program October 1, 2020

On the evening of October 1, 2020, our League hosted a zoom program on the subject of “Legal Perspectives on a Contested Election.” Our speaker was David Melton, J.D., a semi-retired attorney, who remains active in bar associations and law reform efforts in the areas of campaign finance reform and election law, civil liberties, and federal courts. For obvious reasons, the subject was a “draw”: we had more than 60 participants. The program was moderated by our own Betsy Lassar, and we received many compliments about the presentation.

David presented a brief history of the Electoral College and discussed constitutional and state law provisions relevant to it. He noted that the election is actually conducted by over 10,500 local election authorities. The initial ballot counting is performed by local authorities. This includes the counting of provisional and mail-in ballots, the resolution of disputes, and the proclamation and reporting of local results. Next comes the compilation and reporting of statewide results. There is a succession of dates by which results are to be reported. By December 8, 2020 (the Safe Harbor Date), the Elector slates are to be determined in the states, and by December 14, 2020, the Electors' votes are cast by the states and the results transmitted to the U.S. Senate. On January 6, 2021, the elector ballots are cast in the U.S. Senate.

As we are now well aware, disputes may arise during the local counting phases, during the state certification process, or during the Congressional counting process. Issues that may arise include claims of fraudulent ballots, legislative changes to electors, use of the counts to short-circuit counts, and kicking the election to the House of Representatives. This process is clearly complex and contains many gaps that do not provide clear resolution.

COVID-19 created challenges this year, but the importance of this year's election kept us motivated to get out the vote and educate voters. In the Spring primary election we were able to work with Highland Park High School to successfully get the students involved in "Stroll to the Polls." But the November election presented bigger challenges. Thank you to all members who helped by placing our "Your Vote is your Voice" signs on their lawns. The signs could be spotted from Lake Bluff to Chicago! The project was a complete success. We could have sold more as people from around the state were requesting them.

Other GOTV signs were on display at the Highland Park and Highwood Libraries (Spanish/English).

The Illinois LWV, through a grant, provided English/Spanish palm cards that we distributed to Highwood merchants. A PowerPoint presentation was displayed at HPPL as well as on our own website. Our two candidate forums were widely viewed and because they were recorded from Zoom and placed on our League's YouTube channel, we received even more "hits" after the original presentation. The Illinois-VoterGuide.org helped to inform our citizens and was praised. We supplied "Vote by Mail" and other voting information on our website, our Facebook and in many emails. Highland Park had a 75-80% turnout and Highwood about a 70% turnout. That is something to be proud of and we know that we were a part of this large number. We will work on the next election to hopefully surpass this number.

We feel that we did our part to accomplish our LWV mission of educating and empowering voters. Across the nation, the League of Women Voters worked by being poll watchers, election judges, transporters to polling places, educators and more. The LWV of Georgia is still working to make sure all citizens have a chance to vote. LWV of Georgia can use our support. I just sent a small check to them to help them with their quest to enable all Georgia citizens to vote.

We should be proud to be a part of this wonderful, well-respected national organization that has helped make elections fair and educated the public, while remaining nonpartisan for over one hundred years.

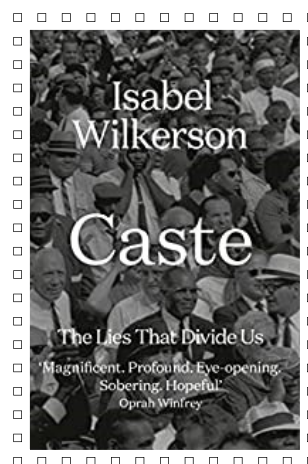
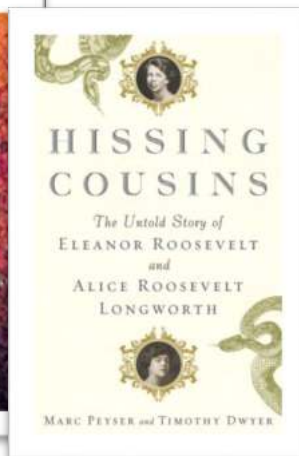
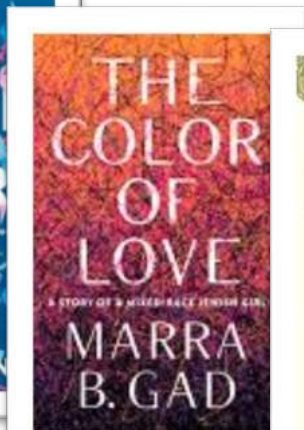


LWVHP/HWD BOOK CLUB
