**LOCAL NAVY ACTION--**Anne Stewart and Debbie Stevens joined other League members and City officials in attending the local US Navy well-water investigation session on February 26 in Flour Bluff. The Navy's goal was to arrange to sample water wells around local military bases to determine if so-called "forever chemicals" used on the bases decades ago have seeped into the water. A team of scientists from across the country also were in attendance.

#### Katherine Goble Johnson, NASA Mathematician

Katherine G. Johnson, acclaimed NASA mathematician whose career at NASA from 1953-1986 was captured in the 2016 film "Hidden Figures," died February 24, 2020, in Newport News, VA, at the age 101. A high school graduate at age 14, Johnson graduated summa cum laude in 1937 from West Virginia State, with degrees in mathematics and French. Her calculations of orbital mechanics and trajectories were crucial to Project Mercury spaceflights and lauded by astronauts Alan Shepard and John Glenn. She received the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2015 from President Barack Obama.



The 2020 convention will be held Friday noon through Sunday noon, April 17-19, at the DoubleTree Hotel in Austin (just north of 290 and IH 35.)

April 18, 7-9 p.m. -- "Making Democracy Work" Benefit Dinner "Political Organizers and Public Intellectuals—Texas Women's Voices in the Twentieth Century"

Dr. Jessica Brannon-Wranosky, Ph.D. will lead a discussion on the forms of women's activism, organizing, intellectual public space and lobbying in Texas history. She is a well-recognized suffrage historian in Texas and in the U.S. and serves as the Distinguished Professor of Digital Humanities and History in the Department of History at Texas A&M University-Commerce.

#### Panelists will include:

- Dr. Merline Pitre, Professor of History League of Women Voters of Texas and former Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Behavioral Science at Texas Southern University. She is the author and editor of numerous books about African American history in Texas and beyond, including *Black Women in Texas History, In Struggle against Jim Crow: Lulu B. White and the NAACP, 1900-1957*, and most recently *Born to Serve: A History of Texas Southern University.*
- Dr. Cynthia Orozco, Professor of History and Humanities at Eastern New Mexico University, Ruidoso. She is generally considered one of the earliest historians to work on Mexican American women's history, and as such, considered a founder of the field. She is the author of numerous books about Mexican American and Mexican American Women's history in Texas and beyond.
- Cecilia Gutierrez Venable, archivist and curator for the Sisters of the Holy Spirit and Mary Immaculate AND the Historian for the Texas NAACP. She is the author and editor of numerous books, including *Historic Photos of Corpus Christi, African Americans in El Paso (Images of America Series), Texas Women and Ranching: On the Range, at the Rodeo, and in Their Communities.* She often advises and works with groups on how to collect, preserve and maintain their history, and she will be speaking about that and about women reform activities in Texas history.

### Planning Continues for April 16 Lead Education Forum

Planning continues for the Lead Education Forum, sponsored by LWV-CC and scheduled on Thursday, April 16, from 5:30-8 p.m. at the Del Mar College Center for Economic Development. The event is free, and refreshments will be available, said Study Chair Sally Farris. The forum is a follow-up to the League study titled "Potential for Lead Contamination in Our Communities" Drinking Water."

Dr. Mary Jane Garza, past president of the League, will act as moderator at the Forum and Dr. Jim Klein from Del Mar College will join presenters from the League in making a wind-up presentation.

Invitations have been extended to local school districts, City of Corpus Christi officials, Public Health District staff, and the US Navy to participate as presenters and provide insight into opportunities for tracking, prevention, and education.

Updates in epidemiology will be discussed at the Forum, as well as simple and cost-effective steps to help guard against lead consumption from residential home taps. Please save the date of April 16 and plan to attend the forum. Be watching for additional information.

### Census 2020

### U.S. Census Day Approaching; Residents Urged To Participate

The U.S. Census Bureau will be making an even bigger effort in 2020 to get an accurate count of the population in every town and city than they did in 2010.

An organization named **Nueces Together** has formed to focus on the Nueces County population. By now, you have probably seen national ads on television and may have gotten something about the Census in the mail. The Census will be taken between March 12-July 31.

There are only 10 questions and the survey can be done by phone or online. Local public libraries will make their computers available if residents don't have access to a computer.

There are three important reasons why an accurate count is critical to Nueces County:

- (1) **Allocation of Federal Dollars**--Every person counted in the Census represents \$1500-\$1900 in federal funding every year for the next 10 years.
- (2) **Economic Development for Nueces County**-- Businesses determine if they will open or invest in our area based on its size and demographics.
- (3) **Representation in Government**--The number of elected members that represent Nueces County in state and federal government depends on the population count.
