February has arrived with good news of the second consecutive passage of the NYS ERA Amendment on January 24, 2023, by the NYS Legislature. This means it has passed its second hurdle and will now be brought to New Yorkers for ratification on the 2024 ballot. We still have work to do as we want to make sure that the public is educated about the amendment and ready to vote in favor, but we can still celebrate this huge step forward. Congratulations!

February is a good month for reflection and perhaps that's why the League of Women Voters chooses to set this month aside for LWV Program Planning. We'll be having our own planning meeting on February 9th – look for more details in this Bulletin. For those who are new to the League, "...Program planning is the grassroots process of recommending and selecting governmental issues for study and agreement in reaching a position. The program is the education and advocacy platform that we adopt to move our mission forward..." (*LWV United States*). At our meeting we will review last year's program, add new plans for the upcoming year, remove items that are no longer pertinent, and update any position we want to keep.

Once the program is selected it will be published for all LWVSC members as a "proposed program", and our membership will have a chance to comment before voting on the program at our Annual Meeting in June. We hope you will consider attending our program planning meeting and sharing an excellent potluck supper with us as well.

# League of Women Voters of Schenectady County Local Program 2022-2023

## Justice and the Law

Support improvements to the local criminal justice system by:

- \* Monitoring and strengthening the Probation and Parole procedures, with an emphasis on rehabilitation and supportive services with programs such as the Ex-Offender Re-Entry Program in Schenectady County
- \* Facilitating the implementation of alternative courts (problem solving courts) in Schenectady County and promoting collaborations to support them
- \* Monitoring the juvenile justice system including Family Court and promoting community-based

rehabilitation

- \* Supporting restorative justice programs such as the Center for Community Justice
- \* Improve accessibility to police complaint procedure
- \* Improve Mental Health Crisis Intervention
- \* Support the efforts of the Schenectady Police Reform and Re-invention Collaborative
- \* Support the monitoring of the Schenectady County Jail, including complaint resolution, public health measures, transparency, and greater oversight of day-to-day conditions

#### **Local Government**

- \* Monitor activities of county governmental units, including town boards, the Schenectady City Council and the Schenectady County Legislature, monitor activities of other quasi-governmental units, public authorities and agencies such as Schenectady Municipal Housing Authority, Metroplex, IDAs and Planning Boards monitor activities of elected public Boards of Education
- \* Support standards of high professional qualifications and political nonpartisanship in manager form of government
- \* Evaluate opportunities for inter-municipal cooperation and examine options for the consolidation of governmental services in Schenectady County

#### Children at Risk

- \* Collaborate with other organizations to identify the needs of children, including physical and mental health, in Schenectady County, facilitate programs on their behalf and educate the community about their needs and challenges
- \* Study early childhood education and care-giving needs in Schenectady County from a policy and financing perspective
- \* Support greater coordination between child service agencies

## **Local Education**

- \* Monitor local initiatives related to schools and promote and advocate adequate and equitable funding for all school districts so the students can reach their potential
- \* Ensure school districts are adequately prepared and staffed for virtual education
- \* Observe disparities exposed by the need for virtual education
- \* Bolster public schools' ability to respond to needs of students
- \*Ensure that all school districts in Schenectady County are actively seeking to hire teachers of color

#### **Environmental Issues**

Support the protection of environmental resources, land, water and air in Schenectady County:

- \* Advocate for the protection of water resources in the County
- \* Promote understanding of global climate emergency and support efforts to mitigate its effects.
- \* Support energy conservation and development of renewable energy alternatives
- \* Support solid waste management programs that increase reuse and recycling in the County and City

#### **Health Services**

- \* Educate and advocate for national/state/local health care reform that provides quality physical and mental health care for all citizens
- \* Encourage and support countywide comprehensive health care planning and access, equity, and safety in health care
- \*Educate about the Ellis and St. Peter's merger and its impact on end-of-life procedures
