LWVMC 2020-2021 - Annual Report

We are calling this past year "The Year of Zoom". Although Covid-19 deprived us of the camaraderie of inperson meetings, we were energized by the increased attendance at meetings and workshops through Zoom and embraced our unusual circumstances by inviting diverse and prominent speakers from far and wide. We charged ahead to get out the vote, clarify voting issues, lobby our legislators, advance racial justice, examine solutions to poverty, lobby in support of responsible government, and found common purpose through civic engagement. We advocated for resilience and adaptation in the face of climate change, celebrated our past, and progressed into our future.

Advocacy

- Masked-up in July, we gathered about half the signatures needed to place Home Rule Charter, (an
 effective form of holding local government accountable) on the November ballot.
- Wrote Letters to County Commissioners and Letters to the Editor in support of Home Rule.
- Urged members to support specific (over 30) State legislative bills during the 2020 session.
- Attended LWVWA Action Workshop in December record turnout.
- Attended LWVWA Lobby Week in February record turnout. We met with Rep. MacEwen's Legislative Aid to advocate for democracy bills.
- Wrote a letter to Board of County Commissioners in support of HB 1590 (using funds for low-income housing).
- Wrote three different Letters to the Editor that voiced our support for democracy, climate, Asian American Pacific Islanders, housing, and environmental concerns.
- Sent a letter to Port of Shelton opposing Regional Airport location in our area.
- Inaugurated a Speak Up School Committee to educate citizens about re-districting and training them to prepare and present testimony in public hearings on re-districting.
- Received regular updates from our Observer Corps on local government agendas.
- Hosted nine programs/speakers to encourage dialogue on current topics.

Voter Empowerment

- More than 35 get out the vote volunteers participated in our Postcard Project to send 4991
 handwritten postcards encouraging new voters, voters who didn't vote in 2016, and voters from a low
 turnout precinct. Financial support of \$1500 from an anonymous donor, plus many volunteers
 purchased their own stamps. The entire effort was submitted to LWVWA as a nomination for the Local
 Leagues' Strengthening Democracy Award.
- Coordinated with Mason County Elections on Be Vote Ready campaign. Attended voter registration training.
- Voter Services Committee registered voters in person in September and October at various sites and distributed TRY (They Represent You) and information flyers.
- Dressed in suffragist costumes on National Voter Registration Day and waved signs to Vote Early.
- Wrote three Letters to the Editor on the topics of voter information and voter encouragement.
- Participated in two iFiberOne News_Radio interviews.
- Attended Civic Engagement meeting with author of "The State We're In".
- Partnered with other counties to produce Candidate Forums.

Membership Outreach

- 70 members total, 18 of whom are new to our League.
- Held one League 101 orientation with 16 new members in attendance.
- Initiated a Telephone Tree to stay connected during the pandemic.

- Focused on ways to engage membership through seven different committees: Voter Services, Climate Change, Observer Corps, Advocacy, Centennial Projects, Growth Management Study, and Speak Up School.
- Purchased and distributed "Impact on Issues" 2020-2022.
- Distributed "The State We're In" to new members.
- Sent out numerous colorful and information-packed electronic invitations.
- Formed a Tech Communications Team.

Centennial Committee

- Eight League members worked to bring a spotlight on seven "Women Leaders of Mason County" who pushed the boundaries, demonstrated civic spirit, and represented the diversity of our county.
- Supported with a Mason County Preservation Commission grant and funds from our LWVMC budget.
- Biographies of each woman have been recorded and posted on our website and shared with the LWVWA.

Climate Change Committee

- Held 13 programs with prominent speakers to accomplish its mission: "to increase awareness of
 climate change and its projected impacts on our local economy, environment, and quality of life; to
 evaluate local, state, and national energy/climate change initiatives and legislation; and to coordinate
 with other organizations advocating for policies to lessen and forestall climate change impacts.
 Working as a non-partisan group, the committee will share scientific, objective information from up-todate and reliable sources with local and state businesses, governmental leaders, and our community."
- Connected with scientists, youth groups, tribes, legislators, business concerns, industry concerns, ordinary citizens, environmental justice groups, local government, and local media.
- Established ongoing contacts with the media, school districts, climate justice groups, and LWVWA Climate Issue Chair.
- Wrote letters to The Shelton Mason County Journal, Port of Shelton, Shelton City Council (four total).
- Meetings were publicized and reported by The Shelton Mason County Journal.

Growth Management Act

• A new study group formed to focus on the function of local growth management.

New Leadership Model

• Our nominating committee proposed, created, and nominated a four-member leadership model to share the goals and tasks of leadership for our upcoming year – 2021-2022.

By Leadership Team MOVING FORWARD: 2021-2022

The new four- member Leadership Team composed of Lynn Busacca, Dee Ann Kline, Nancy Snyder, and Cheryl Williams is a unique leadership model in LWVWA. The responsibilities of leadership have been divided so that each member of the Leadership Team will be responsible for coordinating the



meetings and activities for specific months of the year. Each member will also provide support to one or more of the Committees.

We begin our new program year with uncertainty of the impact of emergence of the Delta variant of Covid. Safety of our members is forefront in determining how we can carry on our League activities and engage with the public in civic activities. For the near future, board and general meetings will be held via ZOOM.
