#### Natural Resources— •

A major water report by UCLA Luskin Center for Innovation was published: Community Water Systems in Los Angeles County: A Performance Policy Guide Full report here.

Our drinking water supply is generally very safe and much safer than other parts of the country and CA. Maximum Contamination Load (MCL) violations are exceptionally low and concentrated in rural sites along the northern border of LA county.

About 2% of Californians lack access to clean water. ~1600 customers in LA County have high levels of arsenic in their tap water. People living in mobile home parks are more likely to be affected.. Consolidation of water agencies (as larger agencies absorb smaller ones) has helped make drinking water safer. (Source)

Water cost burden continues to be a problem as water costs have gone up faster than income and general inflation. (Source)

The California Water Board released a report on low-income water affordability to satisfy AB401; related to AB685 and SB200:

**Options:** (LA Water Board recommendations) Direct bill assistance does not help renters whose water bill is included in rent.

Renters' water credit gives help once a year while water bills are monthly and poorer families move more frequently.

Crisis assistance can be added to either option 1 or 2 and can keep the water from being shut off.

Set financial assistance per household assumes 3 people at 49 gpd (gallons per person per day) and does not take into account household size.

California's use of Colorado river water in 2019 was the lowest since 1950 due to ample Sierra snowpack and SoCal rain in the winter for 2018/2019. <u>(Source)</u>

The efficiencies of urbanization have completely decoupled water use from population and economic growth. Urban water use per capita has dropped so much in LA County that many areas are already hitting the CA targets of 55 gpd indoor water use a decade early. Because indoor water can be recycled while outdoor landscape water is consumed, replacing a single family home with a large yard with multi-unit housing would actually save water. LWVC policies about housing & water should be updated to reflect this new reality.

Oil refineries use large amounts of (recycled) water for cooling. Half of that water is consumed through evaporation; the other half is sent to sewage treatment plants and can be recycled. Using less gasoline will reduce our regional water use.
