Civics, Anyone? Volunteers needed for school civics projects

As some of you may remember, Massachusetts enacted a new civics education law late in 2018. Among other things, the law requires all eighth graders and all high school seniors to participate in a student-led non-partisan civics project. The Legislative Committee presented a public program on this new law in March 2019. We do not know whether implementation has been delayed due to Covid, but there are ways that our League can help now to encourage our local students as they develop and present their projects in the upcoming school years.

First: The Massachusetts League currently sponsors an annual student video contest. Indeed, a video from Falmouth High School was one of the winners several years ago. Now, state League Education Specialist Karen Mazza is forming a state-wide committee to recommend a plan to replace the video contest with something more in tune with the civic engagement being developed through the civics projects that students must complete to satisfy the requirements of the state civics education law. Karen, who is a member of the Cape League, has asked whether one of our members would like to serve on this committee. We hope that someone reading this Bulletin would like to join Karen's committee and take up this challenge.

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Second: There are ways we can help our own students with their local projects, such as volunteering to hear student presentations or offering to publicize selected presentations on our website. The Cape League has developed a Civic Resource Directory, and we can make that available to faculty and students if they do not have it already. These are only a few ideas to whet your appetite. We need someone who would like to check-in with the Social Studies Department Chair, find out how we can be useful, and, possibly with a small committee, enlist our membership to help make the projects more successful and rewarding for that precious next generation of voters.

Observer Help Wanted

An Observer for the League of Women Voters of Falmouth is a League member who attends a public Town Government meeting, makes notes on what happens at the meeting, and reports back to the League. Considered the eyes and ears of the League, the Observer Corps is dedicated to ensuring compliance with the Open Meeting Law. The Observer is there only to observe, not to speak to issues or answer questions on adherence to the Open Meeting Law. Our group is the essence of civic engagement and volunteer participation.

On June 17, 2021, the final three Observer reports were delivered via Zoom. We have not had any new Observers for a while and would very much like to have a few more, perhaps part time, in the wings to cover certain special meetings. In particular, we need Observers for the joint meetings of some advisory groups which join the Select Board from time to time such as the <u>Affirmative Action/Diversity Committee</u>, <u>Affordable Housing</u>, and <u>Transportation</u> <u>Committee</u>. Although the Enterprise has done an excellent job in reporting many meetings and although there are Zoom broadcasts and recordings of meetings the public can view, we as an organization have a different mission than merely reporting.

Our League has taken on the commitment to view our town government through the lens of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. In my opinion, an Observer can deliver a report more clearly from that perspective. The Observer is also in a position to incorporate some of the points made by the Board or Committee members with some of the basic committees within the League. Some examples would be Voter Service, Legislative, Natural Resources and Local Study Committees who would be in a position to help the Town Boards with the implementation and education aspects of the Mission statements.

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

A Tale of Two Capes: Cape Verde and Cape Cod


The League of Women Voters of Falmouth will be holding their annual meeting at the Cape Verde Club, with the opportunity to meet some of its members. How much do you know about Cape Verde?

Where is Cape Verde?

Cape Verde is a cluster of ten volcanic islands off the west coast of Africa. Settled by the Portuguese in the 15th century as a convenient depot for slave trading, the country became independent in 1975 and has prospered recently as a stopover for Atlantic shipping.


How many Cape Verdeans live in the United States?

There are about 500,000 Cape Verdeans living in the United States, mostly along the coast in Massachusetts and Rhode Island; that is about the same as the number who live in Cape Verde.




What is Cape Verdean food like?

Cape Verdean food reflects both Portuguese and West African influences. The national dish is cachupa, a stew prepared with corn, beans, other vegetables, and fish or meat. Another popular dish is canja, a chicken soup made with rice, carrots and onions. Beginning in the early 19th century, many Cape Verdeans

sought economic betterment by signing on as crew on whaling ships, working hard and sending money home to their families. They also became workers in the fishing industry and many eventually were able to buy their own boats.
