Now," displaying exemplary female leaders over more than a century of Arlington


history.

who fought for the right to vote for all women through a challenging trivia game.



Book Review: Why They Marched by Susan Ware



Why They Marched

tells the stories of 19 diverse women – some you've probably heard of and others you likely haven't - that played a role in the suffrage movement. Paired with each personal narrative of the women, Ware describes an accompanying "object" that provides a visual lens through which to think about suffrage and the time period. For example, Ware

describes the work of early suffragist and abolitionist **Sojourner Truth**, while also describing Truth's famous photographs of herself that she sold both to support herself financially and to support her causes.

Although Ware describes the work of some of the obvious suffragists such as **Susan B. Anthony** and **Elizabeth Cady Stanton**, some of my favorite chapters were about lesser well-known suffragists. For example, through **Emmeline Wells**, we learn about the fight for suffrage by Mormon women, including women in polygamous marriages. Through journalist **Alice Stone Blackwell**, who cared deeply about Armenia and the refugee crisis that was unfolding at the time, we learn about the intersection between the suffrage movement and international human rights advocacy and education.

I recommend *Why They Marched* for a broad and refreshing view of the many ways that women demonstrated leadership on the guestion of suffrage.
