

## Ideas and Volunteers for Centennial Celebration

- July 4 parade – LWV should march in PA parade
- LWV should be represented as one of the blocks in the quilt for the play *Quilters*. Work with Sunbonnet Sue quilters to promote centennial. *Sue Stednick*
- “We need a new vision for the future” as a theme for working with students
- Poster that looks like an eye chart – 20/20 vision for the future
- Do something related to movies about suffragists, i.e. *Iron Jawed Angels*, maybe show films in schools and homes
- Work with Sequim Museum & Art and PA Fine Arts. *Marsha Carr*
- Students could make bracelets that say “Women Vote” or “Men Vote”
- Skits that could be taken to schools
- Need articles in PDN, sidebar with important dates
- Relate the centennial to the 2020 census
- Tagline: the census counts; link to representation in state legislature – *Anne Murray*
- Don’t forget the West End; what are the issues affecting voting rights in our county?
- Book readings for little kids so they can learn about how women got the right to vote. *Bonne Bless-Boenish*
- Irrigation Festival – have the princesses on the float not dressed in ballgowns, but rather dressed as suffragists
- High school history classes have presentation about the 19<sup>th</sup> amendment, reflecting how women were labeled and what the battle was; have the people on the panel in character as people of the time – *Sue Luxton*
- Invite elected officials at all levels involved in the centennial observations
- Holiday party for elected officials
- Frame the observance with what the LWV is trying to accomplish: 1) celebrating what women have accomplished; 2) there are still challenges ahead; 3) attract new members, all ages, all genders
- Presentations to service clubs (keep in mind they book 9-12 months in advance)
