

LWV Policy Agendas, Then and Now

The 19th Amendment was ratified – and the League officially created – in a presidential election year. Not surprisingly, the League had a policy agenda. President Maud Wood Park took the agenda to both the Democratic and Republican national conventions, and both parties endorsed a good number of the League's proposals.

The specific proposals were products of their time, but the general priorities resonate today: child welfare; government support for education, including good pay for teachers and civics instruction for students; women's equality in employment; and a robust program of child and public health.

The League achieved some specific goals, including creation of a federal department of education and a law allowing women to keep their US citizenship when they married non-US citizens.

Nancy Tate, co-chair of the 2020 Women's Vote Centennial Initiative and former Executive Director of the national League of Women Voters, will
 describe what it took for women to win the constitutional right to vote.
 The 19th Amendment to the US Constitution was ratified on August 26, 1920, after 72 years of organized effort.

It was the greatest expansion of democracy on a single day in US history, and yet is a story that is little

known. Learn about the suffrage movement in Virginia, and in Arlington, and the resulting evolution of the League of Women Voters.

Celebrate Women's History Month at Arlington Public Library. On March 5, bestselling author Liza Mundy will speak at Central Library on her book, *Code Girls: The Untold Story of the American Women Code Breakers of World War II.* This talk will accompany the formal opening of an exhibition at Central Library that pays tribute to the lives of Arlington women past and present. "Code Girls" were actively recruited on the home front and ensconced at Arlington Hall, a former girls' school, which became the headquarters of the U.S. Army's Signal Intelligence Service. Mundy's research uncovers the truth about the army of women code-breakers behind the scenes of the war, and brings to life the forgotten history of these unsung heroes of WWII. 7-9 pm, Central Library Auditorium, 1015 N. Quincy St. Refreshments will be served.

100th Birthday Celebration for Arlington County March 16, County Board Room, Bozman Government Center, Time TBD

It's Arlington's Centennial, Too!

This year marks the 100th anniversary of the naming of Arlington County. The year-long celebration will feature author events, activities and panel discussion with the theme: "Looking Both Ways: Arlington at 100, a Century of Progress." The evening of March 16, the County Board will host an actual "birthday" celebration with cake and remarks by Board Members. March 16, 1920, is the date the name "Arlington" was changed from Alexandria County through an act of the General Assembly.

Women's History Month Proclamation Ceremony

March 31, County Board Room, Bozman Government Center, Time TBD Kathrine Switzer, the first woman to run the Boston Marathon in 1967, will be the keynote speaker for Arlington County's Women's History Month Proclamation Ceremony which takes place on Thursday, March 31 at noon. Ms. Switzer will share her personal story of being the first woman to run the Boston Marathon and talk about her advocacy for women in sports. Switzer is the founder of 261 Fearless Inc. a global non-profit organization created to empower and unite women through the creation of local non-competitive running clubs, education programs, communication platforms and social running events.

Women's History Month Exhibit Month of March, Central Library

Throughout Arlington's history, women have been groundbreakers and trailblazers, important forces working for better education, libraries, and conservation. Women helped found Arlington's first hospital, and they fought for civil rights. Their contributions to the growth and development of their community were immense, and Arlington today would not be the same without them. An exhibit, **"Women's Work: Then and Now,"** will feature profiles of historic and contemporary women whose contributions have influenced the Arlington community. The exhibit will draw from the Center for Local History's "Women's Work" project to include profiles of trailblazers such as Margarite Syphax, Gertrude Crocker and Carrie Johnson and will feature profiles of contemporary women, including past Women of Vision Award Winners and nominees from partner organizations, including, as we now know, our own Seema Kakad Jain and Nancy Tate! Significant contributors from each of the County's departments will also be recognized.

Women's Leadership Summit


April 29, 8am-1pm, County Board Room, Bozman Government Center


