Letter from the President – May 2022 Dear LWVSC Friends,

After a bit of trial and error, it seems that Spring has finally arrived in upstate New York. I know many of you are busy planning — or planting — your gardens, and I hope all of you are enjoying seeing the flowers pop up and the trees leaf out.

The recent outcome concerning the invalidation of the redistricting maps that had been approved by the NYS Legislature has been an historic win for New York and for the League of Women Voters of New York State. The current process of redistricting dates back to a 2014 constitutional amendment that the League strongly supported. The process requires that a bi-partisan Independent Redistricting Commission produces maps according to current census figures rather than the NYS Legislature as was done in the past. This procedure was not followed, resulting in a legal challenge and a decision by the New York Court of Appeals. Be sure to see the LWVNYS press release about this legal challenge and decision that is included in this Bulletin. You will also find two important documents in the Bulletin this month: the 2022-2023 Proposed Budget and the 2022-2023 LWVSC Program. We will be voting on these items as well as the 2022-2023 Slate of Leaders (that was published in the April Bulletin) at our June Annual Meeting dinner on June 15. More information about the June dinner will follow soon.

Justice and the Law

Support improvements to the local criminal justice system by:

- * Monitoring and strengthening the Probation and Parole procedures, with an emphasis on rehabilitation and supportive services with programs such as the Ex-Offender Re-Entry Program in Schenectady County
- * Facilitating the implementation of alternative courts (problem solving courts) in Schenectady County and promoting collaborations to support them
- * Monitoring the juvenile justice system including Family Court and promoting community-based

rehabilitation

- * Supporting restorative justice programs such as the Center for Community Justice (new name for Community Accountability Board)
- * Improve accessibility to police complaint procedure
- * Improve Mental Health Crisis Intervention
- * Support the efforts of the Schenectady Police Reform and Re-invention Collaborative
- * Support the monitoring of the Schenectady County Jail, including complaint resolution, public health measures, transparency, and greater oversight of day-to-day conditions

Local Government

- * Monitor activities of county governmental units, including town boards, the Schenectady City Council and the Schenectady County Legislature, monitor activities of other quasi-governmental units, public authorities and agencies such as Schenectady Municipal Housing Authority, Metroplex, IDAs and Planning Boards monitor activities of elected public Boards of Education
- * Support standards of high professional qualifications and political nonpartisanship in manager form of government
- * Evaluate opportunities for inter-municipal cooperation and examine options for the consolidation of governmental services in Schenectady County

Children at Risk

- * Collaborate with other organizations to identify the needs of children, including physical and mental health, in Schenectady County, facilitate programs on their behalf and educate the community about their needs and challenges
- * Study early childhood education and care-giving needs in Schenectady County from a policy and financing perspective
- * Support greater coordination between child service agencies

Local Education

- * Monitor local initiatives related to schools and promote and advocate adequate and equitable funding for all school districts so the students can reach their potential
- * Ensure school districts are adequately prepared and staffed for virtual education
- * Observe disparities exposed by the need for virtual education
- * Bolster public schools' ability to respond to needs of students

Local Education (con't.)

*Ensure that all school districts in Schenectady County are actively seeking to hire teachers of color

Environmental Issues

Support the protection of environmental resources, land, water and air in Schenectady County:

- * Advocate for the protection of water resources in the County
- * Promote understanding of global climate emergency and support efforts to mitigate its effects.
- * Support energy conservation and development of renewable energy alternatives
- * Support solid waste management programs that increase reuse and recycling in the County and City

Health Services

- * Educate and advocate for national/state/local health care reform that provides quality physical and mental health care for all citizens
- * Encourage and support countywide comprehensive health care planning and access, equity, and safety in health care
- *Educate about the Ellis and St. Peter's merger and its impact on end of life procedures

League of Women Voters of New York State Hails New York Court of Appeals Decision Invalidating Congressional and State Senate Redistricting Maps for Failing to Follow the Constitutionally Mandated Process Adopted by the People of New York in 2014

(Albany, New York – April 27, 2022) The League of Women Voters of New York State hailed the historic decision issued by the New York Court of Appeals today invalidating the Congressional and State Senate redistricting maps approved by the Legislature as "procedurally unconstitutional". The sweeping majority opinion by Chief Judge DiFiore confirms the critical role of the Independent Redistricting Commission as part of the "historic reforms of the redistricting process" included in the 2014 Constitutional amendment. The Court ordered the New York Supreme Court, with the assistance of a neutral special master and input from relevant parties, to draw new constitutional maps "with all due haste." The Court acknowledged this will likely result in a delay in the primaries from June to August.

In its decision, the Court concluded, "We decline to render the constitutional IRC process inconsequential in the manner requested by the State respondents, a result that would "violat[e] ... the plain intent of the Constitution and ... disregard [the] spirit and the purpose" of the 2014 constitutional amendments."

Laura Ladd Bierman, Executive Director of the League, stated: "This decision represents a great victory for the People of New York, who approved a Constitutional amendment that significantly altered both substantive standards governing redistricting and, most importantly, the redistricting process to achieve those standards by sharply curtailing the Legislature's power over redistricting. The Court agreed with our amicus curiae brief that the Legislature's adoption of redistricting maps after the failure of the IRC to submit a second set of maps violated the constitution, and that the necessary remedy for such a violation required the Judiciary, not the Legislature, to draw constitutional maps. The League is grateful for the assistance of Holwell Shuster and Goldberg for their pro bono assistance in this matter."

The League of Women Voters of New York State, a nonpartisan political organization, encourages informed and active participation in government, works to increase understanding of major public policy issues, and influences public policy through education and advocacy.
