Services for Seniors



- DelDOT uses data from U.S. Census Bureau and building permits from the three counties
- In 2016, about 55,000 of Sussex County's 217,000 people are 65+. That's over 25%.
- By 2040, about 80,000 of Sussex County's 260,000 people will be 65+. That's about 31%.

Services for Seniors

- ► The county as a whole is going to increase by almost 45,000 people, and over 25,000 of them will be 65+.
- So it's clear the size of the senior population is an important factor in Sussex County.

How DelDOT is Addressing Services for Seniors in Sussex

- Most seniors in Sussex County drive, about 4-5 days per week.
- DelDOT welcomed and funded iTN Southern Delaware.
- DelDOT welcomed two ride share companies, Uber and Lyft



What Plans Do We Have for Seniors in Sussex

- Adding buses to current routes as ridership levels increase.
- Extending routes to other destinations near current routes, based on studies, interviews and input from Sussex County, employers, and comments from our riders.

- Continue to adjust our demand responsive
 Paratransit services.
- Continue to expand DART Flex services – today we have three routes.






Transportation Improvement Districts

- A TID District is an area in which development is expected to occur and for which Traffic Impact Studies have already been completed.
- A local government initiates.
- DelDOT holds meetings with the public and with the city or the county to establish boundaries, levels of service, density and other expectations.

Transportation Improvement Districts

- The process enables DelDOT to determine the requirements that developers would face.
- This enables developers to know the cost of road improvements up front and to pay for improvements as building progresses.
- In a TID, developers don't have to wait for Traffic Impact Studies.

Henlopen TID



Henlopen TID

- On 8/30, Sussex County Council approved a motion to proceed with the development of the Henlopen TID.
- The current boundary may be adjusted as we move closer to an agreement (TID Agreement).
- Public comment and involvement

Henlopen TID

- Current Work:
 - The County will be initiating an amendment to its comprehensive plan that describes the intent to create a TID.
 - DelDOT, County staff, and the members of the Planning & Zoning Commission are currently collecting data and developing the technical elements of the draft agreement.
- DelDOT and Sussex County hope to enter into a formal agreement in early 2017.
