LWV California 2025 Convention

LWVSC President, Amy Wolfe, and I had the opportunity to virtually attend the 2025 League of Women Voters of California (LWVC) Convention that took place in June. It was an inspiring and productive experience. The event featured incredible speakers, including Dianna Wynn, LWVUS President, who shared valuable insights on the future of our democracy and the role Leagues play in shaping it.

We also learned about innovative outreach strategies and youth voter initiatives from Leagues across the state. Hearing how other chapters are engaging their communities was both motivating and encouraging.

Program Recommendations for 2025-2027

One of the major focuses of the convention was reviewing and adopting the proposed program for 2025-2027. Key recommendations included:

- Retaining all existing LWVC positions
- No new studies or update studies for the 2025-2027 cycle
- Adoption of three issues for emphasis:
- Making Democracy Work in California including redistricting, civic education, response to changing federal policies, misinformation, voter participation and rights, money in politics, threats to the Constitution, informed information access, reproductive rights and justice, citizen participation, free speech, equal rights, and government transparency.
- Climate Change with focus on water resources, natural disaster response and wildfire management, climate-smart infrastructure, and air quality.
- Housing and Homelessness including disaster relief reform.

Secondary priorities were identified as Immigration and Criminal Justice.

Leadership and Governance

The convention also included the election of the 2025-2027 slate of LWVC officers and Board of Directors. In addition, attendees reviewed the financial report and proposed budget, ensuring the organization remains positioned for sustainable operations in the coming years. On the final day, delegates also considered proposed bylaw amendments, underscoring the League's commitment to responsive and transparent governance.
