Robert Dawkins Headlines League Lunch Wednesday, Jan. 10, 11:30 am

Robert Dawkins, founder and state organizer for the SAFE Coaltion, will speak to League members Jan. 10 about building public trust and accountability in NC law enforcement. The meeting is at the League Education Center, 1817 Central Ave., Rm. 210, and is open to the public.

Begun in 2013 to promote police accountability, **SAFE stands** for **Safety**, **Accountability**, **Fairness and Equity**. The group also advocates for criminal justice reform and issues that will help build safe, sustainable communities.



SAFE Coalition is made up of over 15 community-based advocacy groups working to end discriminatory profiling and promote civil liberty protections for all North Carolina residents. SAFE Coalition NC's advocates are victims of police and neighborhood violence, concerned residents and allied organizations. It is organized to promote police accountability as well as criminal justice reform, the re-enfranchisement of people previously convicted and an end to community violence. Its goal is to build safe, sustainable communities that are not reliant on government intervention or law enforcement to become united and strong.

According to Mr. Dawkins, SAFE believes that change will be won through leadership development, community dialogue, direct action and grassroots organizing.

Mr. Dawkins was the Western NC field organizer for Democracy North Carolina for seven years before starting SAFE. He was the Head Organizer for the Charlotte chapter of ACORN for three years where he worked in low to moderate income neighborhoods building neighborhood capacity, power and leadership.

He has a B.A in Political Science from the University of South Carolina, a Graduate Certificate in Nonprofit Management from the University of North Carolina Charlotte and is currently working on his M.A in Social Justice at Loyola University Chicago.

Mr. Dawkins serves as a board member for Action NC, and he has been the recipient of the Bill of Right's Defense Committee's Patriot Award, The Black Workers for Justice's Self Determination Award and The United House of Prayer's Trendsetter Award for his work on police accountability.

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EDUCATION ADVOCACY

The LWVCM Education Committee is tackling these urgent issues currently:

School Equity

A wide-ranging study by the committee using Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools data confirms the significant correlation between high needs schools and lower achievement levels as well as lower student growth. NC Grading System

Cheryl Milam wrote a Special to the Observer published Dec. 18 on "Why Your Kid's School May Go From a "C" to an "F" with the 2018 change of the criteria for grading schools.

She wrote "The change that the North Carolina General Assembly has made in how N.C. public and charter schools are ranked in 2018 is a disaster waiting to happen — and it's entirely avoidable."

Cheryl, a former school administrator, also lamented the low credit given for growth in student performance as part of the score.

She declared "Nothing will have changed in your child's school – just this arbitrary scale. For a legislature that purports to be leading the way for business development and improving our standard of living, this misguided effort to "improve" schools will only result in shooting ourselves in the foot."

School Funding

Following work on voter approval of the record-breaking CMS bond issue, the Funding Subcommittee continues to monitor the Joint Legislative Task Force on Education Finance Reform which is reviewing the formulas used to allot funds to local school systems. Changes being considered will have tremendous impact on CMS.

There's More:

Class Size Changes

The Legislature's 2017 mandate to lower class size in lower elementary grades without providing additional funds to school systems for more teachers and classroom space is causing an uproar across the state. Members are writing letters to the editor and to legislators demanding a delay in implementation until appropriate plans can be made.

Charter School District

Education committee members are warily watching legislative consideration of permitting the cities of Matthews and Mint Hill to create their own charter schools. According to CMS governmental liaison Charles Jeter, "It's a seismic change in the education policy of this state." He told the Charlotte Observer that the bill sponsored by state Rep. Bill Brawley "would let towns that are whiter and more affluent than the county at large use property tax money to create separate public schools for their residents. . We believe that this is a resegregation of Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools."

Youth Voter Registration

LWVCM received another award (this one of \$700 from the LWV Education Fund for 2018) to fund voter registration activities at some Charlotte public high schools in the spring of 2018. Voter Service Director Marian Silverman plans a January meeting to set up coverage for the selected high schools, enter voter contact data into a database and send "reminder to vote" postcards for the primary and general elections. She will be working with Layna Hong (East Meck HS) on her senior community service project to register youth voters at her school.

