MSU Professor Matthew Grossmann
Polarized by Degrees: How the Diploma Divide and the Culture
War Transformed American Politics

Tuesday, November 14, 2023 @7p at the Bloomfield Township Public Library

Matt Grossmann is Director of the Institute for Public Policy and Social Research (IPPSR) and Professor of Political Science at Michigan State University. Most recently, Dr. Grossmann published *How Social Science Got Better: Overcoming Bias with More Evidence, Diversity, and Self-Reflection* (Oxford University Press, 2021) on the topics of Trump's election, the Great Recession, what makes humans unique, models of infectious disease, social immobility, and racial bias in policing.


His book, *Red State Blues: How the Conservative Revolution Stalled in the States,* is from Cambridge University Press. He finds that while the Republican Party has gained substantial political control of state governments it has largely failed to enact policies that advance conservative goals.

In this presentation, Professor Grossmann will be discussing the upcoming elections and the effects of redistricting.




(4) LWVOA Community Engagement Committee (CEC): Wednesday, November 8th at 2p via Zoom



"Beyond Banning Books - Protect Your Right to Read" a fascinating presentation by BTPL Director, Tera Moon and President, Dani Gillman, Library Board of Trustees.

They discussed the national trend of attempting to ban books and holding library funding hostage that are real threats to our democracy.

Actions suggested include:

- USE your local public library
- READ lots of books, especially those challenged
- VOTE when library millages are on the ballot
- RESEARCH candidates for school and library boards
- SPEAK up for the right to read at local public meetings
- WRITE to legislators
- COMPLIMENT library workers

History shows that many groups helped each other during times of need. The book mentioned below documents how one particular group of Native American Women helped early settlers on Mackinac Island. *The Founding Mothers of Mackinac Island:*



The Agatha Biddle Band of 1870 tells the history of the Agatha Biddle Band, a band of primarily Native American women who lived on Mackinac Island in the 1800s. The band was unique because it was composed of 66 women, and eight men, each of which were owed annuity payments from the U.S. government for land given up in the 1836 Treaty of Washington, D.C. This story depicts how they lived as well as taught others their customs and values.
