The LWVHC Annual Meeting was held on Thursday, May 24, 2018 in the Plaza Grill View Room, Arcata, CA. President Rollin Richmond was out of town so Vice-President Michele Fell-Casale called the meeting to order at 7:08 pm. Membership Chair Becky Simpson announced that a quorum had been established with 51 members in attendance. FYI: LWVHC currently has 196 members.

President Michele Fell-Casale then presented the President's Report which had been written previously by President Rollin Richmond. In essence, the Report gave details on LWVHC's very busy year. In addition to candidates forums, the very successful State of the Community Luncheon, and publication of *Citizens Guide to County Government*, items mentioned included:

- assisting with elections for the Bear River Rancheria and the Wiyot tribe,
- joining with the American Association of University Women to sponsor a community education event featuring Richard Kimball, President & Co-Founder of Project Vote Smart,

- conducting a meeting for LWVHC members on a proposal to eliminate the Electoral College,
- co-sponsoring a panel discussion with the National Alliance on Mental Illness in Humboldt on the intersection of mental illness and the criminal justice system,
- hosting a Sea Level Rise informational meeting with LWVUS expert Dr. 'Liz' Smith,
- offering support and scholarships to students participating in Humboldt County History Day,
- offering a student workshop in the North Coast Youth Summit.

The 2018/2019 budget and program, as stated in the Annual Meeting Kit were then adopted, with the following addition made to the program:

Under Position 8: after "Counseling services are especially important." Schools should provide <u>teachers and</u> <u>support services staff</u> professional development training on mental health and suicide prevention.

Board elections were then conducted. Rollin Richmond was elected as Board President for one year. The following people were elected to a two-year term ending June 30, 2020:
