The year 2020 is a monumental year for the League of Women Voters, 100th Birthday, and the Women's Suffrage Movement, 100th Anniversary of the passage of the 19th Amendment, Women's Right to Vote. The League of Women Voters was founded by Carrie Chapman Catt in 1920, just six months before the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, giving American women (except native Americans) the right to vote after a 72-year fight for women's suffrage. We are very proud of our rich history. In 2020, the League of Women Voters of Greater Pittsburgh has a unique opportunity to share this history and to showcase the impact of our accomplishments! During our Centennial year, we will be holding various events that will focus on

"Creating a More Perfect Democracy (League of Women Voters Anniversary Slogan)" by reaching out to all residents of Greater Pittsburgh to engage, empower, educate and inform them of the importance of our history and the importance of the fight for a women's right to vote.

To accomplish this, we will be starting the year by promoting all of the Women's Suffrage Movement events, lectures, and activities going on next year in Pittsburgh through a "Pittsburgh's Women's Suffrage Centennial Calendar." The calendar will list, by month, the events organized throughout the year by Pittsburgh organizations, such as Historical Societies, the Heinz History Center, City of Pittsburgh, Pittsburgh Black Legacy, Carlow College, Pennsylvania Center for Women and Politics at Chatham University, and the Western Pennsylvania Juneteenth Celebration. This commemorate project, a color, trifold brochure, will be distributed throughout Allegheny County by the featured organizations and by the League at all Carnegie Libraries, YMCA's, universities, colleges, and schools throughout the county. If you are aware of any events going on next year, please let the Centennial Committee know!

In addition, in February the League of Women Voters celebrates its 100th Birthday! To celebrate and honor our 100th birthday, we have partnered with the Heinz History Center to share with the city the history of our beginning, our birth, as an organization fighting for women's rights. This free, educational event, "Women Forging the Way: The Life of Susan B. Anthony & The Story of Pittsburgh Suffragists," will be held on February 15, 1-3pm, at the Heinz History Center. We have invited a "living" Susan B. Anthony, the pioneer of the women's suffrage movement, to present "IS IT A CRIME TO VOTE?." The 60-minute dramatization, presented by living history actress, Christina Rausa, features Susan B. Anthony voting in the 1872 Presidential Election, being arrested, and standing trial. Also depicted in the play is Anthony's life-long affiliation with Elizabeth Cady Stanton. The audience will hear two of Anthony's most famous speeches: "The Stump Speech" and "The True Woman Speech."



The Heinz History Center will also be unveiling its new "Women's History Gallery Guide," an interactive digital experience filled with challenges and puzzles. Attendees will be encouraged to explore the museum galleries and make connections with important women's stories in Pittsburgh history, explore our archives, and to make civic-minded buttons and posters. This afternoon, dedicated to celebrating the stories and successes of women who fought for the right to vote, has the historical significance of being Susan B. Anthony's birthday

LWVGP CIVIC EDUCATION- HIGH SCHOOL VISITS UPDATE FOR DECEMBER 2019

For the past two years we have been incorporating teacher and student feedback and our own experiences to refine our classroom presentation and voter registration process for high school students. Now in our third year, we are ready to hit the ground running. Presenters Susan Duncan, Susan Fair, Amy Kleissas, Michele Knoll, and Joanne Moore met on October 23rd to practice the "Voting Made Easy" PowerPoint presentation and to resolve questions about the scope of this project. Agreement was reached that the presenters would make every effort to be available for as many school visits as are scheduled in the 2020 school year.

We had a very successful visit to Elizabeth Forward Middle School on November 14th with four presenters. Staff was enthusiastic about our visit and students were very positive on the student "post-tests." Additionally, the assistant superintendent dropped in to one of our presentations and tweeted about it!

Two new slides showing the Voter Registration ID card and envelope were added to the presentation. It was suggested that students would be more aware of receiving the card in the mail if they knew what to look for. An application for a LWVEF grant was completed and submitted.


