
Dear Friends and Members of the League,

Voting Rights Are People Rights!

As LWVUS President, Deborah Turner, stated in the League update dated November 18:

"Yesterday I was honored to be one of some 200 people arrested at the White House advocating for the President to stand up for voting rights. Among those arrested were CEO Virginia Kase Solomon, LWV board members and staff, and League members from across the country.

Since we launched our No More Excuses actions in August, an estimated 265 arrests of activists have been made. In these peaceful demonstrations, our activists purposely risked arrest to deliver the critical message to the White House that time is of the essence for voting rights.

Our Legislature

Voting rights legislation continues to remain stagnant in the Senate as we engage in the critical work of redistricting and begin the countdown to the midterm elections. Many voices, particularly the voices of color, youth, and those with financial constraints will be silenced or further disenfranchised if our President doesn't act now. It is up to President Biden to step up and step in. Our democracy depends on this action. We will not give up until voting rights are restored and expanded.

Please continue to contact your elected officials, particularly senators, and encourage them to pass the Freedom to Vote Act and the John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act. Make the effort to sit down with them or their staff during the upcoming holiday break and deliver the League's message of empowering voters."

Redistricting Update: Congressional, State, and County

Redistricting is about power at the ballot box and representation in a democracy. Every ten years, after the federal government completes the census and releases the updated population count, California must redraw the boundaries of its congressional, legislative and state Board of Equalization districts, so that the districts correctly reflect the current populations.

Congressional and State Level

This year, the timeline for the State Advisory Commission to complete its work was shortened due to the late release of the Census data. The Commission had to release preliminary maps for public comment by November 15 and submit a final map to the state by December 27.

Significant changes in Assembly and State Senate Districts are being considered for our area! The State Redistricting Advisory Commission has just released preliminary maps in what is called "visualizations, shape, and equivalency files". The maps are difficult to read due to their size and lack of any documentation regarding impacts—this recent link gives the highest resolution maps. What is important for our League members to know is that our current Assembly District 28 is being divided with Saratoga and Campbell being part of a district extending north to Palo Alto and Atherton ("SAMATEO" region), while Saratoga and Monte Sereno (along with Almaden Valley, Morgan Hill and Gilroy) are in a district extending across the mountains and along the coast including Santa Cruz ("GATOSBANK" region). The State Senate also divides the previous district with Saratoga in the Peninsula region extending up to Pacifica ("PENINSULA" region), while Los Gatos, Monte Sereno and Campbell are in a district composed of the Santa Clara County South Valley and extending from Santa Cruz to Monterey to San Luis Obispo ("SCLARA" region).

The process is moving very fast. If you have any concerns it is important for you to provide your input to the Commission as soon as possible; written input can be given at this $\underline{\text{link}}$:

Janua Ciara County Juper visorial Districts

The SCC League of Women Voters has been closely following the process by the Santa Clara County (SCC) Redistricting Advisory Commission, and our League's County Council has spoken to the Commission in support of League principles, including:

- Substantially equal populations
- Effective representation of racial and linguistic minorities
- Preserving "communities of interest"
- Keeping cities together to the extent possible
- Compactness

On November 2, after much discussion and community input, three maps were selected by the Board of Supervisors for further review and discussion at their next meeting on November 16: the Yellow Map, also called the Unity Map; the Purple Map, developed by the Advisory Committee; and, the EE.2.0 Map also called the Equity Map.

At the SCC Board of Supervisors meeting on November 16, after much community input and Board discussion, the Board voted to forward the Revised Yellow Map for further discussion, review, and possible changes prior to their final adoption vote on December 7. The League is not advocating for specific maps; rather it is *strongly encouraging member awareness*, *particularly those members living in Los Gatos and Monte Sereno*, and encourages citizens to make their personal opinions known.

What do you think? Examine and study the revised map, assess if it meets the criteria that was supposed to be followed, and form your own opinion. If you have an opinion about the map, you should make your personal opinion known in public testimony at the tentatively scheduled upcoming Board of Supervisor meeting on November 23 or at the December 7 meeting where the final vote will be taken. Information on this meeting and Zoom links for public testimony are expected to be posted at https://countyexec.sccgov.org/2021-redistricting-process. Final supervisory district maps must be adopted by December 15 and submitted to the State by December 27.

