However, there are other aspects of League work that are just as important. We are in the middle of two major position studies at the LWV of Virginia and the input of the members of LWV Arlington is needed. See below for the two special meetings planned to review this studies. Without position studies there can be no advocacy. We need your ideas and questions – we need your input. Positions are the backbone of the League.

Updating League Positions - Your Input Needed

As you know, the League of Women Voters is active in advocacy as well as in voter registration and education. However, **we only advocate on policy issues on which a League position has been developed**. All positions at the local, state, and national levels result from League processes to identify, study, and reach consensus on what the League believes on any given issue, before advocacy even begins. All of this is necessary in order to ensure that our positions are fact based, relevant, nonpartisan, and reflect the views of the membership.

LWV Virginia is in the process of updating their positions in two ways. Both of these are at the stage that involves local League consideration and consensus. Those are:

- 1. To update the current position on election security
- 2. To formulate an affordable housing position

The decision to proceed on these positions was authorized at the 2019 LWV Virginia Convention. There are two teams working hard on these efforts and we are proud that Arlington members **Lisa Koteen Gerchick** and **Pam Quanrud** are playing instrumental roles in the development of these positions.

We are now at the stage where local Leagues need to discuss, review, and make comments on the positions. This is an important opportunity for our Arlington League members to learn about the new positions being proposed, and to indicate whether they agree or not with the various aspects of each.

The committees will utilize this input to develop a final proposed position for presentation and vote at LWV Virginia Convention in May, 2021.





Juneteenth - Day of Celebration and Commitment

The League of Women Voters of Virginia formally celebrates and acknowledges June 19th as Juneteenth, also known as Freedom Day, or Emancipation Day— the oldest-known annual celebration of the ending of slavery in the United States. The holiday commemorates June 19, 1865, when the news finally reached African Americans in Gavelston, Texas that President Abraham Lincoln had issued the Emancipation Proclamation, freeing slaves living in Confederate states two years earlier. When Union soldiers arrived in Galveston to bring the news that slavery had been abolished, former slaves celebrated, and thus Juneteenth was born.

LWVUS Joins Letter requesting United Nations Human Rights Council to Open Inquiry on Police Violence Against Protestors

LWVUS joins hundreds of organizations, including many of our partners, in requesting that the United Nations hold a special session on the escalation of police violence in the United States and repression of protestors. The letter has been endorsed by the family members of those killed by the police.

The letter cites instances of repression from the police towards protestors such as the use of tear gas and disproportionate use of lethal force, as a reason to open an inquiry on behalf of the United Nations Human Rights Council.
