LWY VOTING 1-2-3

Step 1: Register to vote by the deadline

- The deadline to register to vote in the May 7 primary election is April 8.
- To be eligible, you must be a U.S. citizen, 18 years old or older by the general election, not currently incarcerated for a felony conviction (people with prior convictions may register to vote), and not been declared incompetent to vote or denied the right to vote by a court.
- Register to vote or check your registration online at <u>www.MyOhioVote.com</u> or by calling your county Board of Elections.
- If you've moved, changed your name, or not voted in a few years, check your registration – you may need to update it.

Step 2: Decide how you want to cast your ballot

- Vote by mail Fill out and send in an absentee ballot request form. The Secretary of State will not automatically send an application to every voter for the primary election, so request one by contacting your county Board of Elections or through www.MyOhioVote.com
- Vote early in person Registered voters may vote early at their county Board of Elections. Early voting begins on April 9 for the May 2019 election.
- Vote at your polling place on Election Day Election Day is Tuesday, May
 7 for the primary election. Polls are open from 6:30am to 7:30pm. By law,
 if you are in line at 7:30, the polls must stay open to allow you to vote. Note

- Ohio driver's license or state ID card with your name and photo. The card must be current (not expired), but it can have an old address.
- U.S. Military ID with your name and photo (address not required).
- <u>Unexpired government ID</u> with your name, current address, and photo.
 Student ID is not not accepted.
- <u>Original or copy of one of the following documents</u> with your name and current address: utility bill (including cell phone bill), bank or financial advisor statement, pay stub, government check, or other government document.

 Must be dated within the last year.
- If you do not have any of the above, you may use the <u>last 4 digits of your Social Security number</u>, but you will have to vote a provisional ballot. It will be counted so long as the number matches your voter registration. Be sure to complete all fields on the form.