Bay Area League of Women Voter Activity Updates

The first in a series of Bay Area Community Conversations (through 2021-2022) presented by the Bay Area League will be on **November 30 from 12:00 to 1:00** via Zoom with a Brown Bag Lunch Dialogue on Environmental Justice, featuring a discussion with leaders from APEN (Asian Pacific Environmental Network), and BARHII (Bay Area Regional Health Inequities Initiative). They will examine the unjust and unavoidable disparities that impact communities of color, the elderly, children, and those unable to afford food, quality shelter, fuels for cooling and transportation, or alternatives to contaminated drinking water. Solutions, and how League members can advocate in their communities, will be important questions to be discussed, with possible answers.

Additional note: There will be an optional period from 1:00-1:30 for League members to remain on the call to discuss their priorities, and to talk with each other and to LWVBA leaders about other topics they wish explored with future Community Conversations.

Single-Paver Healthcare Can Save \$\$\$

Researchers from UCSF, UCLA and UC Berkeley examined 22 economic analyses by government, business and academic organizations of national and state-level single payer plans, including proposals made in Massachusetts, California, Maryland, Vermont, Minnesota, Pennsylvania, New York and Oregon—and determined that single-payer systems would result in savings over current systems. Lower administrative and drug costs would be the main reasons for cost savings. Healthcare Around the World

Sixth article in a series about healthcare in other countries



Taiwan

Taiwan spends only 6.4% of its GDP on health care, with access to both Western and Chinese medicine. A large majority of the population says they are satisfied with the health system's overall performance. But doctors see patients at an unbelievable pace—50 to 100 per day—and work late into the night. Only the wealthy can get some of the more innovative treatments. More physicians need to be trained, the number seen by each physician lowered, salaries increased, and new drugs accessed more quickly. Taiwan lacks the infrastructure to coordinate chronic care and mental health care. An increase in spending would give Taiwan the money they need to increase physicians' salaries, train more physicians, and provide the newest drugs more quickly. *Barbara Lea*, *Healthcare Director*

United States

The United States spends 18% of GDP on healthcare—by far the highest in any developed country. There are four components to the system which provides coverage for 290 million citizens: Employer-based health insurance, Medicare for Americans aged 65 and older, Medicaid for lower-income, blind and disabled, and Private insurance purchased by those under 65 without employer-based insurance who earn too much for Medicaid. In 2019, the uninsured population reached nearly 11%. There is no comprehensive long-term care insurance program in the United States. The challenges are many: (1) Excessive cost. Five years ago, costs per person were over \$10,000 a year. (2) The exorbitant price of drugs, with new cancer drugs routinely costing more than \$120,000 per year. Our average drug prices are 56% higher than those in Europe. (3) Physicians and hospitals need to deliver care so it is more cost conscious and increases efficiency. (4) Coverage is still a big problem, with nearly 30 million Americans lacking health insurance. (5) The system is too complex, causing average Americans a struggle to navigate. (6) Annual open enrollment periods should be changed to two or three years to cut costs. (7) As in other countries, the United States suffers from physician burnout. (8) We have a nursing shortage and will need 1 million additional nurses in the next five years. And (9) There is a long-term care crisis looming in the future. Barbara Lea, Healthcare Director

WATER: Conservation -- Save water, save our future

California's rivers and aquifers cannot <u>sustainably provide</u> all the water the state has promised over the years. With growing climate change and more drought in our future, water conservation can help preserve the supply we have and help Californians live sustainably within our water means.

Agriculture uses about 80% of California's "developed" water supply (water delivered for agriculture and urban/suburban use). Conservation/efficiency could reduce agricultural water use by 5.6 to 6.6 million acrefeet (maf), which is about 16-22% of agricultural water use.

Urban/Suburban (including residential, business and industrial) uses about <u>6 to 9 maf per year.</u> We could save a large portion – 2.9 to 5.2 maf – through increased efficiency and through lifestyle/habit modification.

