

Food For Thought: Challenges and opportunities facing farmers and consumers in New Hampshire

The New Hampshire advantage is going directly to the farm and picking apples, selecting peaches, squash and pumpkins and enjoying that end of the season sweet corn and big red sun-ripened tomatoes. The local farm stands and farmers' markets add all sorts of fresh foods to our tables. Although we enjoy this advantage, most of us have given little thought to the challenges facing New Hampshire farmers.

The League of Women Voters of the United States is studying current technology and policy issues in agriculture including genetically modified organisms (GMOs) and genetic engineering, to update our position. Our existing policy on agriculture includes positions on food safety, support for farmers, and regulations to protect the environment.

Road directions: Take **Route 93 to Exit 15 West**. You'll get on Route 202 West. Take first **right** turn after the cloverleaf onto Commercial Street (yellow blinking lights at that turn). Follow Commercial St to a T intersection, take a **right** turn and then a **right** turn into the parking lot of Horseshoe Pond Place.
