One highlight of her high school years was marching in the third inaugural parade for Franklin D. Roosevelt in early 1941. Jean graduated in 1942 and went onto San Diego State College and then to U.C. Berkeley for an undergraduate degree in Foreign Languages. She married Bob in 1949 and they had five children, four girls and one son.



Jean was passionate about her family, but also about crossword puzzles, reading, travel, and volunteering. Organizations like PTA, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, AAUW, League of Women's Voters, and H.I.S. House, to name a

few, benefited from her energy and commitment. She campaigned for and won two terms as an elected official on the Placentia Library Board, served as President of the Placentia-Yorba Linda AAUW branch, and served as an elder and deacon at both of the Presbyterian Churches she called her spiritual homes.

Check Voters Edge and Easy Voter Guide for Election Information



Voters Edge is a website maintained by our League volunteers; it contains information on your ballot. Go to the website and enter your address, and the

candidates for office on your ballot are listed: <u>https://votersedge.org/en/ca</u>. It is easy to use and can help you prepare who you plan to vote for but does not endorse candidates. The information for each candidate is entered by the candidate and reviewed by a League member to make sure it is factual.

Another helpful resource is the Easy Voter Guide, which is free for download after Sept. 4: <u>http://www.easyvoterguide.org/</u>. It is available in several languages and gives basic information on voter registration deadlines and voting procedures. It also lists the California League's opinion on the statewide Propositions; although the League does not endorse candidates it may take a position on statewide Propositions.

HASPA Acts to Protect the Hayward Shoreline

The Hayward Area Shoreline Planning Agency (HASPA) will hold a **public meeting at 3:00 PM on October 8, 2020 at the Hayward Shoreline Interpretive** **Center** located on Breakwater Avenue, Hayward. HASPA is a joint effort by representatives of the City of Hayward, the East Bay Regional Park District (EBRPD) and the Hayward Area Recreation and Park District (HARD).

Since early 2019 HASPA has been studying alternatives to protect the natural and man-made features along the Hayward shoreline from increasing sea level rise (SLR). HASPA intends to complete and issue their master plan report before the end of 2020. Among the goals of HASPA are to:

• Create a resilient shoreline for people and the environment

- Reduce risk to critical infrastructure and other built assets
- Foster education, interpretation, and support for the Hayward shoreline

• Adapt the shoreline to continuing SLR due to climate change

CLIMATE CHANGE and GLOBAL WARMING

Regarding sea level rise (SLR), I'm going to quote now from John Englander, oceanographer and sea level rise expert who has studied this issue extensively. He recently presented three questions and their answers:

1. Will we stop SLR this century?

2. Will we recognize the scale of the problem and adapt wisely to limit the


consequences of SLR?

3. Will we adapt to SLR?

Mr. Englander answers Question 1 by stating that 'we can no longer stop SLR this century; there is far too much heat already stored in the ocean' (as a result of burning fossil fuels). He continues; 'Tackling the challenge of rising sea level cannot be done effectively in "baby steps"; it is going to take some giant strides. Man has already warmed the global ocean by one degree Celsius. The glaciers and ice sheets are going to continue to melt for many decades even if we immediately cut all use of fossil fuels which generate most greenhouse gas (GHG). On our current path of fossil fuel use, the rate of SLR is, in fact, accelerating.'

I will leave for later Mr. Englander's response to Questions 2 and 3. For now, let's look at the sources of this country's GHG, and what we in Eden Area can do to reduce emissions.

According to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), GHG are generated mainly by using fossil fuels for the following uses:



These percentages vary a little from year to year, but the Transportation sector generates the largest share of GHG emissions in this country; primarily from the burning of gasoline and diesel fuel for our cars, trucks, ships, trains and airplanes. So, let's tackle Transportation GHG emissions first. Individuals have the most impact on this sector because we all personally operate fuel-burning vehicles. Last time, I asked readers to 'think big' about how we get off burning so much fossil fuel for our needs. Let's think big about getting off gasoline and diesel, two fuels which power our transportation needs. Here's my first-cut idea of a "giant stride": Let's have the federal government help buy everyone an electric car or truck, if they turn-in their gas-fueled vehicle. Have you stopped laughing? Let's look at the numbers. There are almost 300 million fossil fuel-burning cars and trucks and commercial trucks in the USA. Say we want to replace as many of these as possible with electric battery-powered vehicles over a twenty year period. Say the government offers to pay 50% of the cost for a new electric-powered vehicle (you individually pay the other 50%), which will be delivered to the owner the day his fossil fuel-powered vehicle is towed away. Say this is possible because the government "negotiates" with

the vehicle manufacturers to scale-up to handle the production volume and receive fantastic sales numbers <u>if</u> they offer the vehicles for an average price of \$25,000. (Yeah, I know what a Tesla costs, but I am not talking about everyone getting one of those.) I'm talking about cost savings due to high volume.

If only 2/3 of the vehicle owners are willing to turn-in their gas or diesel guzzler for a new electric vehicle, what does this program cost? About \$125 billion a year for 20 years. That's a lot of money, but less than 20% of what the Defense Department spends every year. I suggest we can afford that, especially if we cut their budget some. Of course the devil is in the details, and you'd have to be aware of clever folks who want to scam the program, so this would take some sharp people to design and manage this program. But we could make it work. We're Americans, remember? OK, you don't like my idea. What is your "giant-stride" idea to get us guickly off fossil fuel-powered vehicles?

Have you already made the move to an electric vehicle? Personally, I own a plug-in hybrid car. We use it mostly on battery for in-town use, so it seldom operates on gasoline. In fact, we visit a gas station only about once a quarter. It is very well designed and very comfortable. We love it. We also own an eight year old gasoline powered SUV. We have decided already that we will never buy another gasolinepowered vehicle, so when we replace this SUV in a few years, we will buy an electric vehicle.

The State of California has taken a good "giant stride" to get us off gasoline and diesel-powered trucks. In June of this year, the state Air Resources Board ruled that automakers must sell more electric trucks starting in 2024, and by 2045 <u>all</u> new trucks sold in the state should be zero-emissions; that means electric-battery-powered. Of course, the diesel truck manufacturers are crying, but tears won't stop global warming. Let our local state legislators know that you support this policy because the diesel engine truck manufacturers and trucking companies are trying to pressure the legislature to resist such policies. Remember, our goal is to reduce the 28% of GHG emissions from the Transportation sector. This isn't going to happen fast enough without bold personal and regulatory action.

The other vehicles which burn fossil fuels are ships, trains and airplanes. I will not suggest that you stop making airplane flights, but I will suggest that if we returned to making more things in this country then we could reduce the use of ships to import as much as we do and then railroad it across the state and country. Such trains pass through the Eden Area every day. Next time, we'll look at another of the sectors in the GHG emissions pie-graph above, and discuss how we can reduce the use of fossil fuels in that sector. Remember our goal here is to slow global warming to reduce many consequences including SLR and the impact on our Havward---San Lorenzo---San Leandro shoreline of our Eden Area communities.

By the way, Mr. Englander's response to Questions 2 above is that he is pessimistic based on the inadequate overall level of planning he is seeing across the country. That's why I urge readers to become more informed on the whole global warming/climate change issue and press your California and federal representatives to take bold action.

His response to Question 3 above, in light of his response to Question 2, is that 'Fortunately the actual rise of base sea level is slow enough that there is time to get out of harm's way. In fact, there is no choice. In the end, the sea will win. We will adapt. We will move to higher ground."
