On Thursday, January 16, starting at 6:30 p.m. the League of Women Voters of Humboldt County is hosting a Zoom meeting to gather your thoughts on issues to be tackled by the League of Women Voters of California for the next two years. That's what it means to be a grassroots organization: we rely on **you** to set the League direction.

Defining our direction, in League parlance that's what "Program" is all about. Program defines where we put our education and advocacy energies. At the state level that means what we want for the future of California.

What are the issues of concern to us? Where is there a need for legislative activity and other action? Where can we have the greatest impact? At the meeting on January 16, we can select up to three "Issues for Emphasis" for the LWVC to focus on.

Invite your friends too! This is an excellent opportunity to introduce non-members to how the League works. Although only League members can participate in the consensus process, everyone is very welcome to chime in and to share what topics matter to them. We're inviting quite a few community folks from other organizations and institutions to the meeting for that very purpose.

# The LWVHC Needs Observers to Take the Lead on Civil Engagement

In recent years, the organized LWVHC observer corps and related action committee have been dormant. Concerned board members have initiated advocacy actions in 2024 about decisions made by the Eureka City Schools Board and opposed the heavily promoted Measure F in Eureka during the November election. Those actions were important; however, with a designated member-participation observer corps, LWVHC could do more to protect government transparency and accountability.

Designated observers commit themselves to attend (in-person, on Zoom, or by watching public access broadcasts) meetings of a specific key public body for a period of time, like a year. They monitor the business of that body for issues that correlate to League positions, whether local, state or national League. Current examples are housing, climate planning, mental health, and wind turbines.

The observers are asked to report issues and concerns back to a corps manager. When issues are evaluated to be appropriate for League action based on positions in place, the observer will work with an action committee to create the advocacy.

Members often say they like the education they get from observing, both about the public body and about League positions. You can learn more about the Observer Corps on the LWVHC website.
