

Many of those same suffragettes who gained the right to vote also created the League of Women Voters 100 years ago, and it is still active today empowering voters.

Brentwood Special Election and Voter's Edge

Brentwood is holding a special election on November 5, 2019. *Measure L* is an Initiative "to Allow for Development of Residential Dwellings and Commercial/Civic Uses, and the Protection of Open Space, by amending the Urban Limit Line, the Brentwood General Plan, and Municipal Code; Adopting a New Specific Plan; Constructing Road Improvements; and Providing Funds for Public Facilities".

If you live in Brentwood, go to Voter's Edge, http://votersedge.org/en/ca, and type in your address to find information about Measure L. You will see the text of the measure, and links to news articles, editorials, letters to the editor, and web sites supporting and opposing the measure, and a video of the CCTV Forum on the measure that LWVDV cosponsored with the Elections Department. Measure L information on Voter's Edge was added by LWVDV volunteers.

The Action Committee meets **Saturday, November 2nd, from 10** am—noon in the League Office, 500 St. Mary's Rd., Lafayette. The committee meets monthly to discuss LWV and local issues and

priorities. When appropriate, the Committee may recommend that the LWVDV Board take action on an issue, such as writing a letter, making a statement, or endorsing a local measure. For example, the Board recently sent a letter in support of an Independent Redistricting Commission in Martinez.

Local issues that will be discussed at the November 2nd meeting include the Contra Costa Transportation Authority (CCTA) Tax Measure that will be on the March 3, 2020 ballot, and General Plans being developed by Contra Costa County, Martinez, Pleasant Hill, Oakley, and Walnut Creek. Join the discussion! There will also be a petition signature training for the Schools and Communities First initiative by LWVDV member Lisie Thayer.

Suffragists You Need to Meet

Maria W. Stewart



Maria W. Stewart was born in Connecticut in 1803. She was orphaned at the age of five. While she attended Sabbath School, she was basically self- educated. At the age of fifteen, she was working as an indentured servant. Stewart later became a teacher, writer and activist. In 1826, she was an important abolitionist speaker in Boston. In 1831, Stewart became the first black woman to be published in *The Liberator*, William Lloyd Garrison's abolitionist newspaper. Stewart began speaking for all women's rights by 1832. Ultimately, she became the first

woman to speak to a mixed gender and race audience about economic justice. Maria W. Stewart died in 1879. She is credited with being the first known American-born woman to lecture publicly on political issues.