Stormwater Capture: Hundreds of thousands of acre-feet of water, if captured and used, could water crops and gardens, and replenish aquifers (groundwater). Aquifer storage has many benefits over surface reservoirs.

Water Reuse: Getting a second or third use out of water, including graywater and even blackwater, could mean over a million more acre-feet of water available for local needs.

Small Progress toward Equality in Education

The following news organizations: New York Times, Washington Post, and NPR have commented on the ACT and SAT exams: The following is the summary. The University of California will not take SAT and ACT scores into account in admissions or scholarship decisions for its system of 10 schools, which include some of the nation's most sought-after campuses, in accordance with a settlement in a lawsuit brought by students. The settlement announced on Friday signals the end of a lengthy legal debate over whether the University of California system should use the standardized tests, which students of color and those with disabilities have said put them at a disadvantage. Opponents of the tests called the settlement "historic," and said that it would broaden access to campuses for students across the state. "Today's settlement ensures that the

2019 lawsuit brought by a coalition of students, advocacy groups and the Compton Unified School District, a largely Black and Hispanic district in Los Angeles County. The plaintiffs said that the college entrance tests are biased against poor and mainly Black and Hispanic students--and that by basing admissions decisions on those tests, the system illegally discriminates against applicants on the basis of their race, wealth and disability. CITY NEWS & UPDATES



Los Gatos Town Council

November 20: Current owners of the Los Gatos Theater, the Goetz family, have offered to donate the theater to the Town. In their proposal, they state their wish that it be a multicultural venue. They suggest the following uses: screenings of newly released movies; family movie series; teen movies; live theater productions on stage performed by local elementary schools; community meeting center. Additionally, it is an opportunity to preserve a historic building in the downtown. Council members approved accepting the donation. The Town Manager will negotiate the agreement and solicit proposals from private companies on managing the theater and programs.

Town staff reviewed the Town's economic support to the downtown businesses during the pandemic. Parklets are continuing to be built for outdoor restaurant patrons. Outdoor space, public parklets with bike racks, and car parking were discussed. Councilmembers approved extending the Economic Recovery Resolution of 2020, until 12/31/2022, so economic support can continue. *Lynda Jandron, Los Gatos Observer*

Saratoga City Council

November: School Resource Officer-- Approved the funding of SROs and details of the funding relationship between the City and the Sheriff's Office. This is in support of a 10-year agreement between the City and the County, which will expire on July 1, 2024.

Parking restrictions: Announced that parking restrictions were proposed for Douglass Lane, Black Walnut Court, Kenosha Court, and Minocqua Court. This was scheduled for discussion November 17.

Organic waste: Discussed whether to adopt the Mandatory Organic Waste Disposal Reduction Ordinance required by the State of California. This involves putting organic waste in clearly labelled waste containers.

Flavored tobacco products, adding menthol as a flavoring that will be banned: Authorized staff to research this potential change to an ordinance.

Monte Sereno City Council

November 16: Council discussed erosion along 400' of Withey road. There is a PG&E gas line on the uphill side. Planning for a retaining wall will cost ca. \$40,000, construction \$400,000. Council and staff discussed sources of funding, erosion prevention, liability and property. Staff will continue exploring alternatives.

Council is continuing its efforts to implement new California State laws SB9 and SB10 relating to regulations promoting higher density housing. The Site and Architectural Commission is working on required Objective Standards for making land use decisions. However, there is a statewide initiative in progress for the November ballot that seeks to protect local control of local land use decisions. If passed, an amendment to the California Constitution would provide that city and county general plans, specific plans, zoning laws, etc. concerning land use would prevail over any conflicting State general laws, with some exceptions. Council is monitoring the progress of the new initiative; changes in direction will affect steps the Council would be required to take. Council at this time is concerned that SB9 and SB10 may not be the best way to address our regional housing shortage. Council discussed legal limits on their taking action to support the new initiative. The City cannot spend its resources on politics. But it can communicate its support, or lack of support, on issues that affect the City.
