Panel Discussion of U.S. Immigration Policies Economic and Political **Issues of Immigration** Who Gets To Be an American?

A panel of research scholars from Viriginia Tech will provide their expertise to the complex concerns in immigration policies.

The League joins with NAACP Montgomery-Radford City-Floyd Branch, and the Lifelong Learning Institute at Virginia Tech to sponsor this event, open to the community and free to attend.

The panel will be Virginia Tech faculty members, Karen Hult and Nicholas Goedert, both of the department of political science, and Melinda Miller, department of economics. Moderator will be Ian Leuschner, Director of International Support Services at Cranwell International Center.

Immigration is a contentious issue, said Carolyn Rude, League president. "Questions of whether some immigrants are slow to assimilate or taking away jobs from citizens or an engine of entrepreneurship and a

League Does Not Host 'empty chair' Forums

In October of almost every year, the League schedules forums for candidates seeking public office, whether at the national, state, or local levels. The forums are one way we fulfill our mission of providing voter education. In 2018, the Leagues in Montgomery County and in Washington County (Abingdon area) invited Morgan Griffith and Anthony Flaccavento, candidates for the US Congress to represent Virginia's 9th District, to participate in area forums. Morgan Griffith declined to participate in forums organized by the League of Women Voters. As the League cannot host an "empty chair" forum, we could not pursue one this year.

The candidates will meet three times for debates hosted by Chambers of Commerce. All require tickets. If people are not members of the Chambers of Commerce, they may get tickets from campaigns at no cost.

Bluefield: 7 p.m., Harman Chapel at Bluefield College. The debate will be broadcast live on WVVA-TV. Tickets may be reserved through Bluefield College and the campaigns.

Oct 18

Bristol: 7 p.m., The Bristol Hotel at 510 Birthplace of Country Music Way. The debate will be broadcast live on WCYB Tri-Cities CW. Tickets may be reserved through Bristol Chamber of Commerce, WCYB-TV, Bristol Herald Courier or the campaigns. This debate will be rebroadcast by Roanoke station, WSLS, Channel 10. The date and time of the rebroadcast will be announced later.

Salem: 7 p.m., Salem Civic Center. Tickets reserved through Salem-Roanoke County Chamber of Commerce website: www.s-rcchamber.org. Go to Events in the menu and then to Events Calendar to reserve a seat. The debate is open to the public. The Chamber is working on the possibility of streaming the debate live. Details will be announced later.
