- **Safety** Students could research emergency preparedness, especially as it affects shut-ins (people with disabilities and seniors). CERT is a place to start.
- **Hunger/Poverty/Mental Health** After studying these issues, students could design a YouTube video to raise awareness.
- **Environment** Students could research the impact of trash on rivers and oceans, partner with the Los Angeles Beautification Team and Friends of the Los Angeles River, and create posters to educate the community about the importance of zero waste. Students could contact the Department of Sanitation for free canvas bags to distribute.

- **Graffiti** Students could research the social conditions underlying graffiti, and partner with New Directions for Youth for graffiti clean up. Connect with the Social and Public Art Resource Center for graffiti as art.
- Water Conservation and Alternative Energy Partner with DWP, create a home/business survey, and make recommendations to homeowners and business owners for low-cost energy savings, e.g. switching to LED lights and solar feed in tariff.
- **Transportation** Students could research how cities are cutting down on fossil fuel dependence by encouraging bicycle and what the city is doing to support bicycle lanes.

This office would support a student-driven leadership group. One issue to consider is teen pregnancy.

- **Bicycle Transportation** environmental / healthy benefits of bicycling. Student could help the City Council collect bicycle data in order to get funding for bicycle lanes. Partner with Rotary Club, neighborhood councils, and LA Bike.
- **Community Clean Up** Study the connection between litter and community health/safety. Partner with L.A. Street Services and Housing Department to distribute packets to apartment renters. Partner with the City Department of Sanitation, City Board

of Public Work's Office of Community Beautification, and groups such as the World Church of God that provided over 300 volunteers in the Valley to participate in community clean up. (L.A. County Department of Public Works)

- Public Service Announcements and Videos to raise awareness about issues Cleveland High School's Media Center produces professional quality film projects. (Note: Councilmember Blumenfield is on the California State Film Commission.)
- **Technology** Councilmember Blumenfield is working toward city-wide free internet access. Another project has to do with city department websites; Councilmember Blumenfield is working to create ways for these independent websites to interface.
- Clean Energy Jobs and Manufacturing What is Los Angeles City doing in this area? What businesses and non-profit organizations have this as a goal, too? Chambers of Commerce? The Valley Economic Alliance of the San Fernando Valley
- Alternative Energy What is Los Angeles City doing to promote solar, wind, and other sources of non-fossil fuel energy? How are businesses addressing this issue?
- Water Conservation How is Los Angeles addressing the drought? Students can research ways to conserve water, partner with DWP and non-profits such as Tree People to inform the public, and present findings to elected officials.
- Los Angeles River Project What would it mean to restore a riparian ecosystem?
- **Disaster Preparedness** Note that in a major emergency, the Valley will be cut off from Los Angeles. How will we transport people to shelters? Home-bound people can be registered with the Fire Department. Research what the Los Angeles Mayor's office and the non-profit Los Angeles Emergency Preparedness Foundation are doing to prepare our city.
- Human Trafficking To what extent is the public aware of "modern slavery"? Partner with the Coalition to Abolish Slavery and Trafficking, the National and the Mary Magdalene Project, and the National Council of Jewish Women (Maya Paley, Director of Legislative and Community Engagement at 323-852-8536 or <u>maya@ncjwla.org</u>) are valuable resources for students to learn about the issue and to become actively involved in solving this complex problem.

- Safe Passage is a program that Wesson's office created in partnership with Community Build in Leimert Park to identify "hot spots", where students are accosted to/from school for drug sales or gang recruitment. Before Safe Passage, high school attendance was 70%. After Safe Passage, attendance has increased to 85%.
- **Community Gardens** Students could research the benefits of creating such gardens on high school campuses and community spaces. Some resources: Los Angeles Neighborhood Land Trust, Master Gardeners (email Yvonne Savio <u>ydsavio@ucanr.edu</u>), California School Garden Network.
- **Homelessness** Students could research the relationship between mental health and homelessness. On a related issue, students could learn about the issue of food deserts in poor communities. - Voter Registration Focus on young voters. To avoid having to re-register each time they move (dorm, apartment, etc.), use parents' address. Teach people to register online.

- **Community Walks:** Councilman and entire staff walk a different neighborhood each month. They knock on the door of each home and business in the area to ask residents about their questions and concerns and to inform them about what is available in their own neighborhood. They are developing and distributing a resource guide for the area. Police, sanitation and other community workers walk with them. Students are welcome to accompany them on these walks. They could have conversations with staff as they walk. Students joining the tour could identify a community need that they might wish to address as a Service Learning project. (Tour might be arranged for students at Newmark.)
- * To improve the district's environment and infrastructure, O'Farrell has led over 50 clean-up drives and several physical improvement projects. Students could study the positive/negative effects of clean/run-down neighborhood and participate in clean ups.
- * In laying out the future of the LA River, O'Farrell spearheaded the city council's final authorization of the River Improvement Overlay Ordinance, which supports the Los Angeles River Revitalization Master Plan. Students could study environmental issues and participate in the planning/rehabilitation of the river.
- * O'Farrell's policy agenda also involves coping with and addressing the adverse effects of gentrification. Students can study the needs of homeless, seniors, veterans, and discover ways they can become productive members of their community.

- **Internships:** Students are eligible to apply for internships at each Field Office in this district.
- Student Trips to City Hall: The Legislative Deputy brings students to City Hall.
