The League of Women Voters is a non-partisan organization. It does not endorse or oppose any candidates. The League's purpose is to promote political responsibility through the informed and active participation of all citizens.

All candidates were contacted by email and asked to respond to the following question: **"Belmont citizens look to our elected officials for fair and responsible solutions to the issues facing our community. Please pick an issue or two from this list, and describe what you have done recently &/or how you would deal with this in the future: capital projects (e.g. skating rink), housing (e.g. Beatrice Circle, MBTA rezoning), schools (e.g. public or private), financial management (e.g. taxes, overrides), traffic, and transparency."** Responses, limited to 100 words, are printed verbatim. Contact information, if provided by the candidates, is included.

Candidates who did not reply to the questionnaire sent to them by the League are included in the Guide so that you will have a complete list of candidates.

An **asterisk (*)** preceding the candidate's name denotes an incumbent. Where applicable, **attendance** at Town Meeting for the past three years, according to the Town Clerk's records, is given in parentheses. The second number indicates the **number of Town Meetings** the candidate was **eligible** to attend. If one or more Special Town Meetings are held on the same night as a regular Town Meeting, each is counted as a separate meeting. If candidates were previously elected at caucuses or moved within Belmont, they are not incumbents, but their attendance is noted. Third number is **number of years served** as a Town Meeting Member.



Belmont faces substantial budgetary challenges and needs an override and structural changes. There are ways to fund the 2024 budget with the \$15 million we have in free cash. Governor Healey is also proposing an increase of almost \$1.7 million in state educational aid for Belmont next year. Structurally, moving to the Group Insurance Commission would realize a significant, millions in savings for 2024 and future budgets. Additionally, the GIC would mean substantial one-time funds from drawing down the health insurance trust and reducing the cost of Belmont's Other Post Employment Benefits.

Annual Town Meeting takes place in the spring, and typically last for six evenings (typically Monday and Wednesday). Special Town Meetings are occasionally called at other times of the year.

Belmont Town Meeting has 295 members (36 for each precinct and 7 at large). One third of the members from precincts are elected each spring (12 per precinct). Town Meeting makes all of the decisions about the Town's budgets and local Bylaws. Belmont's government is a Representative Town Meeting, which means that only Town Meeting Members can vote at Town Meeting, unlike the Open Town Meeting form of government. Please consider this when voting for Town Meeting Members.
