The Protecting American Votes and Elections Act Mandates Paper Ballots and Risk-Limiting Audits in All Federal Elections

May 15, 2019

Washington, D.C. Sen. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., and 14 Senate co-sponsors today introduced an expanded version of his bill to protect American elections from foreign interference by mandating hand-marked paper ballots and setting new cybersecurity standards for all federal elections. The bill provides the strongest protection for American elections of any proposal currently before Congress.

The PAVE Act requires paper ballots and statistically rigorous "risk-limiting" audits for all federal elections – two measures <u>recommended by experts</u> in a National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine 2018 report on election security. Read a summary of the bill <u>here</u>.

"The Russian government interfered in American elections in 2016, and if we don't stop them, they and other governments are going to do it again. The administration refuses to do what it takes to protect our democracy, so Congress has to step up. Our bill will give voters the confidence they need that our elections are secure," Wyden said. "The PAVE Act scraps insecure voting machines that are juicy targets for hackers and replaces them with reliable, secure hand-marked paper ballots. It gives states the funding they need to defend their election systems and puts the Department of Homeland Security in charge of setting strong security standards for every federal election."

News of the Week from LWVUS

Cecile Scoon, first vice president of the League of Women Voters of Florida and civil rights lawyer in Panama City, denounced the Florida legislature for flouting the will of voters to restore voting rights for former felons in an **opinion piece for the** *Washington Post*. Scoon calls out the legislature's "afront to the democratic process," and indicates that the League is working hard to right this wrong.

A judge ruled in favor of affordable housing in Los Angeles, on <u>a case which LWV Los</u> <u>Angeles joined as amicus</u>. The tentative ruling is an important step in protecting affordable housing for vulnerable communities in Los Angeles.

LWVWI executive director Erin Grunze **penned an op-ed** in which she addresses the reasons why the Wisconsin Legislature's extraordinary lame-duck session goes against the will of voters. LWVWI is one of the plaintiffs challenging the constitutionality of the 2018 extraordinary session.

Tragedy and disaster are as far removed from this quiet, foggy morning in suburbia as figments of a nightmare are from morning coffee. Yet across the country at this moment residents of New Orleans are engaged in a struggle for survival in the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina. On the other side of the globe in Iraq, hundreds perished yesterday when panic over rumors of a terrorist bomber gripped a crowd of pilgrims on a bridge in Baghdad. On the other side of the Pacific Ocean, far from my morning walk, survivors of the massive tsunami in Indonesia still struggle to put their lives back together.

Here are only the tentative chirping of early birds getting their worms and the droning mowers and blowers of gardeners dutifully completing their rounds. Complacency is such a comfort here in the land of earthquakes, fires, and drought, yet in reality the only thing between me and catastrophe is good luck and time. Succinctly stated, no one gets out of life alive; consequently, we should all spend some of our energy when times are good preparing for times when things will be not so good.

I'm reminded of an evening years ago in my sometimes misspent youth when a friend and I, under the influence of a controlled substance, went to a coffee shop, ordered ice cream and sat and talked. One peculiar effect of the drug we had taken was that time itself seemed to stop dead whenever you were paying attention and accelerated like a roller coaster whenever you didn't. It seemed that if you paid attention, life was infinite, and if you didn't, it flitted away into oblivion in an instant. What actors call "being in the moment" was our only handhold on time.

That night so long ago seems as real to me as this idyllic park in the fog. We normally live not only in the present moment, but in the past as well. Only the future is unknown, and that's a good thing since some of it will inevitably encompass many of our worst fears.

At my stage in life, with one foot still in my productive years and the other already into retirement, I think more about the inevitability of heartache and the end of our days that approaches us all. Obviously, preparation for the bad times includes storing up supplies and making plans for various unpleasant contingencies, but even more important is building the character and courage to face it all. Waiting until trouble has already arrived before mustering up a stalwart soul in oneself is not a good plan. That's a well that needs to be dug way before you get thirsty.
