Coming Events

September's lunch speaker Sheriff Garry McFadden is arguably best known for ending Mecklenburg County's participation in the 287-G program of cooperating with Immigration and Customs Enforcement, which authorizes Homeland Security to deputize local officials to enforce federal immigration law.

The LWVUS immigration position coincides with the Sheriff's stance: The League supports cities, towns, counties and states that make a decision not to cooperate with federal deportation and enforcement actions that include non-criminal undocumented immigrants. The LWVUS position also states: "While policy reforms, including a path to legal status, remain unachieved, the League does not support deporting unauthorized immigrants who have no history of criminal activity."

Sheriff McFadden, with three barbers, was a founder of Cops & Barbers which was recognized by President Barak Obama as "one of the top ten initiatives increasing meaningful relationships in communities."

As a detective with CMPD, McFadden was featured on America's Most Wanted, The First 48, The Justice Files and was a contributor to *People* magazine as well as other national media outlets.

On June 14, 2016, Investigative Discovery channel presented "I Am Homicide" a docuseries highlighting a few of Sheriff McFadden's most complex homicide cases as a homicide detective with CMPD. The debut of this national and international television show allowed Sheriff McFadden to be the first African American Law Enforcement Officer to have his own television show. He has received many awards and recognitions.

CIVICS 101: 23 Years of Citizen Awareness and Education

September 23, October 1,8,15, 22

Much has changed in the last twenty plus years, but one requirement has remained constant – the importance of citizen engagement in local government. Whether newly arrived to Charlotte Mecklenburg or a lifelong resident, we all have the right and the responsibility to be involved in our local government.

The League of Women Voters of Charlotte Mecklenburg invites you to register for our Civics 101 program. These five weekly, one-evening-per-week sessions are designed for you to learn about our local government: City, County Courts, CMS Board of Education and County. During these sessions, speakers including former Mayor Roberts with current and former experience describe the function and share their experiences. The fifth session is when media leaders at the Charlotte Observer including Taylor Batten bring us up-to-date on the newspaper's responsibility to inform citizens. This is particularly important in 2019.

The registration will be on a first-come, first-served basis for a maximum of 60 attendees. The price for the five sessions, including materials, snacks for the first four sessions and a catered dinner at the last one, is \$60, which is not refundable. Primary Election Sept. 10 Early voting is underway for Charlotte's Primary Election

In addition to the election of a representative for the ninth Congressional district Sept. 10, there are primary elections for candidates for Mayor, City Council at Large (you vote for four) and City Council Districts.


In the districts where there are no opponents in the other party, the primary winner will be the elected representative.

You can register and vote the SAME DAY during the early voting period. Early voting continues through Sept. 6, 10 am-7 pm, except for Sunday and Monday, Sept. 1 & 2. Saturday voting is 9 am-1 pm and Sunday voting is 1-4 pm.


You do not need photo ID this year. First time voters, who did not provide ID information on their registration application will be required to provide ID information such as a photo ID or utility bill or government document that shows current address.

Michael Dickerson To Review Voting Machine Issues, Election Security at League Talk Oct. 15

One of the League's most popular speakers will join members at the Oct. 15



League Talk at the League Education Center, 6:30 pm. Michael Dickerson is Mecklenburg County Elections Director.

He will talk about the State Elections Board decisions regarding certification of

voting equipment for 2020 elections.

Activist groups, including the League of Women Voters, asked the board either to reject certification of touch-screen machines under consideration or to slow the process and ask more questions.

Women's Issues - Women's Equality Day

An informal celebration of Women's Equality Day at Resident Culture Brewery drew dozens of new members and League friends Aug. 26.



Women's Issues Action Team is refocusing efforts since passage of ERA by the North Carolina Legislature looks futile this year. Bills introduced in the NC House and Senate were immediately assigned to a committee and have never emerged.

Melba Evans, president of the Charlotte chapter of National Organization for Women, traced the roots of Women's Equality Day, and Women's Issues Action Team leader Cate Stadelman discussed the next steps for pursuing equal rights.

While the team will always be ready to take action when movement on ERA occurs, the group has decided to focus on other issues also crucial to women. Cate has outlined some possible areas of focus. As a practical matter, the action team will not focus on an issue that is already the focus of another LWV team (e.g., voting rights)

Economic Equality: Wage gap, Living wage, Glass ceiling leading to under-representation in positions of power, Affordable, competent child

care for working women

Political Equality: Under-representation in elected office, Voting rights

Legal/Judicial Equality: Equal Rights Amendment, CEDAW (Convention on the

Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women), Underrepresentation in judgeships/court system, Treatment of women in prison



Health Care Equality: Reproductive rights, Under-funding for maternal/child health care, Research studies/drug development

Raleigh Celebration of Women



The NC Department of Natural and Cultural Resources (DNCR), along with the League of Women Voters of North Carolina and other groups, is hosting a non-partisan kick-off event titled **She Changed the World: NC Women Breaking Barriers.** The day-long event will be held on the grounds of the State Capitol Sept. 7, 10 am-3pm. There will be vendors, partner

organizations, exhibitors, food trucks, performances, and a voter registration drive all planned for learning about the women of the past and present who broke barriers in North Carolina and still inspire women today. This event is free and open to all.

The year 2020 marks the 100th anniversary of the passage of the 19th amendment allowing women the right to vote. As part of a national campaign to commemorate this date, DNCR is coordinating a campaign with statewide programming running from March 2019 through November 2020.

In addition to DNCR and the League sponsors include NC Council for Women & Youth Involvement, African American Heritage Commission, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, American Indian Women of Proud Nations, and National Council of Negro Women.

On stage at 10 am, will be Chief Justice of the NC Supreme Court Cheri Beasley, First Lady of North Carolina Kristin Cooper, The Honorable Beverly Perdue and representatives from each of the sponsors.

Presentations and performances will be on stage 11 am-2 pm.

At 1:30, League of Women Voters will be represented by **Dianna Wynn**, President, LWVWake County, and LWVNC President **Jo Nicholas** will do a reenactment of state League founder Gertrude Weil.

Dozens of exhibitors and vendors will be on the State Capitol grounds throughout the day.
