B8 Theatre Company, a small non-profit theatre in Concord, CA is mounting a production of local playwright Susan Sobeloff's *Strange Ladies*. The play tells the story of a group of radical suffragists who fight to win the right to vote as the U.S. enters World War I. A diverse group of women struggle with managing personal and political challenges in creating social change. Period protest music weaves through the play dramatizing the suffragist's political strategies. The play will be performed at the Concord Historical Society Event Center at 1928 Clayton Road, Concord.

B-8 Theatre Company would like to invite League of Women Voters members to come to the play and have the League provide voter registration at the event. League members who are willing to provide voter registration at the theatre will receive a complementary admission to the production. The League's Booth at the **Tomato Festival** was a great success! It could not have been successful without the help of those who staffed the booth and made our booth a welcoming and friendly place. I believe we achieved our goals which were to raise awareness

of the League, to educate the public as to what we are about and to register voters.

The booth was staffed the whole time the Festival was open; Saturday 11 - 7, and Sunday 12 - 5. We registered three people to vote! (It may not sound like a lot, but most people we talked to were already registered.) We handed out 11 voter registration forms! (That IS a lot!) We handed out info about the league or voting at least 10 times! We got five people to sign up for the newsletter, and four people signed up to get text reminders to vote.

Additionally, many interesting conversations took place! Raising the profile of the League in all parts of Solano County is instrumental to our growth and will allow us to have a greater impact in our communities.

The Events and Program Committee is planning several upcoming events. The week of October 15<sup>th</sup> through 19<sup>th</sup> we will be working with the office of the Registrar of Voters for Solano County to hold "Mock Elections". These will be held in four locations throughout Solano County and will be a chance for people to come out and at try the new voting machines. This is also a chance for the Voter's Registrars office to test the machines. More information will be coming out soon!

November 6th at 7 P.M. will be an **Informational Presentation** sponsored by the League of Women Voters Benicia and the SCC Student Life Office. It will be held at 1400 Student Center on the main campus in Fairfield.

This will be open for the general public to attend as well as students from surrounding high schools and those who are just interested in voting, how to vote, why we vote on certain propositions, and the safely of the voting system. We hope the students from surrounding high schools will be excited to step on the campus if they haven't before. John will even bring some voting booth samples to demonstrate that evening. This should be a fun and educational event! We will be looking for League members to help host.

The League is also partnering with the Voter's registrar's office to support their community meetings throughout the county where they will present the new voting machines to the public. This partnership will raise awareness of the League and highlight our nonpartisan status.

**Meet Your Local Officials Events** are in the planning stages for Vacaville and Suisun City as well as the annual Meet Your Local Officials event in Benicia in February.

The Events and Program Committee is planning a **League Mixer Event** so league members can get to know one another and learn more about the league. Look for information on this event soon.

### **Volunteer Training**

On August 19, over 50 volunteers traveled to the Fairfield Civic Center Library for a two-hour workshop on how to register high school students to vote. Board members working with the Voter Service team produced and presented a scripted power point presentation which describes voter rights and responsibilities, information about upcoming elections, and how to fill out the voter registration form. The League presenters (Sandy Coury and Gayle Vaughan) were joined by Solano County Assistant Registrar of Voters, John Gardner, who answered more specific questions and explained how college students and members of the military register to vote. He and his staff then demonstrated the new voting machines and attendees were encouraged to give them a try.



The meeting was open to the public and was attended by members, perspective members, our new voter registration partners, Delta Sigma Theta, and activists from various political groups. All volunteers who will be helping signed a pledge to keep their presentations nonpartisan, not mentioning, supporting, or opposing any candidate or political party.

# **More Volunteer Opportunities**

The county Registrar of Voters will be hosting mock elections throughout the county from Oct. 14-18, to help familiarize voters with the new voting machines. The League will be helping out, by providing trained volunteers. Our first confirmed poll site is Benicia High School. Not only will Voter Service team members register youth to vote, we will assist with collecting information from candidates in Solano County for **Voter's Edge**, the online resource for voters looking for election information. We will begin collecting information in December and continue through February. Most of the work is simple data entry. We will need help to collect data from candidates throughout the county. If you are interested in helping with this important job, please contact vonwindgayle@gmail.com

Additionally, volunteers are encouraged to participate in **Adopt-a-poll.** In this county-sponsored program, groups of volunteers sign up to run a poll during the election. We have signed up to run the poll at Club Pacifica in Benicia. League members in Fairfield and Vacaville are considering which poll to apply for. Poll workers are trained and work shifts (instead of a normal all-day stint) and paid for their time. They have the option of donating their pay to the League. Most groups can earn up to \$3000 per site, making it a good fundraiser for us too! More about this in next month's newsletter.

Finally, Voter Service will be sponsoring **candidate forum** for the March primary. A Benicia forum has already been scheduled in conjunction with AAUW at the Benicia Public Library on January 27. Other county sites and dates are in the works. Stay tuned and remember: Democracy is not a spectator sport!



#### LWV President's Letter

Hello League members,

Welcome to an exciting League year! As we gear up for the March 2020 primary, remember there is more to talk about than League's traditional voter education topics. This year it's time to educate Californians about the US Census and, in some counties, a new elections system. Work them into every conversation, forum, registration effort your League is involved in.



There is only one chance every 10 years to get an accurate count of the people living in California. Census data is used for far more than drawing legislative district lines. It is used in formulas to allocate resources and tax dollars for public safety, planning and disaster response, education needs, hospitals, assistance for veterans and infrastructure needs. Business leaders use Census data to make investment decisions.

Join in <u>LWV's national effort</u> to educate Americans about the importance of the Census. Join your county's Complete Count Committees, or if that is not possible, distribute the information the Complete Count Committees generate. See the <u>update on Census</u> for further information and links.

The second topic for education is the Voter's Choice Act. Over half of all registered Californians will cast their ballots in a slightly new way in March 2020. Fifteen counties will use the Voter's Choice Act version of elections in which each voter receives a vote by mail ballot and the opportunity to cast that ballot in one of three ways. Your far flung neighborhood polling places will be replaced by fewer full service Vote Centers. This is a change for voters, so much education on how this all works is vital. See the <u>update on the Voter's Choice Act</u> for further information for your League to use.

At all your League's events in the coming months, please discuss and distribute written materials on the Census and the new voting system. Talk about it in connection with voter registration and in any situation in which you have contact with voters. Let's do our best to make sure there is an accurate Census and good voter understanding.

Please take some time to review the contents of this Update. There is important information on how to review your League's <u>nonpartisan policy</u>; on how League speaks with <u>one voice</u>; and on the education position <u>update concurrence</u>.

As you do the work of the League, please remember this: A representative democracy only works when all are represented. We are most effective and impactful in our voter service and advocacy work when the League looks like California. We will continue our excellent voter service work; we will continue to deepen our advocacy impact; and we will continue to expand our equity work.
