

From Lively Issues, January 2020 talk by Drew Pennington - Director of Planning & Building Services for Beloit

Before our annual Lively Issues interactive portion of the meeting led by Joyce Metter, we heard from Drew Pennington, Director of Planning & Building Services for Beloit. He covered the Dark Stores Loophole, which many companies are using to get property tax advantages. This loophole allows them to argue that their store should be assessed at the same rate as if it were not operating or closed (dark) for business. Thus, an operating Walmart could compare its property assessment to that of the "dark" store Shopko. They would pay a lot less in property tax. The city still has to raise the same amount it needs to operate through using property tax, so other property owners will have to make up the difference. Allowing this loophole thus increases our residential homeowners' taxes, often by as much as eight percent. Mr. Pennington informed us that a group of lawyers is going around to companies offering to sue for tax relief via this loophole. They take on cases for free, only getting paid if they win.

We did vote in November, 2018, on this very issue in a referendum, and 73% of Rock County wants to eliminate the loophole. The Wisconsin Legislature has not done so. The bills this session, Senate Bill 130 and Assembly Bill 146 both stalled in committee. We were encouraged to contact legislators about the bills. With a new election coming, members can certainly ask candidates for Assembly and Senate their stances on this issue and let them know your opinion. Mark Spreitzer co-sponsored it, but Amy Loudenbeck did not sign on.



Mr. Pennington covered a few myths regarding this loophole:

- 1. MYTH 1 closing the loophole will increase tax collections. FALSE Closing this loophole will stop the shift in the tax burden to homeowners.
- 2. MYTH 2 Assessors will benefit. FALSE There are no rogue assessors.
- 3. MYTH 3 Closing it violates the uniformity clause. FALSE The uniformity clause applies to the rate applied. It will not change that.

Other Updates – Mr. Pennington also updated us on Planned Unit Development (PUD) considerations and new buildings in town. Some considerations in Beloit include, e.g. historic preservation, parking, adaptive reuse, design of the subdivision, common space or parks, floodplain protection, sidewalks, bike racks, etc. He showed pictures of many of the plans and talked about others. Some were the Snappers Stadium, new apartments/condos on Grand and 4th, Angel Museum, Hawk's Ridge (75 additional units), Pleasant Street row houses, Amazon, and Beloit College Powerhouse. Amazon plans to use native prairie landscaping and include a transit stop. Members brought up the problem that there is no affordable housing and little housing for elderly, and no tiered housing (like Cedar Crest or Willowick). Mr. Pennington also informed us that the average rent is \$777 a month now. We all agreed that was simply too much. He also pointed out that the state has taken away the rights of cities to do on-site inspections. Affordable housing is something else we can ask candidates for the legislature about.

Action we can take – The Beloit LWV does not have a stance on the dark stores loophole, but you can make your own views known. As I write this, I am getting more enthused about studying it further and doing a study at some point.

Lively Issues

At Lively Issues, we decided to continue with the extensive look at the education positions with the hope of perhaps streamlining them. The committee is quite actively meeting at least once a month.

Centennial - Gayle and her committee is working on a variety of activities culminating in a large event Saturday, August 22 co-sponsored by the Beloit Historical Society.

Letter to the Editor (BDN)

In February 2020 the League of Women Voters (LWV) celebrated its 100th anniversary and the Beloit League joined more than 700 other local and state chapters to celebrate this historic milestone.

When a member joins their local League of Women Voters, they also become part of a larger network in their state and nation. The League of Women Voters was founded on February 14, 1920, six months before the ratification of the 19th Amendment giving women the right to vote. Local and state organizations followed by organizing the local chapters as they joined the national organization.

The League of Women Voters of Beloit organized and was founded in March 1945, becoming a member of both the LWV of Wisconsin and LWV US. As League members look to a vibrant future on their threshold of our next 100 years, the League is excited that dedicated members in Beloit, Wisconsin and the nation continue to steadily attract significant numbers of activists who share the League's commitment to making democracy work.

The League of Women Voters membership is open to women and men, 16 years of age and older, who are interested in improving our systems of government and impacting public policy through education and advocacy. The League's historic commitment to register, educate and mobilize voters is not only stronger, but more effective than ever, utilizing such tools as VOTE411.org, a cutting edge election information website utilized by millions of voters each election cycle.

On a national level the League will continue to fight voter discrimination and to keep secret money out of our elections to ensure that our elections are fair, free and accessible. There will be a continued push for improved access to health care as well as recognizing that climate change is a scientific reality that must be addressed to ensure a sustainable planet for everyone. The state league will continue to address the issue of fair and impartial redistricting. The Beloit League members have many interests in these topics as well as recently learning more about issues affecting the homeless and various aspects of local education.


One hundred years after the League was founded in 1920, members of the League are proud of the great progress achieved when it comes to truly making democracy work.

State of Wisconsin Binding Referendum to Amend Wisconsin's Constitution:

"Additional rights of crime victims. Shall section 9m of article I of the constitution, which gives certain rights to crime victims, be amended to give crime victims additional rights, to require that the rights of crime victims be protected with equal force to the protections afforded the accused while leaving the federal constitutional rights of the accused intact, and to allow crime victims to enforce their rights in court?" Equal Rights Amendment - ERA - Event

Many of us were able to attend a program on the Equal Rights Amendment on March 7 at 10 at the Beloit Public Library, co-sponsored by the library. So many young people have no idea about this amendment or what the initials even stand for. We had 23 attend, 19 of whom are LWV members (2 from Janesville). As a result, we got at least one new member – Welcome Dorothy Scavera!!

Debra Jensen DeHart from the Beloit Daily News wrote an article for the newspaper on 3/10. We watched the 30-minute film *Legalize Equality*, taken from the two-hour film *Equal Means Equal*. They are put out by Heroica Foundation, working to get the ERA passed. I own the shorter film and the longer two-hour film will be available for loan at the library. Afterwards, activist Jannette Dean from Minnesota was skyped in to answer questions. She sent us a fact sheet and said that though we have now had enough (38) ratify the amendment, we are way past the 1982 deadline. Five states later rescinded their votes, but there are some legal questions regarding this and the deadline. After all, according to Scott Bomboy of the Constitution Center, the 27th amendment was ratified 203 years later.
