**SUMMARY:** 

The League of Women Voters of San Joaquin County will be presenting the first in a series of education programs on immigration. The first program "Immigration – Learning the Basics" will provide an overview of the U.S. immigration process for obtaining visas, permanent resident cards, citizenship and asylum.

The program will outline the history of the immigration system, the purpose, timeline and costs related to obtaining legal documents for individuals and families who want to pursue a legal path to stay in the United States. While the League strives to bring quality education to the public on various topics, including U.S. immigration, no actual immigration services will be provided or performed at this event.

Presenters will include Valasay Chang from the Sacramento office of the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (formerly the Immigration and Naturalization Services), and Catholic Charities Diocese of Stockton Immigration Services Program Director, Robin Aronna.
