



Who is eligible to register and vote?

- A United States citizen and a resident of California
- 18 years old or older on Election Day •
- Not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court •

Eligibility Requireme

System impacted individuals who can register to vote:

In County jail:

Serving a misdemeanor sentence

Jail time is a condition of probation (misdemeanor or felony)

Serving a felony jail sentence (AB109)

Awaiting trial

Parole violation

On probation, mandatory supervision, post-release community supervisi federal supervised release, and a person with a juvenile wardship adjudication



Not currently in state or federal prison or on in county jail awaiting transfer to state or federal prison


