# **Program Planning Meeting January date and place TBA**



The Benicia chapter of the League of Women Voters will participate in the yearly Program Planning for national and state organization. Each year we meet as a local league and review the proposed program for either the state league or the US league. Last year we reviewed the proposed program from the LWV US which was the continuation of the Campaign for Making Democracy Work. It was proposed that Leagues throughout the country would work on voting rights, improving elections, campaign finance/money in politics, and redistricting. We concurred and sent the results of our meeting to the LWV US. The LWV US then developed the details of their proposed program reflecting input from all the local leagues and in June Convention delegates adopted the 2018-2020 LWV US Program after debate and discussion.

Every other year our program planning focuses on the proposed program for the state leagues so this year we will be reviewing the program goals of the LWV California. At this writing we have not received information about what those program goals will be. This is an important opportunity for each individual member to express their opinions and formally make their program wishes known to the state. We vote on priority issues and send a report to the LWV CA. We hope everyone can attend. Watch for more information in the January newsletter for date and time.





# League of Women Voters Benicia Voter Service Report Jan-Nov. 2018

Youth Voter Project: April-November: Voting was up to 73 % in Benicia. Reports from the senior center indicated the number of voters had increased from 500 (2016) to 1500. We ended up registering just over 1200 students.


**Budget:** We received a grant of \$1000 in March, 2018, and spent \$784 of that during the Spring campaign on supplies, student treats, volunteer training, student incentives, and Voters Edge bookmarks. In the Fall we spent and additional \$404.

**Results:** Between April and November we registered or preregistered close to 1200 students, meeting and exceeding the goals of the initial grant. Many of those in senior classes were only 17, and weren't able to vote in the primary and/or general election. But they will be ready to go in 2020.

**Schools:** We visited 11 schools in Benicia, Vallejo, and Fairfield. We went to some schools both in the spring and fall. Others we only went once. Volunteers worked in classrooms of 31 teachers, most of whom taught between 4 and 5 classes each, which allowed us to contact an average of 120 students per teacher at the following facilities:

**Volunteers:** Fifty-eight volunteers were trained in the spring. Another 15 received training in the fall. Most of these were not members of the League, but individuals who pledged to follow League non-partisan procedures. All non-league volunteers were accompanied by a League member when presenting to a class of students.

### Methods:

Power point presentation was developed by the Voter Service Team

Contact was made with County School Superintendent's Office who put us in contact with a representative from interested schools.



Direct contact and scheduling was made with individual teachers, and volunteers were assigned.

A volunteer team went to each classroom showed the power point, discussed relevant materials, encouraged students with activities, and guided them through the voter registration forms. If time allowed we reviewed the propositions and measures on the ballot. In some classes, we used online registration which was much faster.

We collected names and phone numbers of students who wanted a text reminder to vote.

**Hours Spent:** Most presentations were 45-50 minutes long, totaling just under 140 hours. Contacting teachers and scheduling took about 2 hours a day, 5 days a week, for six weeks (60 hours). Additional time was need to prepare the power point and purchase materials. Volunteer trainings took two hours each.

### **Events:**

National Walk-Out Day: Staffed tables at three different locations in Benicia/Vallejo

March for Our Lives: Staffed a table at Benicia City Park at the request of BHS student body president.

Be Relevant Civic Forum and Conference, Club Stride, Vallejo: worked with Club Stride students on how to register others to vote, taught them League methods for conducting forums, and 5 volunteers set up and staffed tables at the event on October 21.

### **Community Voter Events:**

**Public Proclamations for National Register to Vote Day:** Proclamations were made by the Solano County Board of Supervisors, Vallejo City Council, and Benicia City Council. League members were present at each meeting to accept the documents.

National Register to Vote Day: One set of four volunteers worked the line at the Vallejo Ferry during the morning rush registering people and reminding them of the upcoming election. Another set of five volunteers staffed a table in front of the Benicia Post Office. The Voter Service team was also responsible for providing and replenishing voter registration forms to the U.S. Post Office Benicia. They had many requests for the forms both before and after National Register to Vote Day. We resupplied three times.

## **Public Speaking Requests Filled:**

PEO, Vallejo: Spoke about the League and propositions on primary ballot.

