This Guide is prepared by members of the League of Women Voters of Belmont to provide you with information on all of the candidates who will appear on your ballot for this election.

The League of Women Voters is a non-partisan organization. It does not endorse or oppose any candidates. The League's purpose is to promote political responsibility through the informed and active participation of all citizens.

All candidates were contacted by email and asked to respond. Town Meeting Member candidates were asked the following question: "Belmont citizens look to our elected officials for fair and responsible solutions to the issues facing our community. Please pick an issue or two from this list, and describe what you have done recently &/or how you would deal with this in the future: capital projects, housing & zoning (e.g. MBTA Communities zoning, ADUs, affordable housing for young families & seniors), schools (e.g. public or private), financial management (e.g. taxes, overrides), traffic, and transparency." Town-Wide candidates were asked a similar question. Responses, limited to 100 words, are printed verbatim. Contact information, if provided, is included. Candidates who did not reply to the questionnaire sent to them by the League are included in the Guide so that you will have a complete list.

Asterisks and numbers: An asterisk (*) preceding the candidate's NAME denotes an incumbent. Where applicable, attendance at Town Meeting for the past three years, according to the Town Clerk's records, is given in parentheses. The second number indicates the number of Town Meetings the candidate was eligible to attend. If one or more Special Town Meetings are held on the same night as a regular Town Meeting, each is counted as a separate meeting. If candidates were previously elected at caucuses or moved within Belmont, they are not incumbents, but their attendance is noted. Third number is the number of years served as a Town Meeting Member.

One challenge that Belmont Light will face is higher transmission prices. Transmission lines connect power plants to our substation and currently account for about 20% of the total budget. Price increases, like the 30% seen this year, will continue for the foreseeable future. Working with the General Manager, the Board should implement policies to manage these costs and protect customers from price shocks. Advanced Ratemaking, that provides customers with an incentive to shift loads away from costly peak transmission hours, is a start. Local generation and energy storage projects, such as planned for the old incinerator site, will also help.

Belmont Town Meeting

Town Meeting is the legislative branch of town government, used to enact local laws, pass budgets and authorize spending of town money. The Town Meeting form of local government is only used in New England. The Town of Belmont is currently governed by a **Representative Town Meeting**. Voters in town elect **Town Meeting Members (TMMs)**. Only Town Meeting Members may cast votes on the articles.

Belmont Town Meeting has 288 elected members (36 for each precinct) and several at-large members. One third of the members from precincts are elected each spring (12 per precinct). At large TMMs are: Select Board; Moderator; Town Clerk; Treasurer, State Senator; State Representative; and Chairs from: Warrant Committee, Library Trustees, School Committee, Board of Health, Board of Assessors, and Planning Board, unless already elected as Town Meeting Members.

A **Warrant** is published for each Town Meeting, including the date and time of the meeting. Each item of business is called a **Warrant Article**, and Town Meeting can only discuss and vote on articles contained in the Warrant. Articles may be placed on the Warrant by the **Select Board** or by citizen petition.

Annual Town Meeting takes place in the spring, and typically lasts for six evenings (typically Monday and Wednesday). Special Town Meetings are occasionally called at other times of the year. The **Town Moderator** facilitates all Town Meeting sessions and preserves order and decorum.