Boosting Voter Turnout with Vote411 and many PR efforts

Off-year elections, like the 2017 September primary and November general elections are traditionally very low turnout. Therefore, League efforts to raise voter interest should get some (a lot of?) credit for a turnout in Mecklenburg County 4.5 percentage points higher than the state as a whole and 2.5 points higher than the election four years ago.

2017 was the first time LWVCM, under the leadership of **Beth Springston**, used the site Vote411 for a municipal election to provide a local voter guide. For both the primary and general elections, candidates for Charlotte Mayor, City Council and School Board races answered League questions and provided biographical information.

With a grant from BlueprintNC, Beth printed bookmarks, magnets, balloons, and placed some advertising. Several social media postings promoted the information and voting. The League partnered with DemocracyNC on a print version of the information for the general election.

Did it make a difference?

Out of all the Vote411 users in the state, 34% were from Mecklenburg County. Since the county is just under 10% of the state population, that certainly looks like our PR efforts paid off.

A big vote of thanks goes to all the volunteers who helped. Barbara Bleiweis spearheaded the effort to get the word out by having tables at events and handing out bookmarks. Mary Kaczmarek gathered volunteers the last week before the general election who handed out thousands of bookmarks in uptown Charlotte. Debbie Snowdon organized the Labor Day Parade and got us marching with Vote411 banners. Marcia Arnholt, Tom Bowers and Ann Wood made lots of phone calls reminding candidates to respond.

Beth is working with LWVNC on a plan for 2018 to increase the visibility of Vote411 statewide.

The 2018 state primary is May 8, so work will be starting on

Vote411 in February. Volunteers will be needed to help contact candidates to get their information in. That's something you can do from home on your schedule. Contact Beth Springston at bethspr@gmail.com

MEMBERSHIP, LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT (MLD)

Sometime in your League life you may hear the initials MLD. It stands for Membership and Leadership Development and involves coaching offered to local Leagues to help them increase membership and to identify and promote new leaders in the group.

North Carolina Leagues found that coaching, which began for some groups in 2006 with a Shur Fellows grant, did help increase membership--even before the onslaught of new members after the 2016 election.

During conference calls, usually monthly, coaches employ the techniques of appreciative inquiry and active listening by asking leading questions that lead to solutions or rethinking about League issues. Coaches emphasize the use of "best practices" to attract and retain members as well as to identify and groom potential leaders.

Explanations of best practices are offered by LWVUS in Guidances which detail suggestions for carrying out such League activities as voter registration, nominating officers and selecting issues to study. The Guidances can be accessed at LWV.org by anyone interested in such topics.

Pres. Hurt's Judicial Press Conference Remarks

Good Afternoon. I am Delores Johnson Hurt, President of the League Women Voters Charlotte Mecklenburg.

For those of you not familiar with our organization, we are a non-partisan, grassroots, political organization that encourages informed, active participation in our government.

The founders of the League of Women Voters and their predecessors led a 70-year fight for the right of women to vote in this country. They marched. They protested in front of the White House in blizzard conditions. They lobbied. They went on hunger strikes. They employed powers of persuasion.

Finally, in 1920, women were able to vote.

The League, therefore, is not new to the struggle of fighting for voting rights, equal rights, civil rights, women's rights and a representative government for all.

This newest battle - why we're here today - is the general assembly's attack on an independent judiciary. Its leaders want to gerrymander judges, name cronies to judgeships, limit judges to paltry two-year terms. The goal is not to improve the condition of the judiciary in the state, but in another greedy grab for power and control - destroy the pillar of the separation of powers we have long cherished in this country.

And all this is being done because recent judges - in the spirit of truth and fairness and democracy - have rebuked attempts to deny black Americans like me, other people of color, young people and the elderly - a say in our government.

What is being done is deplorable and we must fight every attempt to turn this country back.

So what do we do? We educate - as we are doing today. We lobby. We protest - and we vote out those who mean us no good! Thank you.

Also participating was "Democracy Bob" Harrison, who sang the "Gerrymandering Blues." to end the program.
