- Keep an eye out for [Vote yes on Prop 13](#): Bonds for Schools and Colleges on the March 3rd ballot!
- History was made on January 15th, 2020, as Virginia became the 38th state to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) by passing the three-fourths threshold of support required from the states for a constitutional amendment.

Now we will urge Congress to remove the ratification deadline it imposed after passing the measure in 1972. The League of Women voters is advocating for Congress to eliminate or extend the ratification deadline on the ERA so it will become part of the Constitution as the 28th amendment.

As we celebrate the Centennial of the both the passage of the 19th amendment giving women the right to vote and the founding of the League of Women Voters (LWV), let us recall and honor those brave women who fought for their rights as equal citizens.

- Natural Resources**— The natural resources committee supports on a local level the LWV policy to “Promote an environment beneficial to life through the protection and wise management of natural resources in the public interest.” Climate change, clean air and water, and environmental justice are high priorities.

We analyze objective evidence including technical reports, research articles and government records. By understanding the past and present, we can determine the policies that can help us reach the future we want. Then we fight hard to get those policies enacted and implemented.

Because housing policy is climate policy, we work with the housing and homelessness committee. Pushing electeds to enact a Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA) that follows the law and reduces carbon dioxide emissions instead of accelerating climate change has been the biggest priority in 2019.
