LWV CVA New Year's Greetings

Dear League Members,

As we step into a new year together, I want to begin by wishing each of you good health, hope, and renewed energy for the work ahead. The start of a new year is always a moment to pause—both to reflect on how far we've come and to look ahead with purpose.

2025 was a year of change. Membership shifted from a local grassroots management model to one that is more nationally aligned and supported. With it we welcomed many new members who bring fresh ideas, energy, and perspectives to our work, strengthening our League for the future. New Member meetings were held to help demystify League work such as Program Planning and Women's Legislative Roundtables.

Our mission to inform and educate voters went into full gear in 2025 with a new website that is clear and easy to read and navigate. We held more voter registration and civic education drives. Vote 411 was enriched and expanded. We held Listening Tables, as alternatives to candidate forums in every area we serve where candidates conversed face to face with constituents. Partnering with other nonpartisan groups we were able to reach more people from diverse backgrounds and circumstances.

In 2025 we hosted meetings with our General Assembly members and took closer looks at critical issues such as AC44 and the rapid expansion of data centers, while also recognizing and responding to the broader rise in authoritarianism that challenges democratic norms nationwide. We also joined other nonpartisan organizations participating in rallies fighting authoritarianism for those who fight for the need for gun violence prevention, climate control, women's rights, and rights and freedoms for all.

At the same time, we say a heartfelt goodbye to one of our longest continuously active members, Sue Lewis, as she returns home to New York State. Sue's dedication, leadership, and steady presence have left

a lasting mark on our League, and we are deeply grateful for all she has given.

In 2026 we will continue with Unite and Rise 8.5 working with our national league to get 8.5 million more voters to the polls in November. Our efforts will place even greater emphasis on student participation and understanding of the democratic process. We intend to expand partnering with other nonpartisan groups who share our commitment to voter participation and civic engagement using Civic Circles. Vote 411 and Listening Tables will be held in spring and fall elections.

Thank you for your time, your passion, and your belief in the power of democracy. Together, we enter this new year united in purpose and ready to rise to the challenges ahead.


2026 Annual Fund Drive

LWV CVA Grills General Assembly Members

December 8, 2025

On December 8th LWV-CVA members met with St. Senator Creigh Deeds, Del. Amy Laufer, and Del. Callsen to give them our priorities for this coming 2026 session. Promoting National Popular Vote, Ending Voucher Program for private schools, green energy initiatives, stronger gun safety laws, wise data center legislation, affordable health care and retaining Medicaid and Snap benefits for those who need it. They spoke about getting the three state constitutional amendments: restoring voting rights to felons who served their time, marriage equality, and women's right reproductive care.

Impacts of Growth

The environmental impacts of development continue to be a focus of the NRC's discussions. The League's Charlottesville Area (City of Charlottesville, Albemarle, Fluvanna, Greene, Louisa and Nelson Counties) is experiencing a surge in development, spurred by programs like [Go Virginia](#).

Although residential property tax receipts make up the primary component of operational revenue for a county's services, on the whole residential property tax receipts do not contribute enough to offset the cost of county-provided community services. According to the UVA Weldon Cooper [Cost of Community Services](#) study, in 2023, the residential land use category in Albemarle generated 70 .18% of tax revenues, but required 90.11% of County expenditures, while both commercial and rural land use categories contributed more in revenues than they required in service expenditures.

[A breakdown of expected expenses](#) for Albemarle for the next tax year (FY2027) is enlightening. Although landing AstraZeneca's \$4.5 billion advanced pharmaceutical manufacturing facility is considered a commercial win for Albemarle, it won't come without an influx of employees, and an anticipated 1,000 additional public school students, as well as major investments in other infrastructure, so taxpayers are not likely to see a decline in their taxes in spite of additional commercial revenue.

Thus economic growth drives population growth, and more people require more services, which require more tax revenue. Beyond the effect on our taxes, economic growth and development have real impacts on our environment and quality of life.

Data Center and Transmission Line Demands in the CVA

Data center companies continue to seek more land, water and energy than central Virginia counties can sustainably provide.

In Fluvanna, the Planning Commission has postponed until January 15, 2026, its [review of a new gas plant proposed by Tenaska](#). one of several new plants proposed in Virginia to meet data center energy needs.

In Louisa, Supervisors are considering [how to protect residents from heavy truck traffic](#) on rural roads as they go to and from multiple data center sites now under construction.

And all across central Virginia, plans are being laid for high-powered electrical transmission lines to service data centers. The Piedmont Environmental Council has put together information on both what has already been approved and [what is currently being proposed](#). Learn about transmission line proposals for our region pending before the PJM (our regional grid operator) [here](#).

Despite the State Corporation Commission approving a new rate class for large electricity user, including large data centers, the billions of dollars of infrastructure required for data centers will be paid for by all of us, the ratepayers, so expect to see your electric bills rise as a result. Although the Virginia legislature will likely be taking up bills in January to shift more of the financial burden of data center investment to the tech companies, it's important to remember that where the energy comes from, where the water comes from, and the land use decisions being made to accommodate data centers all have consequences for our environment, quality of life and future generations.

Healthcare Taskforce by Stephanie Lowenhaupt

As we approach the 2026 legislative session, the task force has been focused on collaborating with our partners, helping set healthcare legislative priorities and meeting with our local legislators. The priorities we will be focusing on are:

- ACA Provisions (state subsidies)
- Support for Safety Net Facilities such as Free Clinics and community health centers
- Protecting Medicaid/FAMIS Investments (Family Access to Medical Insurance Security Plan)
- Children's Health Coverage

We plan to follow the applicable legislation and budget amendments and continue our advocacy efforts.