Benicia Women's Club: Explained the propositions on the general election ballot.

Benicia Heritage Church: Presentation on how to get out the vote.

### Forums:

Forum and Debate on Measure 3, June election: Monica Brown vs. Jim Spering Benicia School Board Candidates

Benicia City Council/ Co-sponsored with AAUW.

### Get Out the Vote:

Placed and collected 25 VOTE! Signs in Benicia and Vallejo, once for the June primary and again for the general election in November.

Texting: three League volunteers texted 310 registered students to remind them to vote.



Rides to the polls: Several volunteers were looking for a centralized system to connect with people who needed rides to the polls. We were not able to accommodate that desire.

**Adopt-a- Poll:** During the primary election, 9 volunteers, all but one League members ran the poll at Club Pacifica, Benicia. Four of us did full day shifts, others did half day. Volunteers have the option of donating their poll worker pay to the League, or keeping it themselves. In June, about \$445 was donated. This fall, ten volunteers, most but not all of them League members, staffed the poll at Club Pacifica, Benicia. They assisted about 250 voters. Two League members worked 15-hour shifts. The rest worked split shifts of 7.5 hours each. As for the primary election, each volunteer had to spend at least 2 hours training in person, with additional hours online.



They are paid for those hours as well as their work on election day. We don't know yet how many choose to donate their pay. Soliciting volunteers and organizing in the fall was difficult as people's schedules kept changing. Recommendations: (1) We either have all League members at the poll who donate as a group to the League, and/or (2) encourage League members to volunteer individually at any poll so as to reduce the organizational issues.

**Voter's Edge:** Three volunteers participated in a full day training early last spring. Due to personal circumstances only one was able to work on Voter's Edge in both the primary and general election. We were able to get all Benicia Candidates to support their information and get it up on the online site two weeks before the general election. The spring election was geared toward a statewide team working to get candidates in the primary to submit info. The process is both fun and very time consuming. However, it is a very worthwhile endeavor to provide candidates a place to put their info free of charge, and provide voters with comprehensive information.

**Partnerships:** We formed formal and informal partnerships for work on voter service events and voter registration with:

Benicia-Vallejo AAUW

Club Stride, Vallejo

Black Women Organized for Political Action (BWOPA), Vallejo

Solano County Food Bank, registered voters at food distribution sites.

AAUW co-sponsored one of our forums, Club Stride held a large conference for students with candidates for office, including those running for Congress, BWOPA registered students at several facilities including Vallejo and Jesse Bethel High this fall, and Solano County Food Bank registered voters at food delivery sites during the fall. Individuals from many other groups got League training and participated with us. People from Vacaville and Fairfield staffed tables at Farmer's Markets in their communities and began the process of working with their high schools to register students to vote.

### Future Plans: (2019-2020)

Solicit and train more volunteers.

Revamp the power point presentation to reflect the issues of the 2020 election.

Begin contacting teachers for in class voter registration in the fall, 2019. The Primary will be early, in March 2019, so we probably won't need to revisit in the spring. Begin registration schools in the early fall of 2020 in anticipation of the 2020 general election

Consider working with teachers/students to do online registration when possible.

Distribute Vote Signs in February and October.

Develop an education campaign to inform adults that the 2020 primary will be held in March instead of June.

Work with volunteers to expand registration into Vacaville and Fairfield Schools

Hold Voter Forums on Propositions and Measures, State Assembly, Senate, and US Congress.

Encourage more volunteers to train and work on Voter's Edge.

Continue to maintain and develop our partnerships.

Volunteers for the Voter Service team met for a pot luck luncheon on Nov. 14 to share and review our volunteer experiences. The 20 people attending included those who registered students in high school classes and at tables during protests as well as those who staffed our Adopt-a-poll at



Club Pacifica, texted voters reminding them to vote, wrote for Voter's Edge, helped organize and moderate three different voter forms or delivered Vote signs. About half of the attendees were League members. The rest were individuals with a deep concern for our election process. Members from our partner groups, Black Women Organizing for Political Action (BWOPA), and American Association of University Women (AAUW) joined Supervisor Monica Brown in honoring the efforts of over 50 volunteers.
