So you are a member now... What should you do? Engage!

When you are a LWV of Hingham member you are also a member of the bigger movement- LWUS and LWVMA. It is your opportunity to engage in all of the work that needs to be done!

Attend a LWVH Board Meeting- See the work being done, join the conversation and you will want to be a part of it!

Candidates Forum- Pitch in with our Hingham Candidates forums. Chris Wilk is a master but she needs timers, question collectors, question writers etc. You will work with someone who is on top of this program and incredibly nice too. Or become <u>trained to be a Moderator</u>. This LWVMA training can be invaluable for your job, organizations and committee work.

Poll Watching- Have you ever been trained to be a poll watcher and worked at polls that could possibly have an issue e.g. machines breaking down, lines leading down the street, running out of ballots, incorrect language ballots, disability hurdles? We're so lucky in Hingham. Sign up here to work polls in Boston, Dorchester, Hyde Park, Mission Hill, JP, Lawrence, Lowell, Worcester, Springfield, Randolph, Brockton, and Stoughton. You pick the time and location. League training is at Harvard Law, BU Law and Boston Bar Association. See our FB post for info.

Register Voters- Our local League would like to expand our voter registration efforts and we need help! It would be great to pitch in and help Chair Lisa Stein register students in Cohasset, Weymouth and Notre Dame. The LWVMA has had requests for members to register voters at: MIT, Patagonia, Mass Audubon (Marshfield) and *Google (*They are running our high school videos "Get in the Game" in their offices too. Check out those creative kids.)

Read the LWV Newsletters- We are all swamped with emails however the <u>LWVH</u>, <u>LWVMA</u>, LWVUS newsletters give plenty of opportunities for you to stop feeling frustrated and to do something!

Spread the Message- There are great <u>resources</u> developed by our League (Eileen McIntyre) to be an informed voter. The LWVMA <u>www. Testify at the State House- Or sit in on the League's testimony and see how the democratic process works.

Education Forum Highlights

Many thanks to Julie Strehle for hosting our October meeting. Michelle Ayer, Chair, Hingham School Committee and Vice Chair Liza O'Reilly discussed with us education projects that are front-and-center for the Committee and the Town this Fall. High priority items include the superintendent search and the need to replace Foster School.

- The search for a new school superintendent to replace the retiring Dot Galo (who retires at the end of the 2018-2019 school year) began months ago with focus groups and a survey of stakeholders as input to a candidate profile. Based on that criteria, a search is now underway and a Screening Committee has been named. The Committee targets having a new superintendent selected in January, allowing for an orderly transition. More on the process, including Candidate profile, at link below.
- The need to replace Foster School is another top priority and the Town awaits a November response to Hingham's second application for state funds to pay a portion of this project. If we get good news from the state, the Foster School Building Committee can begin working with the feasibility study budget approved at Town Meeting in April 2017.
